1. Introduction of Department Staff Members – Michelle Luna, Administrative Assistant, and Amaris Galindo, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator:

Michelle Luna stated she is the new Administrative Assistant for the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Department. In her new role, she will be supporting CSPR Administration, as well as the Parks and Facilities Division. Michelle brings more than 26 years of experience with the City of Chino. Most recently, she served as a Customer Service Representative II at the Neighborhood Activity Center and worked closely with residents, building strong relationships, and providing exceptional customer service.

Amaris Galindo stated she is a new Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator. For over 15 years, she has dedicated her career to strengthening families and building partnerships that improve communities. She has worked under county-funded family resource programs, led multidisciplinary teams, coordinated outreach and educational events, and collaborated with schools, non-profit organizations, and government agencies to connect families with critical services. What excited her most about the HOPE Family Resource Center is its commitment to removing barriers that prevent students from thriving.

VI. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

Chairperson Jerry opened the Public Communications.

Jack Hsu, resident, spoke regarding having dedicated professional-grade outdoor calisthenics stations in one of the existing community spaces. It is a cost-effective way to modernize Chino's park system and support community health of all age groups.

Stubby Barr, resident, stated there are several pocket parks in the Preserve and College Park that have fixed workout stations. Even though they are privately owned, they are open to the public.

As there were no further requests to speak, Chairperson Jerry closed the Public Communications.

VII. ACTION ITEMS

1. Naming Preserve Park Site:

Silvia Avalos, Director of Community Services, Parks & Recreation, gave the report. Ms. Avalos reported at the June meeting, the Commission asked the Park Naming Sub-Committee to further evaluate and recommend a name for the new park in The Preserve Block 1, as there were 18 park names proposed by community members. Staff met with the Park Naming Sub-Committee on July 2, which included Chairperson Jerry and Commissioners Cooper and Montenegro-Olivas. After careful review, the Sub-Committee determined that due to the park size and approved planned amenities, naming the park after an individual community member would not be the most appropriate approach at this time. The Sub-Committee agreed that recognition of a community member's contribution would be better suited for a large community park, where the theme and amenities could be thoughtfully designed to honor the individual's legacy and impact on the Chino community. After evaluating the name suggestions, the Sub-Committee identified three names that best align with the park's overall theme and design: Harmony Park, Preserve Harmony Park, and Cherry Blossom Park. The Sub-Committee is recommending Harmony Park as the preferred name as it best reflects the park's amenities, design, and purpose.

Chairperson Jerry requested volunteers to be on the Park Design Sub-Committee.

Commissioners Martinez, Montenegro-Olivas, and Takeuchi volunteered.

Moved by Chairperson Jerry, seconded by Commissioner Aviles, and carried on a 6-0-0-0 vote to 1) approve the name "Harmony Park" and forward the recommendation to the City Council for adoption, and 2) approve the

establishment of the Park Design Sub-Committee consisting of Commissioners Martinez, Montenegro-Olivas, and Takeuchi.

Ms. Avalos stated the reason staff is requesting the Sub-Committee is that staff is currently in the process of finalizing the design for two parks, which include Heritage and Shady Grove, and a splash pad at Glenn Duncan Park. The Sub-Committee will be meeting with staff to review the conceptual designs within the next month.

2. Select a Vice Chairperson for 2026-2027:

Commissioner Takeuchi nominated Commissioner Martinez, who declined the nomination.

Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas nominated Commissioner Aviles.

Moved by Commissioner Cooper, seconded by Chairperson Jerry, and carried on a 6-0-0-0 vote to approve Commissioner Aviles as Vice Chairperson for the remainder of the 2026-2027 term.

Rachel Phelps, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Phelps reported on Healthy Chino programs, which included Bark Around Ayala Park, Hike the Valley, Healthy Chino Kids, Healthy Chino Outreach, Chino Community Garden Workshops and 10th Anniversary, Children's Discovery Workshops, and Healthy Chino Coalition meetings.

2. Ayala Park Operations Center:

Ernest Quintana, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Mr. Quintana reported on highlights from the past year, which included facility improvements; field rentals; community events; opening ceremonies for Chino Girls Fastpitch, Chino National Little League, and Chino American Little League; tournaments; Go Skateboarding Day; Batting Cages; Family Campout; and Women's Soccer League. Mr. Quintana reported maintaining safe, high quality athletic fields remains the highest priority. Maintenance projects included laser leveling, in-field material replacement, and repairs at Ayala, Heritage, Villa, and Mountain View Parks.

Daniel Koster, Management Aide, gave the report. Mr. Koster reported on managing the Department's marketing, social media, website, and recreation brochure. Mr. Koster reported that utilizing social media is not only to get the word

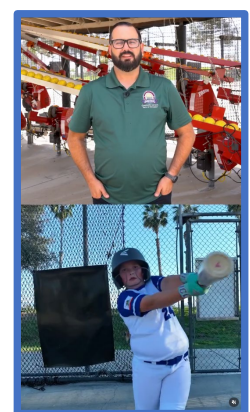
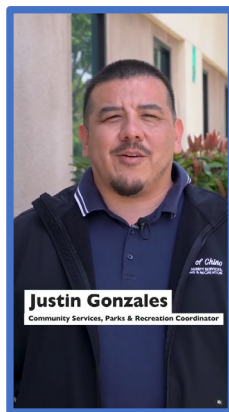

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

High Five After School Program

- On July 6, Tracks A, B, and C started the 2026-2027 school year at the Preserve Community Center. A total of 82 participants are enrolled.

SUMMER CAMP

- On July 1, Campers took a trip to the Fontana Aquatics Center to “cool off” in the summer heat. There were 82 participants.
- Participants enjoyed multiple pools, a splash pad, and a water slide. Campers ate lunch at the neighborhood park and concluded the day with a swim.

- Participants had the opportunity to buy snacks before the movie.
- On July 15, participants visited Skate Express in Chino. Campers enjoyed skating to music and participated in skating games hosted by the Skate Express staff.
- On July 21, Richard the Magician came out and visited both Camp sites for a Dinosaur themed Magic Show.
- Participants learned about dinosaurs and were able to participate in magic tricks throughout the show.
- On July 29, Campers visited the Discovery Cube OC. Participants enjoyed exploring the different exhibits ranging from learning about the ocean, space, inertia, and much more! There were 91 participants.

Letter Learners Program

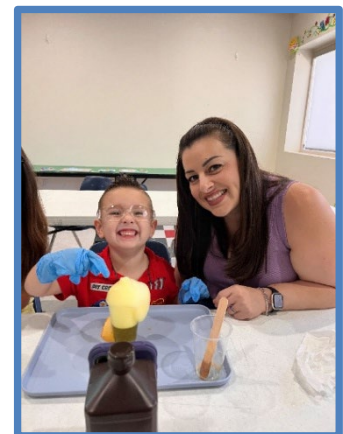
- Eighty children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays at 10:30 a.m.

- Chino families enjoy a lively mix of story time, music, movement, and arts and crafts designed to spark creativity and strengthen the bond between parents and little ones.
- The program features special guests: Lola, a lovable, neurodivergent puppet mascot, and her friend the Toucan.
- De Colores is a collaboration between the Chino Youth Museum and the dA Center for the Arts in Pomona. Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.

 - Scott Lewis – In-kind donation of the door prize for window cleaning services.
 - Chino Fair Association – In-kind donation of the hall rental.
 - Raising Cane's Chicken Fingers – In-kind donation of two raffle baskets.
 - Taste Salud – In-kind donation of swag bag products.



COUNSELING PROGRAMS

Family Counseling

- Human Services provided counseling services to 86 participants for a total of 314 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 26 participants for a total of 80 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 15 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 635 hours.

Chino Hills and Chino Valley Unified School District (CVUSD) Reports

- On July 31, the bi-annual report was submitted to the City of Chino Hills and CVUSD. This report provides a summary of the services Human Services provided to students within the City of Chino Hills and CVUSD. Included in the report are the number of participants and units of service provided to students in the following programs:
 - HOPE Family Resource Center
 - Teen Counseling
 - Youth Counseling
 - CARE (Children Academic Recovery Education) Counseling

Staff Training

- On July 27, nine new Counselors began their internship with Human Services by attending a two-part training. The first part was on *Month-End Paperwork*, where they learned how to complete and submit the month-end paperwork for administrative purposes. The second part focused on *Record Keeping*. The goal of this training was to help establish standards for best practices in the areas of clinical note writing and file preparation.
- On July 28, Counselors trained on *Crisis Management/Suicide Prevention* with a focus on the policies and procedures regarding crisis management. The latter part of the day, Counselors attended *How to Make Best Use of Supervision*, where they learned techniques on maximizing their supervision time.

Recruitment of New Counselor II Leads

- Interviews to fill four Counselor II positions took place. All four spots were filled and the selected individuals continue to walk through the hiring process.
- Once onboarded, the new Lead Counselors will be assigned to their school sites and will be ready to lead their trainee Counselors when school starts.

Internships

- Summer BA Interns started at the HOPE Family Resource Center assisting with the Back-to-School Giveaway and shadowing Case Managers.
- Recruitment for fall BA Interns is underway.

Outreach

- On July 25, Chino Human Services attended the HOPE Back-to-School Giveaway to provide information to the community regarding services. The event was successful, and many families asked for more information on how to sign up for counseling. Staff is looking forward to serving these families in the future.



HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team, made up of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator, alongside the Chino Police Department's Quality-of-Life Team continues to provide vital support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The team connects people with services, such as rehabilitation programs, transitional or permanent housing, and family reunification, while creating personalized case plans to help them achieve stable housing.
- On July 30, the cities of Chino, Upland, and Montclair partnered to provide outreach and resources to individuals experiencing homelessness. Agencies in attendance included United Way 211, IVRS, and Hoving Home, all of which were able to offer available program beds on the spot. Through this joint effort, seven individuals across the three cities were able to leave the streets and enter housing or treatment programs that day. The next regional outreach event is planned for the fall.
- The team served 41 new clients, providing a total of 55 units of service.

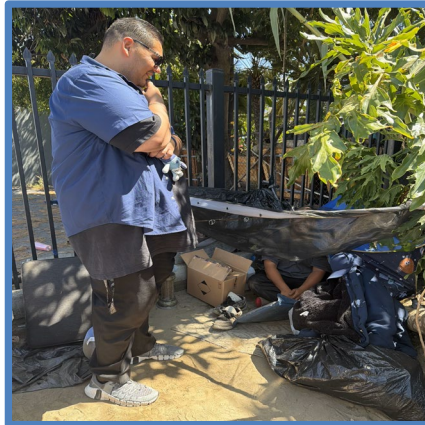


Success Stories

- On July 13, Homeless Outreach responded to a referral for an individual seeking services. After coordinating with law enforcement and confirming shelter availability, the team facilitated intake at the shelter, where the individual was identified as a returning participant and accepted into the program. They provided transportation to Set Free

Ministries in Montclair, where the individual awaited transfer to the residential program in Phelan.

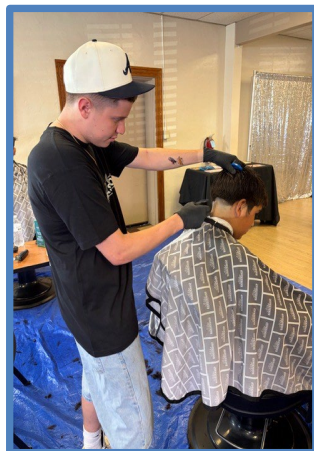
- The Homeless Outreach Team responded to a dispatch regarding a 40-year-old woman found sitting with her belongings on Riverside Drive. During the contact, she shared that she had recently moved from New Mexico to California to stay with family, but after relationship conflicts and losing her local support, she became displaced. The Homeless Outreach Team determined her safest option was to return to her support system in New Mexico. After confirming with her mother that she could return home, the team coordinated approval for a same-day Amtrak ticket, provided transportation to the station, and remained with her until she safely boarded the train. A follow-up the next day confirmed she arrived home safely.



GIVEAWAY EVENTS

Back-to-School Giveaway

- On the day of the event, the Back-to-School Giveaway provided 440 backpacks to students. The event successfully provided children with the school supplies needed to start school. Parents visited the resource tables throughout the event and accessed informative resources that supported school readiness and family well-being. The partners in attendance engaged families and had fun activities for children. Several children were able to receive haircuts at the event with the support of barbers and hairstylists who volunteered for the event.
- For families unable to attend the event, the HOPE Program has reached out to coordinate a day and time that works best for pickup of backpack and school supplies.



HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- HOPE staff enrolled 202 new families resulting in a total of 714 units of service in form of re-enrollment services, application and food assistance, clothing, emergency hygiene supplies, connection to childcare, and referrals to the Back-to-School Giveaway.
- Every July, the team begins a new fiscal year. Families in need of continuing services are re-enrolled in the program. New families are also enrolled every month.
- The HOPE Program was able to assist six families with emergency rental assistance and five families with emergency utility assistance.
- The HOPE Program continues to partner with CrossPoint Church in Chino to provide 50 families with new clothing for school-aged children.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet served 362 individuals. This included 218 children who received clothing. Additionally, 82 bags with hygiene products were provided.
- The CARE closet received school supply donations and backpacks from Bread of Life, Church of Jesus Christ Latter-Day Saints, and Calvary Chapel. This contribution supported the success of the Back-to-School Giveaway on July 25.



TYKES

- The TYKES program provided a total of 330 services to 72 new families with a child 0 to 5 years old.
- Starting the new fiscal year, one parent enrolled in Parents as Teachers. She is scheduled to begin in July. A second parent expressed interest and is scheduled to begin in August. Case Managers continue to promote the curriculum during their re-enrollment process with continuing and new incoming clients.
- The Outreach Specialist hosted a table at three events, leading to 204 service contacts promoting Case Management support services and early childhood-related resources.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- Chino Valley Unified School District MTSS-B Counselors and City of Chino PALS staff will be meeting on August 7, for a “Meet and Greet” to get to know one another and to kick off the new school year.
- All PALS sites, including Alicia Cortez, Anna Borba, Briggs, Cal Aero, Doris Dickson, E.J. Marshall, Howard Cattle, Newman, Rhodes, and Walnut Elementary Schools in the Chino Valley Unified School District, will begin lessons in September.

HEALTHY CHINO**Hike the Valley**

- Participants were shuttled to Laurel Canyon, Laurel Spur, and Willow Trail Loop on the Laguna Coast on July 11. This was a three-mile hike and was classified as moderate intensity. After the hike, participants enjoyed a healthy snack nearby.

**Garden Workshop**

- No Garden Workshops were held in July.

Children’s Discovery Workshop

- No Children’s Discovery Workshops were held in July.

Storytime in the Garden

- Storytime in the Garden took place on July 1, 8, 15, 22, and 29. Every Wednesday, participants enjoyed a story read by a guest reader and a craft that matched the book that was read. Chino Reserve Police Officer, Edward Acosta; CSPR Commissioner, Julissa Montenegro-Olivas; CSPR Specialist, Lyann Martinez; and CSPR Specialist, Nancy Estevez, were guest readers. The books read included, “Moth and Butterfly TA-DA,” “Green Green: A Community Garden Story,” “Everything Grows in Jiddo’s Garden,” and “The Very Hungry Caterpillar.” Healthy Chino partnered with Chino Branch Library to provide books and craft supplies each week.



Community Garden 10th Anniversary

- The Chino Community Garden celebrated its 10th anniversary on July 18. The event hosted garden tours led by Community Garden gardeners, windchime making, flower pressing led by the Chino Master Gardeners of San Bernardino County, and a reading nook hosted by the Chino Branch Library. Participants were able to enjoy a scavenger hunt, grilled pineapple, and learned about various City programs.



Healthy Chino Kids

- Healthy Chino Kids concluded at the two CSPR Summer Camp locations. Summer Camp staff led activities, including making bird feeders and a nature hunt. Each participant received a popsicle as a reward for participating.

Outreach

- Healthy Chino hosted an Outreach booth at Chino Summer Movie Nights on July 10, 17, 24, and 31; Chino Community Garden 10th Anniversary on July 18; and the Back-to-School Giveaway on July 25. Participants who visited the booth were able to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs, workshops, and events.



CITYWIDE SPECIAL EVENTS

Chino Summer Movie Nights

- Chino Summer Movie Nights held four movies in July.
 - 7/10 Lilo & Stitch
 - 7/17 Hoppers

- Two movies were shown at Chino City Hall and two were shown at Stueve Family Park.
- The four films shown for Summer Movie Nights had more than 1,300 community members attend.
- For the final night of Summer Movie Nights at Stueve Family Park, Thor's Reptile Family brought out 14 different animals for guests to interact with for preshow entertainment.
- For the final movie of the summer series, SoCa Arts Dance Academy performed five performances featuring dancers ages 4-10. The Society of American Magicians presented a 40-minute magic show, where they made a child levitate and made free balloon animals for all children in attendance.
- There were seven event sponsors: Waste Management, Watson Land Company, Kiwanis Club of Chino, In-N-Out, Chino Valley Medical Center, Code Ninjas, and Sunrise Church.

- Event features are being finalized.
- Water donation from Costco has been secured.
- Event registration opens August 3.

Halloween Spooktacular

- Halloween Spooktacular is scheduled for October 31, at Ayala Park, from 3:00-8:00 p.m., on Fields 11-13.
- Staff are recruiting sponsors, food vendors, trunk-or-treat booths, and game/craft booths.
- Maps are being updated and routed for approval.

- Social media timeline has been finalized.
- Contract vendors are being researched for character appearances, entertainment, and carnival rides.

SERVICES OUTREACH

- Outreach effectively hosted informational booths at nine community events, successfully engaging more than 1,013 residents.
- Attendees enjoyed interactive games and prizes, while discovering a range of exciting upcoming City programs, including Bark Around Ayala Park, Preserve Teen Programs, Teen Opportunity Program, CYM Bingo Bash, Pee Wee Sports, and the release of the fall Chino Connection.

BATTING CAGES

- Batting Cages served over 1,620 participants.
- Batting Cages generated over \$8,900 in sales.

ADULT SPORTS

Men's Basketball

- The Men's Adult Basketball summer season began on July 12, at the Neighborhood Activity Center. Twelve teams are competing in the Recreation Division, and eight teams are competing in the Advanced Division.

Women's Soccer

- The Women's Adult Soccer summer season continued with twelve games played in July.

NEIGHBORHOOD ACTIVITY CENTER (NAC)

Case Management

- On July 25, the Case Manager participated in the Back-to-School Giveaway event held at the Chino Community Building. Responsibilities included assisting with client check-

in, verifying registered participants, and facilitating the distribution of backpacks and school supplies.

- Additionally, critical housing assistance was provided to a client facing eviction due to a reduction in income. The client experienced rental arrears after providing care for an ill family member, which impacted the client's ability to maintain timely rent payments. Through the Emergency Housing Assistance program, the client was approved for rental assistance in July, successfully preventing eviction. Two additional clients were also approved for the rental assistance program due to experiencing financial hardship and housing instability.

CHINO EXPERIENCE TEEN CENTER

Chino Experience Teen Center/Teen Programs Activities

- The Chino Experience Teen Center was not open during July. The Center will reopen on August 10.
- On July 25, the Teen Center Coordinator and Specialist attended the Back-to-School Giveaway event at the Chino Community Building. Staff was able to connect with parents and staff and highlight various teen programs.



- On July 31, the Teen Center Coordinator and Specialist attended a Back-to-School event at Magnolia Jr. High School for incoming 7th and 8th grade families. Staff was able to connect with families and highlight the Teen Center and Teen Center Shuttle services. Two families registered for the shuttle service while at the event.



Teen Opportunity Program (TOP)

- The Teen Opportunity Program met on July 2, in Council Chambers. There were five members in attendance. Participants had the chance to sign up for Saturday Night Fights and Pee Wee Soccer.

Teen Advisory Committee (TAC)

- The Teen Advisory Committee did not meet in July.
- Orientation will be held on August 4, at the Neighborhood Activity Center for all Teen Advisory Committee members to prepare for their upcoming term.

MONTE VISTA PARK**Splash Pad**

- The Splash Pad is open to the public daily from May 23, through September 7, 11:00 a.m.-7:00 p.m. Days of operation will change to only Saturday and Sunday starting September 8, through October 25.

SUMMER LUNCH

- The Free Summer Lunch Program started on May 26, and will run through August 7.
- There were 2,198 meals served at Monte Vista Park during this reporting period.
- There were 1,164 meals served at Liberty Park during this reporting period.

OLD SCHOOLHOUSE MUSEUM

- The Museum had 76 visitors.
- On July 1, the Old School House Museum hosted a Cowboy Day Pop-Up from 2:00-4:00 p.m., with 12 guests. Visitors had the chance to visit displays specialized in highlighting Chino's cowboy roots. Participants enjoyed western-themed activities and games.
- On July 15, 37 Sunshine Montessori participants came to visit the museum. Participants made butter, explored the Museum's exhibits, and participated in activities themed around Chino's history.

PRESERVE COMMUNITY CENTER**Programs and Classes**

- The Youth Sports program began its summer Basketball season games on July 10, with games taking place every Friday and Saturday.

Preserve Teen Scene

- Preserve Teen Scene staff hosted an Outreach booth during the Summer Movie Nights at Stueve Family Park on July 17 and 24, where they distributed program flyers and provided community members with information about the program.
- The Teen Scene program continued operating on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:00-5:00 p.m., at Homecoming in the Preserve. The program saw an average daily attendance of 20 teen participants.
- The last day of Preserve Teen Scene summer programming was July 28. The program will resume next month as an After School Program, offered Monday through Friday.

Transportation Services

- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program provided 507 transportation trips to 63 participants for a variety of needs, including transportation to Senior Center activities, doctor appointments, grocery shopping, and trips to the bank and post office. There were 8 newly registered participants.
- The Breakfast Club was held on July 1, with 14 participants. Free transportation is provided to a local restaurant once a month. This month, they enjoyed Black Bear Diner.
- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on July 17, with 18 participants.

Class Highlights

- Door Décor and More took place on July 27, with 12 participants. Participants painted a mantle sign with different monthly themed accents. Next month's theme is autumn and will take place on August 31.

- The Battleship USS Iowa Museum trip took place on July 25, with 16 participants.



Special Events

- This summer, Seniors at the Square will take place at Aguiar Square on Mondays, July 6 through August 10, from 5:30-8:00 p.m. Participants enjoyed entertainment provided by AJ's Entertainment. Four hundred participants attended the events.



Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 31 participants for a total of 118 units of service. The Aging Services Coordinator worked with various participants on applications for utility and rental assistance. Direct services included low-income housing lists, Medi-Cal renewal applications, and Cal-Fresh applications. In addition, 31 resources and referrals were provided.

Success Story

- The Aging Services Coordinator assisted a couple with completing and submitting a rental assistance application. The participants reported ongoing health challenges. As the household relies on a fixed income, unexpected vehicle repairs created a financial hardship that resulted in past-due rent. The Aging Services Coordinator successfully submitted the rental assistance application, and the participants were approved for rental assistance. As a result, the participants were able to bring their account current, reducing their immediate financial burden, and supporting greater housing and financial stability.

Social Services

- On July 2 and 16, Healthy Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program (HICAP) provided free information for Medicare. There were 5 participants.
- On July 20, Inland Counties Legal Services provided free legal aid to 2 participants.
- On July 23, Feeding America distributed 225 boxes of non-perishable food items to participants.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On July 28, American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) conducted a safety driver's course. There were 2 participants.

RECREATION CLASSES / CONTRACT CLASSES

Class Highlights

- Fall class registration began on July 6, for residents; and July 8, for non-residents.
- Fun with Science with Robyn Garcia saw great interest, averaging 44 participants across 3 classes this month.
- Tennis classes also experienced steady participation, with a total of 25 participants enrolled across all sessions.



TINY TOTS

Tiny Tots

- Tiny Tots participants created a variety of fun, beach-themed crafts as part of the summer session, including sunglasses, beach balls, crabs, and pirate hats.
- Participants engaged in sensory play with kinetic sand, while practicing letter recognition. They traced letters in the sand to strengthen letter identification and reinforce early literacy skills.

PROJECTS UPDATE

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) – REPLACEMENT CONTAINER SHED

Project Status:

- Coordinating the purchase of a new Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) container shed.

Scope of Work:

- This project will replace the existing Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) container shed at the Public Works Services Yard. The new container will meet all applicable requirements and include necessary electrical and concrete improvements for permanent installation.

UTILITY BILLING (UB) – RELOCATION OF UB DIVISION AT CITY HALL SOUTH

Project Status:

- Finalizing workstation and furniture designs.
- Obtaining a proposal for construction improvements to the existing space in preparation for the relocation.

Scope of Work:

- The project includes relocating the Finance Department's Utility Billing Division from City Hall to City Hall South, specifically the former Police Department records room. Improvements will include reconfiguring the front and back counters and office spaces, along with new workstations, furniture, painting, and flooring.

CITY HALL, LAB BUILDING, FORMER MESSAGE PARLOR BUILDING - ROOF REPLACEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- Working with a roofing consultant to assess all three roofs and develop a tailored scope of work for each facility.

Scope of Work:

- The project includes replacing the roofs at City Hall, Lab Building, and former Massage Parlor Building. Existing roofs are leaking, outdated, and at the end of their useful life. Work will include removal of existing roofing system to the roof substrate level, inspection and repair as needed, and installation of a layered roofing system to provide a watertight system and meet applicable Title 24 requirements.

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- The scope of work has expanded to include renovation of the basketball court and remaining hardscape areas adjacent to the basketball court for an overall cohesive improvement project.
- The Building Division has reapproved the plans with the added scope.
- Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to approve the plans and prepare the bid package.

Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will include professional design services to prepare plans and construction documents for the removal of existing playground equipment and rubber/sand surfacing, and installation of new all-inclusive playground equipment, continuous rubberized play surfacing, shade sail system, new picnic shade shelter, new site furnishings (including tables, benches, trash receptacles, and drinking fountain), basketball court improvements, parking lot improvements, and new concrete improvements within the main area of the park.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER DEMONSTRATION GARDEN PROJECT

Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project is nearing the end of the design phase, including the added ADA compliance improvements. The next steps will include the plan review process.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project will consist of designing and constructing a drought tolerant garden on the south side of the Carolyn Owens Community Center. The Demonstration Garden will

feature climate appropriate, drought-tolerant plantings and irrigation systems, along with identification signage, concrete walkways, walkway lighting, and park benches.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER PLAYGROUND AND ADA IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project is currently in the design phase.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project will consist of designing and installing a new tot lot playground adjacent to the future demonstration garden. The intended design for the future tot lot playground will be a nature-themed playground that will tie into the demonstration garden. Additional scope of work will include accessibility improvements to walkways on the east side of the facility. The tot lot and accessibility improvements project will coincide with the demonstration garden project to minimize disruption and avoid construction impacts on the property.

CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

- Staff reviewed the ADA Transition Plan to identify barriers that can be removed internally and is preparing to proceed with this work in January 2027.

Scope of Work:

- Improve interior accessibility by completing high priority items identified in the ADA Transition Plan and other related improvements.

SHADY GROVE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

- Design work continues with initial review of preliminary concept drawings anticipated to be complete end of summer 2026.

Scope of Work:

- Accessibility improvements and playground replacement.

HERITAGE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

- Design work continues with initial review of preliminary concept drawings anticipated to be completed at end of summer 2026.

Scope of Work:

- Work will include accessibility improvements, playground equipment, and pavilion replacements.

APOC BATTING CAGES NETTING REPLACEMENT

Project Status:

- Staff is in the process of awarding the contract.

Scope of Work:

- Remove and replace the existing netting inside the Batting Cages and around the batters' boxes.

PARK AND BUILDING MANAGEMENT

Grounds Division

- Installed new barbeque pit near the canopy at Villa Park.
- Installed a new tennis court net at Cypress Trails Park.
- Removed damaged barbecue pit at Heritage Park.
- Installed two new valves in turf area to increase irrigation coverage north of the playground at Liberty Park.
- Installed a new trash can at Oak Tree Square.

Building Management

Work Requests:

- Facilities Maintenance completed 90 work orders.

Notable Activities/Special Projects:

- Coordinated and repaired a leak in the air conditioning unit serving the auditorium at the 7th Street Theatre.
- Assisted contractor with a leak repair in the chiller servicing the Civic Center.
- Coordinated an electrical assessment at the Police Department.
