VI. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

Chairperson Jerry opened the Public Communications.

Harvey Luth, Kiwanis Club of Chino President, thanked the Commission on behalf of Club members past and present for recognizing the Club as the California Park and Recreation Society-District 11 Community Champion Award recipients for 2025.

As there were no further requests to speak, Chairperson Jerry closed the Public Communications.

VII. ACTION ITEM

1. Naming Preserve Park Site:

Jeff Benson, Parks and Facilities Manager, reported Lewis Operating Corp. is currently developing a three-acre park within the Preserve community. The project site is located south of Pine Avenue, west of W. Preserve Loop, and north of Legacy Park Street. Key features of the park include a walking loop lined with Cherry trees, traditional Chinese garden, chess and game board area, fitness equipment, dog park, and tot lot. This park is part of a new development within the Preserve, and at this time there is no estimated start date for construction or an anticipated opening date.

Silvia Avalos, Director of Community Services, Parks & Recreation, reported the City received 17 nomination forms from community members. The name proposed by Lewis Operating Corp. for this park is Harmony Park. The name reflects the park's design and purpose. The Commission has the option to review the names as an entire body or can decide to refer the nominations to the Park Naming Sub-Committee for further evaluation. The review will ensure that the proposed names align with the City's park naming guidelines. The Sub-Committee can return with a recommendation to the full Commission at its July 27, 2026 meeting, and then forward the final recommendation to the City Council.

Jason Wong, Chino Preserve Development Corporation/LOC, stated the park name should reflect the unique character and purpose of each park, while contributing to the cohesive vision of the community as a whole. The guidelines describe formative parks as focal points for their neighborhoods and creates opportunities for social interaction. These also emphasize that each park should have its own unique form and character, while incorporating unifying design elements that knit the park together with the cohesive community. The name Harmony Park captures these qualities and provides the foundation for future neighborhood elements, including street names, landscaping features, and design details to reinforce the overall identity of the Preserve. Mr. Wong stated by selecting Harmony Park, the Commission will be choosing a name that aligns perfectly with the character and design of this neighborhood park.

Pat Loy, Vice President of Community Development, Lewis Operating Corp., was also present to answer any questions.

Chairperson Jerry noted another park name request received from Commissioner Robert Martinez via email, which is Dairymen Park. Chairperson Jerry asked that this name be added to the list of recommended park names, and read into the record the words on the application.

Vice Chairperson Arlt requested referring the nominations to the Park Naming Sub-Committee to allow the Sub-Committee to review all of the nominations to make sure they align with the Park Naming Guidelines and give them time to vet them thoroughly.

Moved by Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas, seconded by Commissioner Cooper, and carried on a 5-0-2-0 vote to approve that the Park Naming Sub-Committee review the nominations and provide a recommendation to the full Commission at its July 27, 2026 meeting.

VIII. INFORMATION

1. Homeless Outreach Program:

Jose Soto, Homeless Outreach Coordinator, gave the report. Mr. Soto reported on the homeless outreach referral process; San Bernardino County Point-in-Time Homeless Count 2026; challenges causing barriers to accepting services and overcoming these barriers; collaboration with San Bernardino County, which includes Resource Day and Countywide Homeless Outreach; and the West End Navigation Center, which is expected to open in Fontana in the summer of 2027.

2. Back-to-School Giveaway:

Kari Franco, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Supervisor, gave the report. Ms. Franco reported on the 2025 Back-to-School Giveaway and the 2026 Back-to-School Giveaway, which will be held on July 25, at the Community Building. Five hundred backpacks will be distributed. There will be raffle prizes, junior high and high school students registered will receive JanSport backpacks, and 225 families will receive \$50 gift cards for groceries at Northgate Market. There are 23 vendors scheduled to participate in the event to provide free health screenings, essential resources, educational information, and family support services. Students will have access to blood pressure and blood sugar screenings, developmental screenings, sensory activity tables, lip balm and sunscreen giveaways, WIC resources, and information from the YMCA on youth and family programs. Vibe and Snips Barbershops will be returning to provide free haircuts. Ms. Franco invited the Commission to attend the event between 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

3. HOPE and McKinney-Vento:

Kari Franco, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Supervisor, gave the report. Ms. Franco reported the HOPE team is a partnership between the City of Chino and Chino Valley Unified School District to combine resources to better support Chino Valley families. This collaboration provides coordinated services and

advocacy so families do not have to navigate those complex systems alone. The HOPE umbrella consists of several key programs, including family resource centers, McKinney-Vento CARE services, TYKES Case Management, EXCEL mentorship program, and Community CARE Closet. Together, these programs provide comprehensive wrap around support for families with young children ages 0-5, as well as families with school-aged children enrolled in the Chino Valley Unified School District.

Stubby Barr spoke regarding the growth of these programs, and how they have spread throughout the community is what community service is all about.

Ms. Adams provided a brief update on current and upcoming Community Services, Parks & Recreation events and summer programs, which included the Fireworks Spectacular on June 26 and 27, July is Parks and Recreation Month Proclamation on July 7, Seniors at the Square beginning on July 6, Family Campout on July 11 and 12, Community Garden 10th Anniversary Celebration on July 18, Back-to-School Giveaway on July 25, Summer Movie Nights began on June 12, Splash Pad remains open daily through Labor Day, Summer Lunch is currently in its 5th week at Liberty and Monte Vista Parks, and Summer Camp continues at Monte Vista Park and CrossPoint Church.

BACKGROUND

The City's park naming guidelines provide several steps during the process. First, a list of potential park names is compiled from suggestions submitted by the public, City staff, and the developer. The suggestions are then forwarded to the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission for review. The Commission has the option to review the names as an entire body or through a Sub-Committee prior to making a final recommendation to the full Commission. The Commission's final recommendation is then forwarded to the City Council for final adoption. The park naming guidelines allow a park or facility to be named after an individual, living or deceased, who has provided a significant contribution to the development or improvement of the quality of life in the City (i.e. Ruben S. Ayala Park, Fred Aguiar Square, Carolyn Owens Centennial Square). Further, the park sites can be based on themes that characterize the individual park sites, such as neighborhood street names or significant site landmarks (i.e. Liberty Park, Walnut Park, Mountain View Park).

The development of The Preserve area includes the construction of a park required by the development agreement with Lewis Operating Company (LOC). As conditioned by the Preserve Development Agreement, the developer is required to design and construct a park in lieu of paying development impact fees for these facilities.

Unlike other City park development projects, the park sites in The Preserve are designed and constructed prior to residents moving into the neighborhoods adjoining the proposed park sites. In those cases, the parks are being constructed prior to or during construction of the adjacent tracts in order to have the parks

completed when the model homes open to the public. As part of the design process, the developer selects park names that coincide with the housing tract development as part of their desire to develop inclusive communities.

ISSUES/ANALYSIS

Lewis Operating Company (LOC) is currently developing a three-acre public park within The Preserve community. The project site is located south of Pine Avenue, west of W. Preserve Loop, and north of Legacy Park Street.

The park design emphasizes balance, connection, and a strong sense of place through a variety of active and passive recreational amenities. Key features of the park include a walking loop lined with Cherry trees, a traditional Chinese garden, a chess and board game area, fitness equipment, dog park, and tot lot for young children. This park is part of a new development called Block 1 at The Preserve, and at this time, there is no estimated start date for construction or an anticipated opening date for the park. The timing of the construction of the park will be largely driven by the pace of sales within the community. As development progresses and additional information becomes available, staff will share updates regarding the project schedule.

At the June 22, 2026, staff presented to the Commission the 18 park names proposed by community members. The names proposed were:

18. The Heart of Cherry Blossoms Park

The Commission referred the park name nominations to the Park Naming Sub-Committee for further evaluation and recommendation. The Sub-Committee was directed to return its recommendation to the full Commission at its July 27, 2026, meeting. At which time, the Commission will consider the recommendation and make its final recommendation to the City Council for approval.

The Park Naming Sub-Committee met on June 2, 2026, and is comprised of Chairperson Jerry and Commissioners Cooper and Montenegro-Olivas. Following its review, the Sub-Committee determined that given the park's size and planned amenities, naming the park after an individual community member was not the most appropriate option. Instead, the Sub-Committee concluded that commemorating a community member would be better suited for a larger community park where the park's theme, amenities, and interpretive elements could be thoughtfully designed to honor the individual's legacy and showcase their contributions to Chino.

After evaluating the name suggestions, the Sub-Committee identified three names that best aligned with the park's overall theme and design: Harmony Park, Preserve Harmony Park, and Cherry Blossom Park. Following careful consideration, the Sub-Committee is recommending Harmony Park as the preferred name, finding that it best reflects the park's character and intended purpose. The park's strolling loop, lined with Cherry trees, promotes peaceful movement and reflection, while the semi-enclosed Chinese garden, arbor, fitness nodes, and gathering spaces encourage social interaction and community engagement. At the same time, amenities such as the dog park, tot lot, and open lawn areas provide opportunities for users of all ages and interests, creating a balanced environment that seamlessly integrates active and passive recreation.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the name Harmony Park and forward the recommendation to the City Council for adoption.

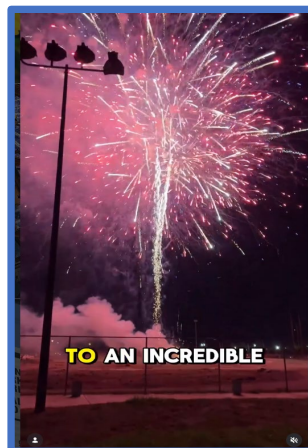

SUMMER CAMP

- Summer Camp began on June 1, and will run through July 31, at CrossPoint Church and Monte Vista Park.
- On June 3, Campers enjoyed a show by Thor's Reptile Family at Monte Vista Park. Participants from both Camp sites learned about various reptiles and had the opportunity for up-close interactions with these fascinating creatures.
- On June 10, participants went on a field trip to Lucky Art Crayonology, where they learned how to make their own crayons and markers. Everyone received a keychain to take home along with the items they created during the visit.
- On June 17, Nitro STEM Lab visited Monte Vista Park for an exciting STEM science show and a slime workshop. Participants from both Camps enjoyed watching dry ice experiments and made their own slime to take home.



CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

First Friday CYM Lab

- Eighty-five participants attended First Friday CYM Lab Water Edition on June 5, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM color separation magic experiment and participants explored the interactive exhibits.
- First Friday is sponsored by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Around the World with Crafts Program

- Twenty-eight children and family members participated in the weekly program on Wednesdays at 11:00 a.m.
- The program ties in crafts from around the world to cultures in the Chino community.
- Families are guided through a different culture each month. June featured crafts from Cuba. Children made Cuban pom-pom flags, palm trees, Caribbean fish, and dance ribbons.
- Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.



Letter Learners Program

- Eighteen children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays at 10:30 a.m.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided them in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, storytelling, and exploring the lowercase letters “L-O.”
- Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.

Summer Program Beat the Heat

- Twenty-four children and family members enjoyed summer games and cool activities every Thursday from 1:00-1:45 p.m. The program featured activities, such as sand clay, melting ice, and splash potato. A minimal fee applies from \$4 to \$6.

Summer Program Dr. Moo’s Silly Science

- Fifty-six children and family members experimented with exciting science-themed activities every Friday from 1:00-1:45 p.m. The program featured activities, such as exploding soda, s’mores, and elephant toothpaste. A minimal fee applies from \$4 to \$6.

New De Colores Program Partnership

- Forty-eight children and family members participated in the new inclusive interactive program designed for children ages 0-5 on Saturdays at 1:00 p.m.
- Chino families enjoy a lively mix of story time, music, movement, and arts and crafts designed to spark creativity and strengthen the bond between parents and little ones.
- The program features special guests: Lola, a lovable, neurodivergent puppet mascot, and her friend the Toucan.
- De Colores is a collaboration between the Chino Youth Museum and the dA Center for the Arts in Pomona. Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.

Memberships

- Four family membership packages were sold.

Parties

- One private birthday party was booked with 23 guests.
- All party guests explored the Museum's exhibits and played activities.
- Staff led a birthday party scavenger hunt and awarded prizes.
- The party host received \$150 worth of free child admission day passes for future use as part of the party package.

Tours

- Two private tours were booked by the CSPR Tiny Tots program. Twenty adults and sixty-one children attended.
- Staff led each group on an educational historical tour through the Museum, and encouraged guests to play and explore the eight hands-on exhibits that resemble a small town.

Bunco

- The Chino Youth Museum hosted a Bunco fundraiser on June 9. Sixty-two participants played Bunco, enjoyed raffles and finger foods, and won prizes.
- The event raised \$1,500 after expenses.

New Aqua Mirror Live

- New this summer is the Aqua Mirror Live, an interactive exhibit that magically transforms reflections into a fluid tableau, revealing in a dramatic and fun manner that the human body is 60% water. With assistance from staff in Public Works, Water and Environmental Division, funding for the Aqua Mirror was provided through the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) for water use efficiency programs.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS

Family Counseling

- Human Services provided counseling services to 75 participants for a total of 292 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 30 participants for a total of 121 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 15 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 590.5 hours.

End of Year

- As the school year ended, interviews were conducted with each Counselor to review the past school year and discuss challenges that came up during the year.
- Exit interviews were conducted with outgoing Counselors as many graduated and moved on to begin their full-time careers as Counselors.
- Lead Counselors and Volunteer Trainees are being assigned to their school sites for the 2026-27 school year.
- Nine new trainees have been selected to begin their training at the end of July to begin providing services in August.

HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team, made up of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator, alongside the Chino Police Department's Quality-of-Life Team, continues to provide vital support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The team connects people with services, such as rehabilitation programs, transitional or permanent housing, and family reunification, while creating personalized case plans to help them achieve stable housing.
- The Chino Homeless Outreach Team met with the Upland and Montclair Outreach Teams to coordinate planning for an upcoming Resource Day. Additionally, the Homeless Outreach program welcomed a summer intern seeking his bachelor's degree in social work. He assists the team on Thursdays by updating homeless resource files, while learning about the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness.
- The team served 17 returning clients and 25 new clients to provide a total of 79 service units.



Success Stories

- A 47-year-old female was connected to the Homeless Outreach Team outside the Chino Police Department. She shared that she wanted to enter detox and inpatient treatment due to alcohol addiction. The Homeless Outreach Team coordinated a 14-day detox admission at Martin Luther King (MLK) Hospital with plans for a 60-day inpatient program and provided transportation to the hospital. The team remained with her until her intake assessment was completed.

GIVEAWAY EVENTS

Back-to-School Giveaway Event

- The Back-to-School Giveaway event completed in-person registration with 229 students registered. The event accepts 500 students. Families can continue to register through HOPE Case Managers and Neighborhood Activity Center Case Manager. Vendor recruitment has completed with a variety of organizations along with local barbers providing haircuts for students. Supplies continue to be collected, sorted, and placed in backpacks.
- School supply donation drives were scheduled with faith-based partners and local organizations. Chino Cares Challenge conducted a supplies drive from June 1-13.

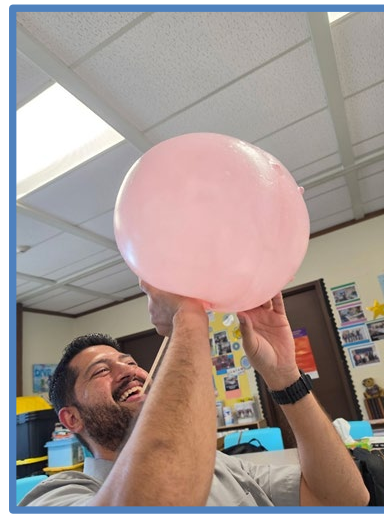

HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- HOPE staff enrolled ten new families and continued services with 39 families resulting in a total of 163 units of services in the form of application assistance, food assistance, clothing, emergency hygiene supplies, connection to childcare, and referrals to the Back-to-School Giveaway.
- Every June, the team closes out the fiscal year by informing families of summer activities, resources, and invites them to re-enroll in July.
- Case Managers assisted with the Back-to-School Giveaway registration and will continue to register students for the event during the reenrollment period in the upcoming months.
- This year, Case Managers focused efforts on 29 most vulnerable families living in motels or vehicles and helping 15 secure housing. The HOPE team gained access to the County Housing System (HMIS), participated in Coordinated Entry case conferencing to advocate for rapid rehousing opportunities, and partnered with Foothill Family Shelter to expand housing access.
- The HOPE program was invited to St. Paul the Apostle Walking with Moms in Need to celebrate their one-year anniversary. This organization supports families from pregnancy through the first few years by providing all items needed for mom and baby to thrive, including parenting classes.

- The HOPE Team, Neighborhood Activity Center Case Manager, Homeless Outreach Team, and Senior Center Aging Services Coordinator participated in a staff retreat. The retreat focused on program information, team building activities, and appreciation for the amazing impact they all had on Chino Valley families this year. An activity at the retreat helped show how collaborations between all local programs from a variety of agencies expand the positive impact for families even further. Staff was given a program title and while an actual client's journey was read aloud, a section of the yarn was handed off showing the connection between the programs and building a safety net to catch the family from falling.



EXCEL (Experience in Career, Education, and Leadership)

- The EXCEL Program for the 2026-27 school year will begin promoting in July during intake when families enroll in the program.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet served 32 individuals. Services included distribution of 6 emergency hygiene bags and 11 children receiving clothing.
- US Bank continued to support the Closet with 25 volunteer hours, and Chino Neighborhood House donated school supplies.
- The Closet is preparing for Back-to-School Giveaway backpacks and supply donations.

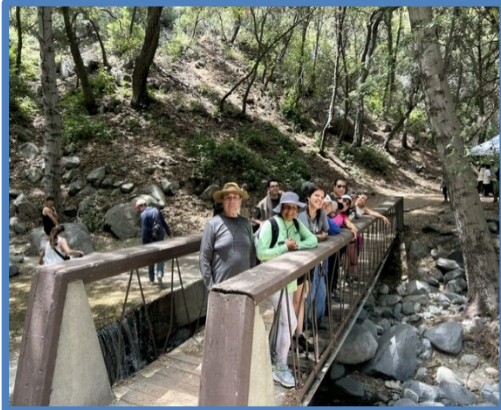
TYKES

- The TYKES program provided a total of 143 services to 52 families with a child 0 to 5 years old.
- Five clients completed the Parents as Teachers program. Year-to-date, the program enrolled 20 families with 16 completing the program.
- The Outreach Specialist hosted a table at 4 events for 329 service contacts promoting Case Management support services and early childhood related resources.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS has concluded for the school year and will resume in August with the traditional Chino Valley Unified School District schedule.

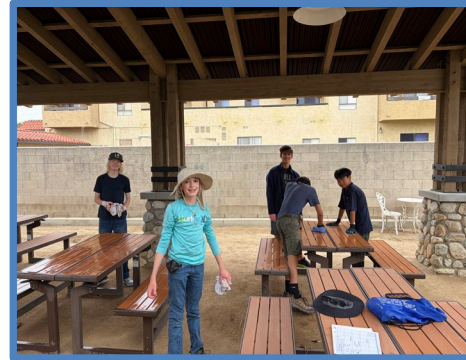
Healthy Grilling

- The summer season started on June 23, at Ayala Park.

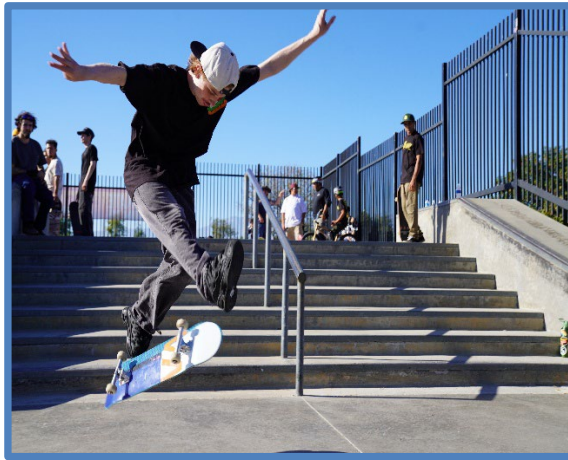
Men's Basketball

- The Harrah's Casino trip took place on June 20, with 18 participants.

Senior Prom

- The first Senior Prom welcomed 56 seniors for a lively and memorable afternoon. Guests enjoyed a variety of activities, including dancing, professional prom photos, a light lunch, karaoke, fresh corsages and boutonnieres, fresh popcorn, and assorted desserts. A Prom King and Queen were crowned as part of the celebration.



Father's Day Barbecue

- Thirty-eight seniors attended the Father's Day BBQ event. Participants enjoyed an afternoon of carne asada tacos with all the fixings, a cornhole competition, and prizes. This event was made possible due to the generous sponsorships from Hottinger Family Meats, Aqua Ridge Senior Living, and Magnolia Foods.



Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 37 participants for a total of 81 units of service. She worked with various participants on applications for utility and rental assistance. Direct services included low-income housing lists, Medi-Cal renewal applications, and Cal-Fresh renewal applications. The Aging Services Coordinator also worked on closing client files for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. In addition, 32 resources and referrals were provided to participants throughout the month.

Success Story

- The Aging Services Coordinator assisted a participant in creating and setting up a Social Security account, as the participant had trouble navigating the Social Security website and completing the account registration process. As the participant was approaching age 65, they also sought out information regarding Medicare eligibility and enrollment options. The Aging Services Coordinator successfully scheduled a Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) appointment, during which the participant

met with a representative who provided guidance on Medicare and assisted them in understanding and navigating the enrollment process.

Social Services

- On June 4 and 18, HICAP provided free information on Medicare. There were 5 participants.
- On June 10, the Department of Aging and Adult Services distributed 82 bus passes to participants over the age of 60.
- On June 25, Feeding America distributed 225 boxes of food to participants.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On June 24, Valeria Camey from US Bank conducted a Lunch and Learn to talk about financial education. There were 21 participants.
- The Aging Services Coordinator was able to help one participant for the P.A.T.C.H. program to obtain their prescription.
- On June 25, the Aging Services Coordinator attended the annual Senior Symposium for the County of Riverside. The Aging Services Coordinator was able to gain valuable knowledge on reporting elder abuse, met new peers, and discovered a variety of helpful resources to better support participants.

Class Highlights

- Fun with Science made its return with a two-day session filled with exciting science activities, drawing 20 enrolled students eager to explore and learn.
- Young Rembrandts held a fun-filled summer session focused on drawing and creativity, with 10 participants enjoying the program.
- Ontario Ice Skating classes remained a popular summer activity, averaging approximately 27 participants throughout the season.



TINY TOTS

Tiny Tots

- Tiny tots celebrated the end of the school year with a visit to the Chino Youth Museum on June 8 and 9, where they enjoyed interactive, hands-on exhibits designed to resemble a small town.
- Thirty-eight Tiny Tots participated in the Tiny Tots Graduation Ceremony on June 12. The celebration honored participants who completed the program and will be attending transitional kindergarten (TK) or kindergarten this fall.

PROJECTS UPDATE

**PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES CITY YARD–ADMINISTRATIVE BUILDING CARPET
REPLACEMENT PROJECT**

Project Status:

- The project commenced on June 12, and completed on June 27, 2026. All primary flooring construction activities were completed over three consecutive weekends.

Scope of Work:

- The project included removing existing carpet tiles and rubber wall base in identified areas of the Public Works Services Administrative Building and installing new 24"x24" carpet tiles and rubber wall base. Additional work included lifting furniture in place and performing standard floor preparation with additional preparation in areas where the concrete slab was uneven.

WALNUT PARK–RESTROOMS INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- The project was successfully completed as scheduled on June 27, 2026.

Scope of Work:

- The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project provides accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building. Work included replacing restroom fixtures, repainting the interior, installing prefabricated partitions, upgrading to LED lighting, and applying an epoxy floor coating.

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to coordinate the plans and bid packages, and schedule the timing of construction.

- The scope of work has expanded to include renovation of the basketball court and remaining hardscape areas adjacent to the basketball court for an overall cohesive improvement project.

Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will include professional design services to prepare plans and construction documents for the removal of existing playground equipment and rubber/sand surfacing, and installation of new all-inclusive playground equipment, continuous rubberized play surfacing, shade sail system, new picnic shade shelter, new site furnishings (including tables, benches, trash receptacles, and drinking fountain), basketball court improvements, parking lot improvements, and new concrete improvements within the main area of the park.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER DEMONSTRATION GARDEN PROJECT

Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project is nearing the end of the design phase, including the recently added ADA compliance improvements. The next steps will include the plan review process.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project will consist of designing and constructing a drought tolerant garden on the south side of the Carolyn Owens Community Center. The Demonstration Garden will feature climate appropriate, drought-tolerant plantings and irrigation systems, along with identification signage, concrete walkways, walkway lighting, and park benches.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER PLAYGROUND AND ADA IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project is currently in the design phase.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project will consist of designing and installing a new tot lot playground adjacent to the future demonstration garden. The intended design for the future tot lot playground will be a nature-themed playground that will tie into the demonstration garden. Additional scope of work will include accessibility improvements to walkways on the east side of the facility. The tot lot and accessibility improvements project will coincide with the demonstration garden project to minimize disruption and avoid construction impacts on the property.

CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

- Staff reviewed the ADA Transition Plan to identify barriers that can be removed internally and is preparing to proceed with this work.

Scope of Work:

- Improve interior accessibility by completing high priority items identified in the ADA Transition Plan and other related improvements.

SHADY GROVE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

- Design work continues with initial review of preliminary concept drawings anticipated to begin in summer 2026.

Scope of Work:

- Accessibility improvements and playground replacement.
