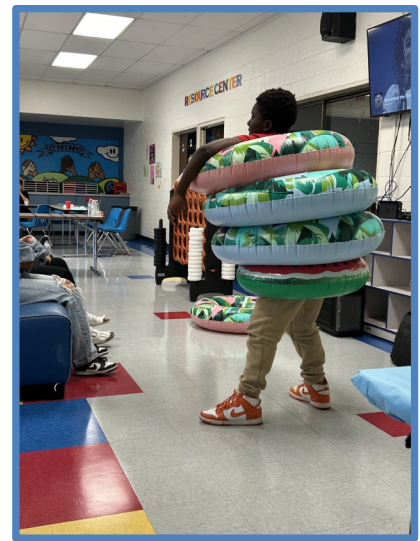
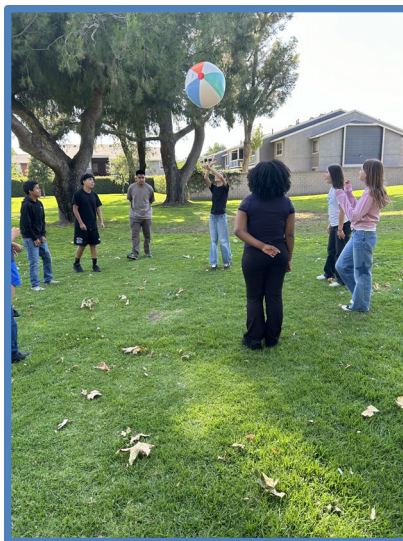
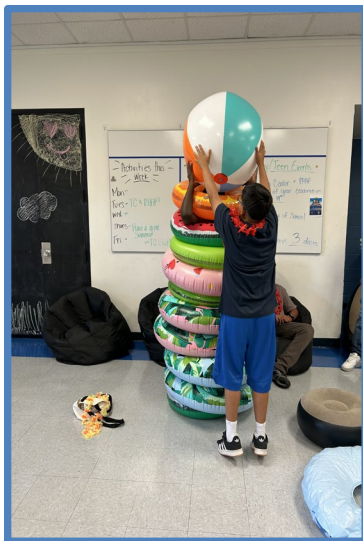

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- SOAR After School sites wrapped up the school year with Field Day activities and reflection projects highlighting the participants' favorite memories from the year.
- RAAP and Teen Center participants celebrated the end of the year at the Chino Experience Teen Center with team-building games, creative arts and crafts, and a festive meal featuring hot dogs and sweet treats.
- High Five After School program will complete the 2025-2026 school year on June 30. Junior High track completed school on May 21, with the traditional school year.



CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

First Friday CYM Lab

- Fifty-six participants attended First Friday CYM Lab Water Edition on May 1, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM water maze experiment and the participants explored the interactive exhibits.
- First Friday is sponsored by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Barnyard Bingo Bash

- The Chino Youth Museum hosted the Barnyard Bingo Bash fundraiser on May 18. The event sold out. Two hundred and twenty-five participants played Bingo, participated in raffles, and won Bingo payouts.
- The event raised \$14,607.48 after expenses.

Taco Fest Partnership Fundraiser

- The Chino Valley Masonic Lodge held its annual Taco Fest Fundraiser on May 30, featuring fish, shrimp, and carne asado tacos for \$5 each.
- All proceeds will benefit the Chino Youth Museum and Chino Valley Unified School District's HOPE Family Resource Center programs. The donation will come in June and the amount is pending.
- Thirty-six participants visited the Chino Youth Museum and HOPE Outreach booth.

Around the World with Crafts Program

- Thirty-five children and family members participated in the weekly program on Wednesdays.
- The program ties in crafts from around the world to cultures in the Chino community.
- Families are guided through a different culture each month. May featured crafts from France. Children made Eiffel Towers, clay croissant ants, lavender scented sensory art, and hot air balloons.

Letter Learners Program

- Thirty children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a "get your wiggles out" activity and guided them in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, storytelling, and exploring the lowercase letters "H-K."

Memberships

- Five family membership packages were sold.

Parties

- One private birthday party was booked with 43 guests in attendance.
- All party guests explored the Museum's exhibits and played activities.
- Staff led a birthday party scavenger hunt and awarded prizes.
- The party host received \$150 worth of free child admission day passes for future use as part of the party packages.

Tours

- Three private tours were booked by Foothill Elementary School, Creek View Elementary School, and Pomona Valley Unified School District. Thirty-five adults and eighty-four children attended.
- Staff led each group on an educational historical tour through the Museum, guided children in making butter or community helper crafts, and encouraged all guests to play and explore the eight hands-on exhibits that resemble a small town.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS**Family Counseling**

- Human Services provided counseling services to 77 participants for a total of 255 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 25 participants for a total of 81 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 15 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 690.25 hours.

Proclamation

- On May 5, the City Council proclaimed May as National Mental Health Awareness Month. The proclamation was accepted by the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). The community was reminded of the importance of taking care of their mental health by asking for help as needed.

School-Based Counseling

- Counselors concluded counseling services at the school sites May 21, however, school-based counseling services are being offered through June 26, via telehealth or in-person at Chino Human Services.
- Counselors informed all parents of current clients or recently submitted counseling referrals of the opportunity to access counseling services during the summer at Carolyn Owens Community Center for a low-to-no-cost fee based on eligibility.
- The Lead Counselor at Howard Cattle Elementary School attended Open House to share about agency services over the summer and inform interested families how to sign up for services for the next school year.

End-of-the-Year

- The Human Services Coordinator conducted end-of-the-year evaluations with Counseling staff members. This was a great opportunity for the Counselors to discuss their experiences at different school sites.
- Human Services also hosted an end-of-the-year Luau to celebrate the year's accomplished goals and experiences from serving the community. The team played games, enjoyed lunch and homemade dessert.



Internships

- Human Services conducted interviews for BA Interns to start summer internships.
- BA interns are college students typically pursuing their bachelor's degree in social work or an equivalent field. They assist in a variety of ways, such as file destruction, updating the resource directory, and shadowing Case Managers.

HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team, made up of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator, alongside the Chino Police Department's Quality-of-Life Team, continues to provide vital support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The team connects people with services, such

as rehabilitation programs, transitional or permanent housing, and family reunification, while creating personalized case plans to help them achieve stable housing.

- During this period, the team served 15 returning clients and 10 new clients, providing 50 units of service.

Success Stories

- A 38-year-old individual was connected to the Homeless Outreach Team near Central Avenue and Philadelphia Street. He needed county jail release documentation to reinstate his SSDI benefits after losing income following his father's passing. The team provided transportation to obtain the documents, confirmed housing with family in Redding, and purchased a bus ticket. The individual returned to Redding and reunited with his family.



GIVEAWAY EVENTS

Back-to-School Event

- Planning for the Back-to-School event, scheduled for Saturday, July 25, continues to receive sponsors and supply donations. Vendors have been secured, including Vibe Barber, a fan favorite from last year providing the coolest haircuts around. Event flyers, posters, and social media posts have published the event registration dates, Thursday, June 18, from 12:00-5:30 p.m., and Friday, June 19, from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. This event plans to provide 500 backpacks with school supplies for CVUSD students, Transitional Kindergarten through 12th grade who are most in need. With so many generous sponsors, the most vulnerable families will receive a \$50 gift card for groceries from Northgate.
- CVUSD purchased pre-packed school supply kits with grade specific supplies. This helps ensure all items needed are supplied for each child.
- School supply donation drives are being scheduled with faith-based partners and local organizations. Chino Cares Challenge will conduct a supply drive from July 1-13.

**HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)****Case Management**

- HOPE enrolled 33 new families who received Case Management support for rent and utility assistance, emergency food assistance, and social service applications.
- Case Managers attended Coordinated Entry System (CES) to advocate for two McKinney-Vento families in hope of securing rapid rehousing funds. Both families were successful in achieving the placement. CES is the gateway to transitional and permanent supportive housing programs.
- The HOPE Program was invited to return to the 100 Women Who Care event to share how the donated funds were used. The program received \$8,900 from the previous fundraiser. The funds were used to purchase Chromebooks for EXCEL participants to use during workshops that focus on resume building, college applications, and financial aid applications. Funds were also used to purchase clothing from JCPenney to add to the CARE Closet. Many families that are facing financial hardship do not have the opportunity to purchase new clothing.
- Country Springs Elementary School organized a school talent show and gave participating students the opportunity to choose a charitable organization to receive the event proceeds. The students selected the HOPE Program, and all ticket sales were donated to support its mission. A total of \$850 was raised and donated in the form of grocery gift cards.

EXCEL (Experience in Career, Education, and Leadership)

- The EXCEL Program for the 2025-2026 school year concluded with an end-of-year field trip to Main Event, where they participated in laser tag, bowling, and various arcade games that promoted critical thinking, problem-solving, and social engagement skills. Additionally, the Case Manager reviewed the upcoming workshop schedule for the next school year with the students and confirmed their attendance.



TYKES

- The TYKES program provided 175 services to 65 families with children 0 to 5 years old.
- Two new clients began the Parents as Teachers (PAT) program. The PAT program currently has six active clients. Year-to-date, the program has 20 families enrolled.
- The Outreach Specialist hosted a table at 11 events leading to 771 service contacts promoting Case Management support services and early childhood related resources.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists finalized all sessions with the end of the school year on May 21. Monthly evaluations were sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B Counselors to share student progress.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

- Participants were shuttled to Colinas Ridge Trail in Laguna Niguel. This was a four-mile hike and was classified as moderate intensity. After the hike, participants enjoyed a healthy snack.



Garden Workshop

- The Community Garden Workshop took place on May 16. This month's topic was "Attracting Pollinators to Your Garden." The workshop was hosted by San Bernardino County Master Gardener, Esther Martinez. Participants learned about preparing a seed-starting mix to help seeds grow.

Children's Discovery Workshop

- The Children's Discovery Workshop took place on May 16. The topic was "Bug-tastic Spring Ladybugs." Participants learned facts about ladybugs and made a craft. Staff led participants on a garden tour, where they had the chance to learn about the various plants and vegetables growing in the plots.

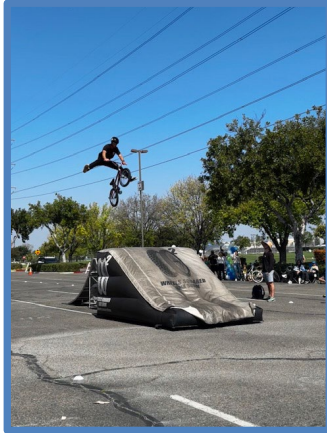


Outreach

NEIGHBORHOOD ACTIVITY CENTER (NAC)

Case Management

- Ongoing Case Management services were provided to individuals on both active and newly identified caseloads. Services included assistance with medical benefit applications, employment searches, job application support, and linkage to essential community resources to promote stability and self-sufficiency.
- The Case Manager secured approval for the Emergency Utility Assistance Program for two households experiencing significant financial hardship, including one client impacted by post-surgery disability benefit exhaustion and another client affected by job loss. Additionally, four households were approved for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program due to circumstances including administrative errors impacting benefits, loss of household income due to roommate departure, nonpayment of court-ordered support, and medical-related loss of income resulting in rental arrears and housing instability. All approved assistance cases underwent comprehensive eligibility review and sustainability assessments to ensure program requirements were met. The Case Manager continues to provide ongoing support to families approved for emergency assistance program.

NAC Enrichment Classes

- The enrichment class was cancelled due to low enrollment.

CHINO EXPERIENCE TEEN CENTER

Chino Experience Teen Center/Teen Programs Activities

- The Before and After School shuttling services continued for students attending Chino High School, Don Lugo High School, Magnolia Jr. High School, Ramona Jr. High School, and 7th and 8th graders enrolled at Briggs Fundamental.
- RAAP participants were invited to visit the Chino Teen Experience on May 19. They enjoyed an end-of-the-school-year barbecue with hot dogs, snacks, ice cream, and participated in fun activities.

Teen Opportunity Program (TOP)

- The TOP meeting was conducted on May 7, at the Neighborhood Activity Center. There were 17 members in attendance. Members had the opportunity to sign up for Summer Camp, Summer Movie Nights, and the Fireworks Spectacular.

Teen Advisory Committee (TAC)

- The final TAC meeting was conducted on May 7, at the Neighborhood Activity Center. There were five members in attendance. Members discussed their summer and graduation plans.
- On May 5, TAC members were recognized at the City Council meeting for their dedication and hard work throughout the 2025-2026 term.
- On May 27, interviews were conducted for 2026-2027. Three new members were selected.



MONTE VISTA PARK

Splash Pad

- The Splash Pad began operation for the season on May 23.
- The Splash Pad is open to the public daily from May 23 through September 7, 11:00 a.m.-7:00 p.m. Days of operation will change to only Saturday and Sunday starting September 8 through October 25.

SUMMER LUNCH

Monte Vista Park

- The Free Summer Lunch Program started on May 26, and will run through August 7. There were 469 meals served at Monte Vista Park during this reporting period.

Liberty Park

- The Free Summer Lunch Program started on May 26, and will run through August 7. There were 200 meals served at Liberty Park during this reporting period.

OLD SCHOOLHOUSE MUSEUM

Exhibits

- The Museum had 36 visitors.
- Staff continued to prepare for the Hall of Fame display for Carolyn and Earl Owens. Staff reached out to family members for more information, pictures, and other memorabilia.
- The Old Schoolhouse Museum staff helped the Chino Valley Historical Society organize the Pioneer Picnic hosted on May 17. Staff supported the logistics, décor, and hosted an open house of the barn and museum on the day of the event.
- On May 19, the Owens family was recognized at the City Council meeting and received a framed Hall of Fame award.



PRESERVE COMMUNITY CENTER

Programs and Classes

- The Preserve Community Center assisted in hosting volleyball games for the Corporate Challenge on May 7.
- The Youth Sports program successfully concluded its Volleyball Clinic on May 16.

Teen Scene

- Teen Scene was held on May 7, 14, and 28, at the Homecoming Clubhouse, providing teens in the Preserve area with a safe and welcoming environment to build friendships, while developing culinary and life skills.

SENIOR CENTER

Transportation Services

- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program provided 499 transportation trips to 63 participants for different services that included the Senior Center for activities, doctor appointments, grocery stores, banks, and post office. There were three new participants.
- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program Breakfast Club took place on May 6, with 12 participants who enjoyed Las Brisas. Free transportation is provided to a local restaurant once a month.
- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on May 16, with a total of 25 participants.

Excursions, Trips and Tours

- Sixteen participants took a trip to the LA County Fair in Pomona. Participants enjoyed trying all the different foods, shopping, and visiting the farm animals.
- Thirty-five participants enjoyed a trip to the Getty Villa in Pacific Palisades. Participants explored the gardens, art exhibits, and enjoyed lunch in the cafe.
- Nineteen participants enjoyed a trip to the Morongo Casino in Cabazon. Participants enjoyed, table games, shopping, and great food.

Special Events

- The Senior Citizen's Club helped host a Mother's Day Tea. Refreshments were served, and corsages were given to all the mothers. The participants enjoyed a Mother's Day scavenger hunt. A total of 51 participants enjoyed the celebration.
- The Senior Citizen's Club hosted a musical performance by the Senior Chino Choir on May 15. Forty-eight participants enjoyed the performance.
- Fifty-one seniors attended the Cinco De Mayo Loteria event. They enjoyed an afternoon of games, snacks, and prizes.



Class Highlights

- Door Décor and More took place on May 18, with 13 participants. Participants made beach-theme candles to take home. Next month's theme is Red, White, and Blue, and will take place on June 29.

Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 16 participants for a total of 61 units of service. Staff worked with various participants for applications for utility and rental assistance. Direct services included low-income housing lists, Medi-Cal renewal applications, and Cal-Fresh renewal applications. In addition, 13 resources and referrals were provided to participants throughout the month.
- Success Story-The Aging Services Coordinator assisted a participant with completing an application for rental assistance through the City of Chino. This support included conducting a thorough assessment of the participant's financial and situational needs, gathering and verifying required documentation, and providing clear explanations of what the process looks like. The Aging Services Coordinator monitored the progress of the request to ensure timely resolution. The participant was approved for rental assistance, providing stability for participant.

Social Services

- On May 7 and 22, HICAP provided free information for Medicare. There were five participants.

- On May 13, the Department of Aging and Adult services distributed 80 bus passes to participants over the age of 60.
- On May 28, Feeding America distributed 225 boxes to participants.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On May 4, Elidia Diaz from West End Counseling provided a workshop on socialization and fraud awareness. There were 10 participants.
- On May 27, Valeria Camey from US Bank conducted a Lunch and Learn to talk about financial education. There were 23 participants.

RECREATION CLASSES / CONTRACT CLASSES

Class Highlights

- Folklórico hosted its end-of-season recital, featuring a vibrant two-hour performance that celebrated culture, tradition, and the dedication of its dancers.
- Karate has been a major success within the community, averaging 46 participants across seven classes and continuing to attract strong interest from students of all ages.
