**VI. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS**

Chairperson Jerry opened the Public Communications. As there were no requests to speak, Chairperson Jerry closed the Public Communications.

**VII. TEEN ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT**

Kathleen Chang, TAC Secretary, gave the report. Ms. Chang reported TAC members volunteered at the Chino Valley Youth Track and Field Meet, enrichment classes, and Pee Wee Sports. TAC members are also volunteering at upcoming events, including Healthy Family Day, CHINO Days, and Teen Glow Night. TAC is currently working to promote the TAC application process. At their last meeting, TAC members discussed upcoming events, final details for Teen Glow Night, and teen excursions, such as

Teens Night Outs at Huntington Beach and Knott's Soak City. Ms. Chang reported TAC members will be attending the Teen Leadership Summit in Ontario at the DeAnza Community and Teen Center. There will be guest speakers, workshops, and opportunities to collaborate with other teens.

The next Teen Advisory Committee meeting will be held on April 2, at 6:00 p.m. The location has not been determined yet.

## VIII. INFORMATION

### 1. Healthy Chino:

Rachel Phelps, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Phelps reported on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Healthier You Challenge Department Showdown, which is an employee challenge that encourages participants to establish healthy habits; Healthy Family Day; Chino Bike Day; Healthy Grilling; Storytime in the Garden; and Chino Community Garden 10-Year Celebration. Healthy Chino hosted several outreach booths at City events, which included the Halloween Spooktacular, Lunar New Year Celebration, as well as partner events such as Heritage Farmers Market, Senior Health Fair, and Great American Smokeout.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Chino hosts three coalition meetings annually and sends out a monthly e-newsletter with upcoming events, programs, workshops, and other healthy information highlighting Garden Workshops, Children's Discovery Workshops, and Hike the Valley programs that are offered throughout the year.

### 2. Chino Youth Museum:

Dane D'Antuono, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. D'Antuono reported the Chino Youth Museum has been a staple in the community for 26 years. The Museum opened its doors in December 1999 to a diverse public with a mission of bridging the past, present, and future together with fun, educational, and interactive exhibits, special events, and programs. The Museum offers guests a glimpse into Chino's rich history through eight hands-on interactive exhibits set up like a small town; 1,478 guests participated in the new Around the World program. The Museum hosted five special events along with participating in the Inclusion Community Celebration.

Ms. D'Antuono reported that last year, 752 children and educators from 13 schools from Chino Unified School District and as far away as Riverside enjoyed private tours. Birthday party reservations were offered with 403 party guests celebrating their special day at the Museum. There were 70 memberships sold totaling 256 new participants taking advantage of having unlimited visits to the Museum for an entire year by purchasing various membership packages.

Ms. D'Antuono reported with the support of generous sponsors and individual community support, the Museum held six fundraisers. The most recent was the DairyAire 5K and Fairytale Fun Run on March 7; 490 participants ran in this year's run. Two new partnerships were formed and one partnership is on-going. One of those partnerships included Chino's Green Team. Together, funding was secured from the Inland Empire Utilities Agency to renovate the water exhibit, which now includes three cartoon interactive touch screens to teach families about water conservation. A continued collaboration with the Teen Advisory Committee has

resulted in an expanded Santa's Village Polar Express train exhibit during the holidays. The Museum was awarded a \$3,000 grant from the Metropolitan Water District for First Friday CYM Lab, which made it possible to transform the science-based program into a water experiment focused on the value of water in Southern California.

Ms. D'Antuono reported on upcoming events that included the Easter Bunny Extravaganza and the first water edition Arbor Day Celebration.

### 1. Selection of the California Park & Recreation Society (CPRS) Community Champions for 2025:

Ted Bistarkey, Deputy Director of Community Services, Parks & Recreation, gave the report. Mr. Bistarkey reported it's that time of year when the Commission selects Community Champion Award winners to be honored at the California Park & Recreation Society (CPRS) District 11 Annual Awards and Installation Banquet. The event highlights individuals or groups from numerous cities within the district and recognizes them for their contribution to the park and recreation field. This year's event will be held on April 23, at the Jessie Turner Health and Community Center in Fontana. Staff is recommending nominees from the list included in the staff report for this year's award considerations. Any additional nominations for the 2025 Community Champions will be accepted before the final vote.

Chairperson Jerry asked each Commissioner to complete their votes for two recipients and return the vote sheets to staff, who will tabulate and announce the votes of each Commissioner.

After the votes were tabulated, the results were as follows:

- Carol Isaia-Montoya – 2 votes (Commissioners Arlt and Montenegro-Olivas).
- Mary Harshfield – 2 votes (Commissioners Arlt and Takeuchi).
- Courtney Garcia – 3 votes (Commissioners Aviles, Martinez, and Cooper).
- Flor Hernandez – 4 votes (Commissioners Aviles, Jerry, Cooper, and Montenegro-Olivas).
- Kiwanis Club of Chino – 3 votes (Commissioners Jerry, Martinez, and Takeuchi).

In response to a tie breaker between Courtney Garcia and the Kiwanis Club of Chino, Commissioner Martinez stated the Kiwanis Club has done so much and when the City needs anything, they are always there in service or donations.

Commissioner Takeuchi stated both Courtney Garcia and the Kiwanis Club are very deserving, but the Kiwanis Club has supported the community for many, many years and should finally receive the recognition.

After discussion, the Commissioners selected the Kiwanis Club of Chino as their second recipient.

**BACKGROUND**

Chino Municipal Code 8.12 designates the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission with the oversight of the sale and use of fireworks in Chino. For several years, the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee has assisted staff with the process of reviewing applications, addressing specific concerns related to fireworks, and making recommendations to improve the process. The Fireworks Review Sub-Committee this year is comprised of Chairperson Jerry and Commissioners Aviles and Takeuchi.

**ISSUES/ANALYSIS**

**Fireworks Retail Permits** - Per Chino Municipal Code 8.12.030 (E), Fireworks Retail Permit holders from the previous year have priority status to receive a retail permit for the current year provided they continue to meet the requirements to sell fireworks.

Each applicant must meet the following criteria to receive a Fireworks Retail Permit:

1. Must be a non-profit organization established for at least one year.
2. Meeting location must be within the Chino city limits.
3. Membership of at least 20 members with 50% plus one of its members living or working within the Chino city limits.
4. Must have permission from the property owner to sell fireworks on the property designated on the permit.
5. Must provide liability insurance.
6. Must prove that the funds raised are used to benefit the community of Chino - (eligibility for the current year is determined through proof that the funds were used appropriately by the non-profit organization in the previous year).
7. Obtain a permit from the Fire Marshal for the sale of fireworks.

On April 3, 2026, applications were due from groups interested in selling fireworks in 2026. Of the 24 organizations that were issued fireworks retail permits in 2025, only 23 applications were received from returning organizations. No application was received from Gavin R. Stevens Foundation. Due to Gavin R. Stevens Foundation's non-renewal, the number of permits to be issued in 2026 will be reduced to 23 in accordance with the revised Chino Municipal Code Section 8.12.030 (Sales of Fireworks–Retail Permit). This total will continue to decrease through attrition, such as surrendered, revoked, or non-renewed permits until it reaches the established cap of 20 permits.

On April 13, 2026, the Sub-Committee met to review fireworks applications for 2026. Staff provided an overview of the applications received and reported to the Sub-Committee that all groups were in compliance with financial reporting requirements from 2025.

After receiving confirmation from staff regarding application compliance, the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee agreed to recommend approval of the 23 applications, as listed above, to receive a Fireworks Retail Permit in 2026. Three of the applicants have requested booth relocations. Chino American Little League, which was located at 5510 Philadelphia Street (between Ross and Burlington), is requesting to move their booth to 5459 Philadelphia Street (same shopping center, closer to Curacao Market). Don Lugo High School Grad Night was located at 12550 Central Avenue (southwest corner of Central and Walnut Avenues near DEALAND) and would like to move their booth to 14501 Ramona Avenue (corner of Ramona and Eucalyptus Avenues in the Home Depot Shopping Center). Magnolia Jr. High School Music Boosters was located at 5396 Riverside Drive (northwest corner of 10<sup>th</sup> Street and Riverside Avenue) and would

like to relocate to 12550 Central Avenue (southwest corner of Central and Walnut Avenues).

**RECOMMENDATION**

That the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission approve the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee's recommendation to issue Fireworks Retail Permits to the 23 returning non-profit groups and for Chino American Little League, Don Lugo High School Grad Night, and Magnolia Jr. High School Music Boosters to move to new locations.

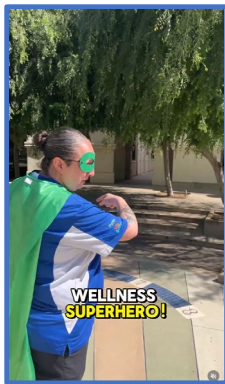

**AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS**

**SOAR, RAAP, and High Five After School Programs**

- On March 5, the After School team attended a training led by Ray Trinidad from Mpart People, Inc. This interactive session provided staff with activities that can be used in programming and to fill in downtime. Staff practiced the skill of re-directing participants independently and taking ownership of classroom management.
- All After School sites continue to work on their projects for the 2026 Agriculture Fair. Projects will be delivered to the Pomona Fairplex on April 17, and the Agriculture Fair will run from May 7-31.
- SOAR, RAAP, and High Five After School sites are participating in the “Healthy Chino Kids Spring Challenge.” Staff have enjoyed providing curriculum revolving around healthy lifestyle choices.
- All sites participated in curriculum for Women’s History Month. Participants were introduced to famous women figures, such as Rosie the Riveter and Mary Anderson. Participants were given the chance to learn and reflect on themselves and their future career paths.



## SEASONAL CAMPS

### Spring Camp

- Spring Camp was conducted on March 30-April 3, at Monte Vista Park. Thirty-nine participants were enrolled.
- Participants enjoyed “Time Traveling into Spring” with activities, crafts, and games that tied into different time eras. Participants enjoyed visiting the pre-historic era, the 70s, 80s, 90s, and the future. Activities included creating STEM dinosaur eggs, lava lamps, and designing bracelets.



## CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

### Around the World with Crafts Program

- Thirty-six children and family members participated in the weekly program on Wednesdays.
- The program ties in crafts from around the world to cultures in the Chino community.
- Families are guided through a different culture each month. March featured crafts from Greece. Children made dove handprints, paper plate pottery, the Olympic torch, and an olive leaf crown.

### Letter Learners Program

- Twenty-seven children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided them in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, story time, and exploring the letters Y-B. Children started learning how to write and recognize the lowercase alphabet.

### Memberships

- Four family membership packages were sold.

### Parties

- Two private birthday parties were booked. Eighty-four guests attended.
- All party guests explored the Museum’s exhibits and played activities.
- Staff led birthday party scavenger hunts and awarded prizes.
- Both party hosts received \$150 worth of free child admission day passes for future use as part of the party packages.

## Tours

- Two private tours were booked by Mountain View Elementary School and Haynes Elementary School. Twenty-eight adults and eighty-seven children attended.
- Staff led both groups on an educational, historical tour through the Museum, guided children in making butter or community helper crafts, and encouraged all guests to play and explore the eight hands-on exhibits that resemble a small town.

## DairyAire Birthday 5K & Fairytale Fun Run

- On March 7, 513 runners registered for the DairyAire Birthday 5K & Fairytale Fun Run, while 490 ran the course to raise funds for the Museum. That is a 96% turnout.
- The event raised \$34,173.18 before expenses from registrations and sponsorships.
- The event's Major Moo Sponsors were Nancy Lewis and Edward Jones, Office of Jamie Harwood.

- The overall men's winner was Adam Espinoza, age 19, and the overall women's winner was Deilani Campos, age 11.



## Easter Bunny Extravaganza

- On March 28, the Chino Youth Museum hosted the Easter Bunny Extravaganza event. Fifty-four children along with family members celebrated with the Easter Bunny by reading stories, making holiday crafts, hunting for hidden treasure icons, playing games, and taking pictures with the Easter Bunny.
- Senator Susan Rubio's office presented a certificate commending the Chino Youth Museum for its commitment to providing recreational activities that foster a sense of community.

### Social Media

- The Chino Youth Museum updated the Instagram landing page, @chinoyouthmuseum, with new highlights. The highlights bring modern colors, themes, and elements for enhanced viewer esthetics. The new page clickable icons spotlight programs, activities, tours, parties, and special events.

### Partnerships

- The Chino Youth Museum Coordinator met with Margaret Inserra, Director of the dA Center for the Arts, gave a tour of the facility and discussed bringing a future programming partnership called De Colores to the Museum this summer.

### New Board Member Chosen

- The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors voted in a new board member, Terri Le. Terri comes to the Museum with a background in Museum administration and fundraising.

## COUNSELING PROGRAMS

### Family Counseling

- Human Services provided counseling services to 69 participants for a total of 247 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 17 participants for a total of 57 units of service.

### Volunteers

- Human Services had 17 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 1,041 hours.

### Community Outreach

- On March 5, Chino Human Services attended Chino American Legion Post 299's first Veterans Resource and Wellness Expo in their newly renovated hall. Chino Human Services was present to share about counseling, case management, and Senior Center services offered by the City of Chino. The event was free to all military members and veterans, and included haircuts, workshops, guest speakers, opportunity drawings, entertainment, and door prizes.
- Chino Human Services attended the Soroptimists International of Chino Valley's 16th Annual Stepping Up for Girls Event on March 14, to support young ladies learning to make a confident transition into junior high school. Students were educated on what to expect as they enter junior high school and listened to several speakers who presented on academics and important school issues.
- Chino Human Services attended California State University Fullerton's Internship Fest on March 24, to connect with students and share information about internship opportunities in Human Services offered by the City of Chino. The event provided students with opportunities to explore internships, network with employers, and gain career-readiness skills.



### Recruitment of New Marriage and Family Therapist (MFT) Trainees

- Human Services staff conducted interviews for the fall 2026 traineeship positions. Over 70 applications were received from various universities for the six open positions. Those selected will start attending trainings and workshops during the summer in preparation to begin providing services in the fall.

### HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team made up of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator, alongside the Chino Police Department's Quality-of-Life Team, continues to provide vital support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The team connects people with services, such as rehabilitation programs, transitional or permanent housing, and family reunification, while creating personalized case plans to help them achieve stable housing.
- The team served 16 returning clients and 18 new clients, providing a total of 54 units of service.
- On March 19, Homeless Outreach Teams from the cities of Chino, Upland, and Montclair met with Chino Hills Code Enforcement to discuss department responsibilities for addressing homelessness in their city. The meeting was very productive, as teams discussed ways to strengthen regional collaboration and build future partnerships among West End cities to more effectively address homelessness.
- On March 24, homeless outreach teams from cities across San Bernardino County met to discuss challenges related to homelessness focusing on improving access to resources, securing funding, and strengthening coordination between agencies. As part of the meeting, teams also toured the CARE Closet at the HOPE Family Resource Center, which supports all Chino Valley Unified School District families in need.



### Success Stories

- On March 16, the Quality-of-Life Team and the Homeless Outreach Team came in contact with a 29-year-old man at an encampment who initially declined services. Two days later, he reached out requesting help and was promptly met by the Homeless Outreach Team, who transported him to Set Free in Montclair for placement. He is now working toward gaining employment and securing permanent housing.

## GIVEAWAY EVENTS

### Back-to-School Event

- Committee meetings are underway for the Back-to-School event scheduled for July 25. The event is seeking vendors, barbers, and screenings. The flyer has been approved and will be available at all City facilities and school sites. Event registration dates are June 18, from 12:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., and June 19, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. This event hopes to provide 500 backpacks with school supplies for CVUSD students, Transitional-Kindergarten through 12th grade, most in need.

## HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

### Case Management

- HOPE enrolled 53 new families who received case management support for rent and utility assistance, emergency food assistance, and social service applications.
- HOPE was presented with a donation of \$1,500 and \$750 in gift cards from Northgate at the store's grand opening event on March 30.
- Case Managers successfully assisted a family living in their car in securing transitional housing with Foothill Family Shelter, a wraparound program that supports with rent and continued case management services with the intention of permanent housing at the conclusion of the three to six month program.
- Case Managers attended the Coordinated Entry System (CES) to advocate for three McKinney-Vento families in hope of securing rapid rehousing funds. CES is the gateway to transitional and permanent supportive housing programs.
- One family received rental assistance in the amount of \$4,200 preventing them from eviction. One family received assistance with their water bill in the amount of \$500 to prevent disconnection and allowed the opportunity to gain financial stability.
- With generous community donations, 13 high school seniors were sponsored. Over \$2,700 in donated funds were used to purchase Grad Nite, Prom, Yearbook, and Senior Trip tickets. The families of the students selected to receive this assistance have worked closely with Case Managers to address their challenges and to remove any academic barriers that arise. All have faced financial hardship and some have faced housing instability. Despite their challenges, these students are excelling in school and have plans to continue their education after graduation.

### EXCEL (Experience in Career, Education, and Leadership)

- During spring break, the EXCEL program coordinated a college visit to Mt. San Antonio College and provided students with the opportunity to obtain professional attire for interviews. These efforts reflect EXCEL's commitment to equipping youth with practical life skills and exposure to post-secondary pathways. Through experiences like these, students gain confidence, preparedness, and a clearer vision for their future. The program continues to play a vital role in supporting participants' personal growth and long-term professional development.

### CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet served 132 individuals. Services included distribution of 30 emergency hygiene bags and 59 children receiving clothing.

- The program received an anonymous donation of toys.
- Every week, the program distributes CARE packs, bags full of snacks and small meals, to 52 children to address food insecurity. Students are referred to this program through the family's Case Manager.



### TYKES

- The TYKES program provided a total of 204 services to 60 families with a child 0 to 5 years old.
- The Parents as Teachers program had one new participant and two that completed the program.
- The Outreach Specialist hosted a table at seven events leading to 95 service contacts promoting Case Management support services and early childhood related resources.

### POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists began sessions at all school sites for spring. Monthly evaluations continue to be sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B Counselors to share students' progress while in the PALS program.
- All sessions will conclude at the end of the school year on May 21.

### HEALTHY CHINO

#### Hike the Valley

- Hikers were shuttled to Mount Hollywood Trail in Los Angeles. Hikers enjoyed views of the Hollywood sign and greater Los Angeles. The hike concluded with healthy snacks.

#### Garden Workshop

- The Garden Workshop was not offered this month due to Healthy Family Day.

#### Children's Discovery Workshop

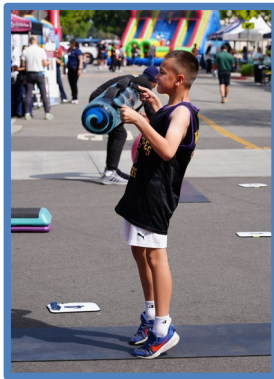
- The Children's Discovery Workshop was not offered this month due to Healthy Family Day.

#### Outreach

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an outreach booth during the Healthy Family Day event on March 28. Attendees learned about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events, received nutrition information, and spun the prize wheel for Healthy Chino swag.

## Healthy Family Day

- Healthy Family Day was held on March 28, in downtown Chino on D and 7<sup>th</sup> Streets. The event hosted over 50 health, wellness, and environmental informational booths, as well as healthy food options and retail vendors. Fitness demonstrations were provided by Chino Valley YMCA, The Camp Training Center, and Z Ultimate Self Defense. Free activities included a seed planting station hosted by San Bernardino County Master Gardeners, inflatables, a sensory bottle station provided by Behavior Highway, Healthy Chino smoothie bike, and S.P.A.R.K Kids activities. Wellness checks included kidney and heart health checks, Alzheimer’s protein tests, hemoglobin A1C tests, liver function tests, sidewalk CPR, and blood pressure checks.



## Healthy Chino Coalition Meeting

- The Healthy Chino Coalition Meeting was held on March 19. Guest presenters from Dentistry 4 Kids shared information on kids’ oral hygiene. Coalition members were also quizzed on fun Healthy Chino facts and learned about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events. The meeting concluded with a roundtable where attendees had the opportunity to share about their own programs and events.

### CHINO Days

- CHINO Days is scheduled for April 11, from 2:00-8:00 p.m.; and April 12, from 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.
- Local D and 7<sup>th</sup> Street businesses were notified.
- Staff is seeking additional stage decorations.

membership for a child ten years of age. This support promotes youth engagement, skill development, and positive community involvement.

- The Case Manager continues to provide ongoing guidance and support to individuals and families, ensuring access to resources that promote stability, health, and personal development.

### **NAC Enrichment Classes**

- Science Spies was cancelled due to low enrollment.
- Young Chefs participants had a great time preparing their very own grilled cheese sandwiches and pigs in a blanket.

- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on March 20, with a total of 20 participants.

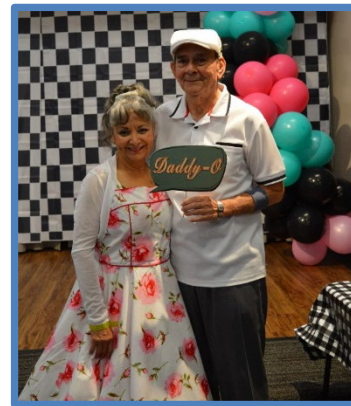
### Class Highlights

### Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 45 participants for a total of 134 units of service. The Aging Services Coordinator worked with various participants on applications for utility and rental assistance. Direct services included low-income housing lists, Medi-Cal renewal applications, and Cal-Fresh renewal applications.
- Success Story: The Aging Services Coordinator assisted a participant with completing paperwork for Housing Authority of San Bernardino County. The participant expressed confusion regarding the required forms and concern about making errors. The Coordinator guided the participant through the application process, ensuring all documents were accurately completed and the necessary supporting materials were properly attached. Additionally, the Coordinator assisted with mailing the completed application on the participant's behalf.

### Social Services

- On March 5 and 19, HICAP provided information for Medicare. There were 5 participants.
- On March 11, the Department of Aging and Adult services distributed 80 bus passes to participants over the age of 60.
- On March 26, Feeding America distributed 225 boxes to participants.
- On March 23, Inland Counties Legal Services provided free legal aid. There were 2 participants.

### Workshops and Support Groups

- On March 2, Elidia Diaz from West End Counseling provided a workshop on the importance of social connections. There were 12 participants.
- Every Wednesday in March, AARP provided free tax services. There were 139 participants.
- On March 4, Feral Cat Friends conducted a Lunch and Learn to talk about advocating to stop the overflow of feral cat colonies. There were 25 participants.
- On March 24, AARP conducted safety refresher driving classes. There were 3 participants.
- P.A.T.C.H. program was able to help 2 participants in affording their prescriptions.

## RECREATION CLASSES / CONTRACT CLASSES

### Class Highlights

- The folklórico classes averaged 60 participants, making them one of the most popular programs in the community.
- Tennis programs had 27 participants across all levels from Tiny Aces to Adult Cardio classes, running 2–3 times per week at both Cypress Trails and Olympic Parks.
- Contract renewals are progressing well with 13 out of 22 independent contract instructors completed to date.

**PROJECTS UPDATE**

**APOC BATTING CAGES REPLACEMENT PROJECT**

Project Status:

- Project is now complete with a re-opening celebration held in March.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the APOC Batting Cages Replacement Project includes the removal and replacement of pitching machines, token boxes, and ball conveyor system. New wiring will also be installed as part of this project.



**PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES CITY YARD–  
ADMINISTRATIVE BUILDING CARPET REPLACEMENT PROJECT**

Project Status:

- The Public Works Services Administrative Building Carpet Replacement project is finalizing a proposal and logistics plan with a contractor. Staff is coordinating with Public Works Services to establish a schedule that minimizes impact on staff, after which the agreement process will be initiated.
- The agreement is currently under review as part of the approval process. The project is anticipated to begin in June 2026.

Scope of Work:

- The project includes removing existing carpet tiles and rubber wall base in identified areas of the Public Works Services Administrative Building and installing new 24"x24" carpet tiles and rubber wall base. Additional work includes lifting furniture in place

and performing standard floor preparation with additional preparation in areas where the concrete slab is uneven.

### **WALNUT PARK–RESTROOMS INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT**

#### Project Status:

- The agreement process has been completed. The project is anticipated to begin in May 2026.

#### Scope of Work:

- The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project will provide accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building. Work will include replacing restroom fixtures, repainting the interior, installing prefabricated partitions, upgrading to LED lighting, and applying an epoxy floor coating.

### **WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT**

#### Project Status:

- Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to coordinate the plans and bid packages, and schedule the timing of construction.
- The scope of work has expanded to include renovation of the basketball court and remaining hardscape areas adjacent to the basketball court for an overall cohesive improvement project.

#### Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work shall include professional design services to prepare plans and construction documents for the removal of existing playground equipment and rubber/sand surfacing, and installation of new all-inclusive playground equipment, continuous rubberized play surfacing, shade sail system, new picnic shade shelter, new site furnishings (including tables, benches, trash receptacles, and drinking fountain), basketball court improvements, parking lot improvements, and new concrete improvements within the main area of the park.

### **CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER DEMONSTRATION GARDEN PROJECT**

#### Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project is nearing the end of the design phase, including the recently added ADA compliance improvements. The next steps will include the plan review process.

#### Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project will consist of designing and constructing a drought tolerant garden on the south side of the Carolyn Owens Community Center. The Demonstration Garden will

feature climate appropriate, drought-tolerant plantings and irrigation systems, along with identification signage, concrete walkways, walkway lighting, and park benches.

### **CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER PLAYGROUND & ADA IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT**

#### Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project is currently in the design phase.

#### Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA Improvements project will consist of designing and installing a new tot lot playground adjacent to the future demonstration garden. The intended design for the future tot lot playground will be a nature-themed playground that will tie into the demonstration garden. Additional scope of work will include accessibility improvements to walkways on the east side of the facility. The tot lot and accessibility improvements project will coincide with the demonstration garden project to minimize disruption and avoid construction impacts on the property.

### **CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN**

#### Project Status:

- Staff is reviewing the ADA Transition Plan to identify barriers that can be removed internally.

#### Scope of Work:

- Improve interior accessibility by completing high priority items identified in the ADA Transition Plan and other related improvements.

### **SHADY GROVE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN**

#### Project Status:

- Early-stage design work is currently underway.

#### Scope of Work:

- Accessibility improvements and playground replacement. Construction is scheduled for FY 2028-29.

### **HERITAGE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN**

#### Project Status:

- Early-stage design work is currently underway.

#### Scope of Work:

- Work will include accessibility improvements, playground equipment, and pavilion replacements. Construction is scheduled for FY 2027-28.
