V. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

Chairperson Martinez opened the Public Communications. As there were no requests to speak, Chairperson Martinez closed the Public Communications.

VI. TEEN ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT – No report.

VII. INFORMATION

1. Healthy Chino:

Rachel Phelps, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Phelps reported this year is Healthy Chino's 20-year anniversary, and highlighted programs and events added this year in celebration of this milestone. The Healthy Chino program strives to increase healthy lifestyle options and the

quality of life for all community members through a series of programs, workshops, and special events.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Chino recently hosted the Healthier You Challenge Department Showdown, which is an employee challenge that encourages participants to establish healthy habits. Eighty-eight employees from several City departments participated by submitting weekly mile counts from swimming, biking, walking, and running, which added to their department's overall total. Each department competed against each other to win the department title of Healthiest Department. Weekly prizes were given to participants who submitted the highest mile count of the week. Three individual grand prize winners, as well as the department winner were announced at the conclusion of the challenge.

Ms. Phelps reported to celebrate 20 years, Healthy Chino collaborated with Chino Valley Unified School District and Chino SOAR and High Five After School programs to create a cookbook of healthy recipes. Students created original recipes for the book, as well as competed in a cookbook cover contest. The cookbook cover winner was Chenile Jaco from Doris Dixon Elementary SOAR After School program.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Family Day was held on Saturday, March 15, from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. The event was presented on collaboration with Chino Valley YMCA and Behavior Highway. Together, they view physical activity and nutrition as important components of whole body wellness. As part of their mission, this event provides opportunities for families and community members to gather information and resources to live a healthy lifestyle. This event has something for everyone from various health and fitness screenings, demonstrations, family competitions, and activity stations. This year, there were inflatable obstacle courses, an inflatable rock climbing wall, along with interactive photo booths, healthy snack booth recipe craft station, and seed planting station, as well as various fitness demonstrations, such as a soccer clinic held by Empire Strikers, and YogaSix inside the Neighborhood Activity Center.

Ms. Phelps reported Chino Bike Day will take place on Saturday, May 10, from 7:30-11:00 a.m., at Ayala Park. It will be presented by Healthy Chino in partnership with the Chino Police Department. This event promotes bike safety and awareness, and includes a bike obstacle course, 15-mile community bike ride, and a family bike ride led by the Chino Police Department. The Chino Police Department will also provide helmet fittings and giveaways, and a bike repair booth will also be available.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Chino continues to host interactive and information booths at several events throughout the year. Healthy Chino hosts booths at City events and programs, such as Halloween Spooktacular, Chino Youth Christmas Parade and Fair, and partner events such as the Heritage Farmers Market, Senior Health Fair, and Great American Smokeout.

Ms. Phelps reported in celebration of Healthy Chino's 20 years, they are hosting mobile stops, which are themed outreach opportunities. Healthy Chino kicked off their mobile stops in January at Chilly Chino; in February, Healthy Chino partnered with Chino Valley Medical Center to celebrate Heart Health at the Senior Center; in March, they celebrated National Nutrition Month at Family Farms Chino; in April,

they will partner with Green Chino to teach the community about composting at the Chino Community Garden.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Grilling is a fee-based program, where participants learn how to prepare healthy meals, as well as enjoy delicious creations in a hands on cooking environment. Participants learn smart grilling techniques. All materials, including food and drinks, are provided. The recipes this summer include Grilled Cilantro Lime Chicken, Grilled Pesto Chicken and Tomatoe Kabobs, and Vegetarian Portabello Burgers.

Ms. Phelps reported Storytime in the Garden is a free weekly reading program during June and July. Children discover the wonderful world of gardening and nature through stories. Participants have the opportunity to express their creativity through crafts and activities. Guest readers often include Chino Valley Firefighters; Chino Police Officers; Community Services, Parks Recreation Coordinators, Supervisors, Managers; and Commission Members if interested.

Ms. Phelps reported Healthy Chino hosts three Coalition Meetings annually. They are held on the third Thursday in March, June, and September each year. Each meeting is themed and includes a presenter pertaining to the topic. Coalition members include Chino residents, representatives for health-based businesses or organizations, and City of Chino employees. The next meeting will be held on June 19. The goal of the Healthy Chino Coalition is to increase healthy lifestyles and the quality of life for the community. Healthy Chino sends out monthly e-newsletters with upcoming events, programs, workshops, and other healthy information. The newsletter highlights the Garden Workshops, Discovery Children's Workshops, and Hike the Valley programs that continue to be offered throughout the year.

Commissioner Arlt congratulated staff on a beautiful Chino Community Garden. She stated she spends a lot of time working in her own yard and has made friendships with people through that gardening and is constantly making referrals to attend the workshops at the garden. Commissioner Arlt stated she is glad we have the garden in the community. The staff who work the garden are always gracious, knowledgeable, and friendly. She asked where she can get a copy of the cookbook.

Ms. Phelps stated they premiered the cookbook at Healthy Family Day, and will send the cookbook out soon to the students who participated and the schools, as well as the Commissioners.

2. Chino Youth Museum:

Dane D'Antuono, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. D'Antuono reported the Chino Youth Museum is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. The Museum opened its doors in December 1999, to a diverse public with a mission of bridging the past, present, and future together through fun educational interactive exhibits, special events, and programs for all families. The Museum offers guests a glimpse into Chino's rich history through eight hands-on interactive exhibits set up like a small town. Since January of 2024; 9,120 people have visited the Museum. Guests have enjoyed a variety of enriched programs, such as Letter Learners, where young children explore the alphabet through story time and letter crafts. Last month, two new features were added to this program, which include a "Get Your Wiggles Out" and Playdoh letter making. Older children get moving with live video dances accompanied by story time

during Tunes & Tales. Tunes & Tales is held every Wednesday at 1:00 p.m., and Letter Learners is held every Thursday at 10:30 a.m. These programs are free with paid admission or membership.

Ms. D'Antuono reported the Museum continues to offer CYM Lab. It is a unique steam-based program that introduces our families to science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics experiment, such as building bridges with conversational candy hearts. The program is free to the public and includes exhibit exploration play. The next First Friday CYM Lab will be held on May 2, from 3:00-5:00 p.m.

Ms. D'Antuono reported crazy educational fun was had with Beat the Heat and Dr. Moo's Silly Science. Beat the Heat is full of wacky water fun and Dr. Moo stretches participants minds with funny science challenges. Both programs will return this summer. Nominal fees of \$4-\$6 apply.

Ms. D'Antuono reported the Museum hosted five special events with the new addition of the City's Inclusive Community Celebration. The Museum joined in on the City event by providing free admission to event participants for the day. Last year, the Museum started offering private tours to individuals and school groups. Tour options include historical staff led narratives, community helper crafts, butter making, and exhibit time; 586 tour guests participated and tours cost an affordable \$10 per person.

Ms. D'Antuono reported birthday party reservations were also offered; 533 kids and guests celebrated their special moments at the Museum. Also, 234 people took advantage of having unlimited visits to the Museum for an entire year by purchasing membership packages.

Ms. D'Antuono reported the Museum held three fundraisers, which included the Spring Bingo Bash, Halloween Bingo Bash, and DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run. More than 420 participants ran in this year's run. The revenue raised for all three fundraisers was \$66,577.92 before expenses.

Ms. D'Antuono reported the Chino Youth Museum Board hosted a Chamber Mixer in September 2024. Nearly 40 businesses and community leaders were invited to participate in developing a new strategic plan, toured the Museum, and took part in an opportunity raffle drawing for prizes. Several new partnerships were formed, such as the San Bernardino County Library providing child admission passes as prizes for the Library's reading program; a collaboration was formed with Chino Self-Storage for a feature article about the Museum, which was published on the corporation's blog at smartselfstorage.com; a partnership was also formed with Green Chino resulting in the water cycle rain wall renovation and the installation of cane detectors in the water exhibit room; together with the Teen Advisory Committee, Museum staff and TAC members built a polar express experience for the 25th anniversary Santa's Village kick-off celebration; and the Museum was recognized in two reviews online.

Ms. D'Antuono reported upcoming events include the Arbor Day Celebration on April 4, Easter Bunny Extravaganza on April 12, and the new event, Starbucks Reads Dr. Seuss on April 19. This is the first community event ever with Starbucks Coffee Corporation. The event will feature Starbucks staff storytime, coloring contest with a prize, Starbucks cup craft, exhibit exploration and play, and free coffee will be provided while supply last for the grown ups. The event is free with

paid admission or membership. This event will be advertised by Starbucks Coffee Corporation in all of their 13 Chino and Chino Valley locations.

Chairperson Martinez asked if the Museum coordinates school visits.

Ms. D'Antuono stated yes if a school is interested, they reach out to the Museum. There is a tour application that they fill out. They choose the type of tour they want, public or private; what activities they want, such as a narrative, educational, historical tour or exploration time. They also get to choose from butter making, which gives them a brief history of our dairy farms and how the process of butter making is done. Participants make it themselves or a community helpers craft teaches them about the different community helpers and careers that we have in the Chino Valley.

Chairperson Martinez asked if there are costs for the upcoming events.

Ms. D'Antuono stated Arbor Day at the Museum is a free event. The Easter Bunny Extravaganza is \$20 per child with all accompanying adults are free. This amount includes Easter Bunny story time, crafts, games, photo opportunity with the Easter Bunny, and special Easter favors.

Commissioner Mendoza stated after 25 years with the new events, programs, and partners, it is good to see how creative we are at keeping things fresh for the community, especially for generations coming back to the Museum.

Commissioner Takeuch stated she could not ask for a better re-creation of Herb's Hardware than at the Chino Youth Museum.

Mr. Benson noted upcoming events on the calendar, which included Chino Rancho Park Grand Opening on March 29, at 9:00 a.m.; Legends-The Senior Challenge Opening Ceremony on March 31 through April 24; CHINO Days on Saturday, April 5, from 2:00-8:00 p.m., and Sunday, April 6, from 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.; Easter Bunny Extravaganza on April 12, from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.; Volunteer Recognition Dinner on April 16, from 6:00-8:00 p.m.; and Earth Day on April 17, at Chino Creek Wetlands, from 4:00-7:00 p.m.

X. COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Commissioner Arlt reported on parks visited since the last meeting, which included Ayala Park. Commissioner Arlt stated she is looking forward to all the upcoming events.

Commissioner Aviles – Absent.

Commissioner Mendoza reported on meetings and events attended and parks visited since the last meeting, which included Healthy Family Day at the Neighborhood Activity Center and Olympic Park. Commissioner Mendoza stated she is looking forward to the upcoming events, and that the Chino Youth Museum Board meetings are now taking place on the 4th Tuesday of the month.

Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas – Absent.

Commissioner Takeuchi reported on meetings attended, and parks visited since the last meeting, which included both Council meetings. Commissioner Takeuchi reported the parks look nice and are greening up after the little bit of rain we had, and stated the City is taking very good care of our trees, and she is looking forward to CHINO Days.

Vice Chairperson Jerry reported on meetings and events attended, and parks visited since the last meeting, which included the DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run, Chino National Little League Opening Ceremony, a City Council meeting, Chino Valley Youth Track and Field Meet, meeting with the Presidents of Chino American and Chino National Little Leagues to hear about their needs and concerns. Vice Chairperson Jerry reported it is good to have a good line of communication open, and parks look good. Vice Chairperson Jerry reported Carolyn Owens Centennial Square could use a good cleaning.

Chairperson Martinez reported on meetings and events attended, and parks visited since the last meeting, which included a Council meeting, Chino National Little League Opening Day, Chino Valley Historical Society meeting, Chino Valley Youth Track and Field Meet, and meeting with the Little League Presidents. Chairperson Martinez reported fields are looking good.

Chairperson Martinez asked if we are still applying for a grant to fund Monte Vista Park's improvements.

BACKGROUND

Chino Municipal Code 8.12 designates the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission with the oversight of the sale and use of fireworks in Chino. For several years, the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee has assisted staff with the process of reviewing applications, addressing specific concerns related to fireworks, and making recommendations to improve the process. The Fireworks Review Sub-Committee this year is comprised of Vice Chairperson Jerry and Commissioners Aviles and Takeuchi.

ISSUES/ANALYSIS

Fireworks Retail Permits - Per Chino Municipal Code 8.12.030 (E), Fireworks Retail Permit holders from the previous year have priority status to receive a retail permit for the current year provided they continue to meet the requirements to sell fireworks.

Each applicant must meet the following criteria to receive a Fireworks Retail Permit:

1. Must be a non-profit organization established for at least one year.
2. Meeting location must be within the Chino city limits.
3. Membership of at least 20 members with 50% plus one of its members living or working within the Chino city limits.
4. Must have permission from the property owner to sell fireworks on the property designated on the permit.
5. Must provide liability insurance.
6. Must prove that the funds raised are used to benefit the community of Chino - (eligibility for the current year is determined through proof that the funds were used appropriately by the non-profit organization in the previous year).
7. Obtain a permit from the Fire Marshal for the sale of fireworks.

On April 4, 2025, applications were due from groups interested in selling fireworks in 2025. Twenty-six applications were received. Twenty-four of those applications were from returning organizations and issued retail permits in 2024. Applications were received from Abba Love Church and Our Lady of Guadalupe, which did not operate in previous years. The maximum number of permits that may be issued in one calendar year shall not exceed 25 permits. Abba Love Church and Our Lady of Guadalupe's applications were not processed as all returning organizations have first priority for available permits.

On April 10, 2025, the Sub-Committee met to review fireworks applications for 2025. Staff provided an overview of the applications received and reported to the Sub-Committee that all groups were in compliance with financial reporting requirements from 2024.

After receiving confirmation from staff regarding application compliance, the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee agreed to recommend approval of the 24 applications, as listed above, to receive a Fireworks Retail Permit in 2025. Two of the applicants have requested booth relocations. One was Chino Cowboy Huddle, which was located at 12375 Central Avenue (Superior Shopping Center), and is now requesting to move their booth to 12150 Central Avenue (Smart & Final Shopping Center near Jersey Mike's). The other is CHAPPS, which was located at 5288 E. Francis Avenue (northwest corner of Central and Francis Avenues near 7-Eleven), and would like to move their booth to 12375 Central Avenue (Superior Shopping Center).

RECOMMENDATION

That the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission approve the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee's recommendation to issue Fireworks Retail Permits to the 24 returning non-profit groups and approval for Chino Cowboy Huddle and CHAPPS to move to new locations.

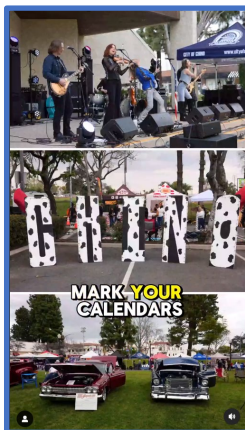

Chino Rancho Park Grand Opening

- The Chino Rancho Park Grand Opening took place on Saturday, March 29, from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. The event included pickleball demonstrations, Healthy Chino exercise training, and outreach booths. The park features an all-inclusive shaded playground, the community's first pickleball courts, outdoor exercise equipment, picnic areas, and a theme that pays tribute to Chino's rich agricultural roots.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- On March 7, the After School team attended the final CalSAC training of the school year. Hazel Lambert, the CalSAC speaker, discussed how a person's attitude, passion, and behavior are shaped by their thoughts. She emphasized how After School program leaders model these qualities by understanding the connection between events, reactions, and outcomes.
- On March 21, several CSPR Specialists attended the Inland Empire Symposium, at the Grand Terrace High School. The conference showcased participant art, grant-based After School programs, and the team attended educational sessions.
- KAMS (Kids Affirmation Through Mentorship and Sports), a non-profit organization, visited SOAR at Dickson, Marshall, and Walnut Elementary Schools. KAMS leaders focused on positive affirmations and guided participants in activities that promoted self-empowerment and positivity through crafts and sports activities.
- All After School sites continue to work on their projects for the 2025 Agriculture Fair. Projects will be delivered to the Pomona Fairplex on April 11, and the Agriculture Fair will run from May 2-26, with the theme of "Advocate for Agriculture."
- SOAR, RAAP, and High Five After School sites are participating in the "Healthy Chino Kids Spring Challenge." Staff have enjoyed providing curriculum revolving around healthy lifestyle choices.



SEASONAL CAMPS

Spring Camp

- Spring Camp was conducted from March 24-28, at Monte Vista Park. A total of 45 participants were enrolled.
- Participants enjoyed spring-themed activities, including a spring nature scavenger hunt, spoon tulip painting, creating electric butterflies, building harmonicas, and participating in a team-building marble run project. Many participants joined camp this season and were able to make new friends!



SUNRISE KIDS

Preserve Community Center

- Sunrise Kids program is not being offered for the remainder of the 2024-2025 school year.

CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

Letter Learners and Tunes & Tales Programs

- Twenty-nine children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling programs offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided children in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, and story time. The program explored the letters A-D. The program is suitable for toddlers and preschoolers.
- The Tunes & Tales program featured themed stories and live dancing with videos. Participants were given prizes for creative dance moves. The program is for all ages.

First Friday CYM Lab

- First Friday CYM Lab was not offered in March due to the DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run event preparations.

DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run

- On March 1, 466 runners registered for the DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run to celebrate the Chino Youth Museum’s 25th birthday and raise funds for the Museum.
- The event raised \$32,539 before expenses from registrations and sponsors.

- Eleven family membership packages were sold.

Tours

- Two private tours were booked.
 - On March 10, Newman Elementary School tour participants consisted of 16 adults and 24 children. On March 18, the Newman Elementary School tour participants consisted of 25 adults and 55 children.
 - Staff led participants through a narrative historical tour of the Museum, explored community helper careers with the students, made career hats, and guided explorative play of the exhibits.

Press | Social Media

- The City of Chino issued a press release about the Chino Youth Museum celebrating its 25th Anniversary and DairyAire Birthday 5K and Fun Run.
- As a sponsor of the DairyAire, Transtech, posted a reel summary of the wonderful turnout at the race, and shared it as a collaboration with the Chino Youth Museum.
- The City of Chino issued a press release about the Easter Bunny Extravaganza inviting residents to “hop” into the exciting event on April 12.

Museum Board Meeting

- The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors held its monthly meeting on March 25, from 6:00-7:30 p.m., at the Museum. Board Members talked about future fundraising events.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS

Family Counseling

- Human Services provided counseling services to 56 participants for a total of 204 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 5 participants for a total of 12 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 34 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 1,117.75 hours.

Community Outreach

- Chino Human Services attended the Soroptimists International of Chino Valley's 16th Annual Stepping Up for Girls Event to support young ladies learning to make a confident transition into Junior High School. Students were educated on what to expect as they enter Junior High School and listened to several speakers who presented on academics and important school issues.



Recruitment of New Marriage and Family Therapist (MFT) Trainees

- Human Services staff conducted interviews for the fall 2025 traineeship positions. Over 60 applications were received from various universities for the 15 open positions. Those selected will start attending trainings and workshops during the summer in preparation to begin providing services in the fall.

Counseling Groups

- On March 18, a 10-week grief support group offered by Counselors called Sprouting Hope for seniors began meeting at the Chino Senior Center. The group is set to conclude in May.

HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- Homeless Outreach provided services to 9 duplicated clients and 21 new clients for a total of 54 units of service. Four clients exited the streets and one returned.
- The Homeless Outreach Team is comprised of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator/Assistant Coordinator and Chino Police Department Quality-of-Life Team. The team focuses on providing street outreach to individuals who are displaced. Staff provides direct resources to services, such as rehabilitation centers, transitional housing, permanent housing, or family reunification. The goal of the team is to provide individuals with wraparound services and create a case plan with goals to obtain permanent housing.

Success Stories

- The Quality-of-Life Team found a 50-year-old individual at CrossPoint Church in Chino, who had been in the area intermittently for three years and lacked income, health insurance, and stable housing. The Assistant Homeless Outreach Coordinator connected with him, but the individual did not have any plans for housing or income. While the Salvation Army had space, they could not assist without identification. The Outreach Team then transported the individual to Set Free, where he received help obtaining identification and benefits.
- A 50-year-old individual was found wandering Central Avenue by the Quality-of-Life Team. After learning that the individual was homeless and trying to return to Fontana, the Homeless Outreach Coordinator arrived to assist. Recently released from Canyon Ridge, the individual had no way to reconnect with his support system. The individual was offered a bus pass and made a return home to Fontana.
- The Assistant Homeless Outreach Coordinator began helping an individual and her daughter with housing and services in early 2025, however, the situation became more difficult when her daughter left to stay with another person. After a few months of attempts to assist, the Homeless Outreach Team was able to convince the individual to enter an inpatient program in March. A bed was secured at Inland Valley Recovery Services in Upland, where her son visited to offer encouragement. The team transported the individual to the program, where she hopes to overcome her addiction and reunite with her children.

GIVEAWAY EVENTS**Back-to-School Event**

- Planning for the Back-to-School event, scheduled for Saturday, July 26, continues to receive sponsors. A social media post will be requested to advertise the event registration dates on Tuesday, June 17, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.; and Wednesday, June 18, from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. With so many generous sponsors, the most vulnerable families will receive a \$50 gift card for groceries.

HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- The program enrolled 43 new families to receive assistance with a variety of resources, including Medi-Cal renewals, CARE Closet services, tutoring, and emergency assistance with rental and utility bills.
- Case Managers referred 11 high school seniors to have their senior activities and yearbooks sponsored through community donations. Over \$1,800 of donation funds were used to purchase Grad Nite, Prom, Yearbook, and Senior Trip tickets. The families of the students selected to receive this assistance have worked closely with Case Managers to address their challenges and to remove any academic barriers that arise. All have faced financial hardship, and some have even faced housing instability. Despite their challenges, these students are excelling in school and have plans to continue their education after graduation. This assistance would not be possible without the support and dedication of the community and local businesses.
- Case Managers walked clients through the application process and successfully assisted three families with utility assistance that totaled \$2,824.
- A new Case Manager began her assignment on March 31. She will be working closely with families who have a child or children attending Anna Borba Elementary.

EXCEL (Experience in Career, Education, and Leadership)

- The EXCEL program only met once in March due to students having spring break at the end of the month. The Case Manager presented students with information on opportunities available at a community college.

- Students were also invited to attend a field trip to tour Chaffey College during spring break, however, this field trip was cancelled due to low attendance.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet remained busy with new and ongoing families visiting. A total of 81 children received clothing and 17 bags of emergency hygiene supplies were distributed.
- The Chino Hills Teen Advisory Board coordinated a donation drive to collect emergency hygiene supplies.
- Community partners continue to keep the CARE Closet well-stocked with clothing and emergency supplies.



TYKES

- The TYKES program currently has seven active participants in the Parents as Teachers program. Participants are nearing the end of their sessions and will soon be graduating.
- Outreach was conducted at multiple community events and school sites, including Levi Dickey Elementary, Chino Rancho Park grand opening, and Healthy Family Day.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists began sessions at all school sites. Monthly evaluations continue to be sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B Counselors to share student progress while in the PALS program.
- All sessions will conclude at the end of the school year on May 22.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

- Participants were shuttled to El Moro Canyon Loop Trail on March 1. This was a four-mile hike and was classified as moderate intensity. After the hike, participants enjoyed a healthy snack at a nearby park.



Garden Workshop

- Garden Workshops did not take place this month. Workshops will resume in April.

Children's Discovery Workshop

- Children's Discovery Workshops did not take place this month. Workshops will resume in April.

Outreach

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an outreach booth at Healthy Family Day on March 15, and at the Heritage Farmers Market on March 26. Healthy Chino also hosted a booth and circuit training on March 29, at the Chino Rancho Park Grand Opening to showcase the park's new fitness equipment. Participants visited the booth to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events, and spun the prize wheel to win Healthy Chino swag.



Healthy Chino Kids

- The Healthy Chino Kids Challenge began on March 3, at SOAR, RAAP, and High Five After School sites. Healthy Chino staff led participants in lessons about healthy physical activities, mental health, and wellness exercises. The challenge will last six weeks with the After School sites competing weekly to complete healthy activities and earn points towards a Healthy Chino party.



Healthy Chino Mobile Stops

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an informational mobile stop at Family Farms Chino on March 8. The theme was “National Nutrition Month.” Participants who visited the booth were able to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and nutrition information, along with a tour provided by Family Farms Chino.



Healthy Family Day

- Healthy Family Day took place on March 15, at a new location, the Neighborhood Activity Center at Sixth and D Streets. The event hosted over 50 health, wellness, and environmental informational booths, as well as healthy food options and retail vendors. Fitness demonstrations were provided by Chino Valley YMCA, YogaSix, and the Empire Strykers Soccer team. A bubble station, seed planting activity, healthy snack station, recipe craft station, and inflatables were provided for participants to enjoy. Chino Valley Medical Center provided sidewalk CPR lessons and wellness checks.



Healthy Chino Coalition Meeting

- Healthy Chino hosted a Coalition Meeting on March 13. Regal Medical Group presented on healthy eating habits themed “Keys to Healthy Eating” for National Nutrition Month.

Participants learned about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events. Agencies also shared on their organization's programming during the meeting's roundtable.

CHINO Days

- CHINO Days is scheduled for April 5, from 2:00-8:00 p.m.; and April 6, from 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.
- Saturday headliner is The Pistol Blonde and Sunday headliner is Adelaide.
- Contract vendors have been finalized for character appearances and entertainment.
- Carnival contract has been finalized.
- Layout is finalized.
- Local D Street and 7th Street businesses were notified of event street closures on March 3.
- Staff is seeking displays and features.
- There will be 16 food and 4 cottage vendors that will offer a wide variety of food for both days.
- There are 16 retail vendors, 13 information booths, including profit and non-profit, 5 City partner booths, and 7 sponsor booths secured for both days.
- Local entertainment is being recruited to perform throughout the event.

YOUTH SPORTS

- Winter Youth Basketball League's regular season concluded on March 1, at the Neighborhood Activity and Preserve Community Centers.
- Playoff games for the Boys A/B/C Divisions were held on March 6, at the Neighborhood Activity Center. Winners advanced to the Inland Empire Tournament of League Champions for the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation. The Trojans earned first place for the Boys A Division. NEIGHBORHOOD ACTIVITY CENTER (NAC)

Case Management

- The Case Manager evaluated two clients for the Emergency Housing Assistance Program. The client initially sought both utility and rental assistance due to a significant loss of income. They were forced to take medical leave from work to address medical challenges. During this time, the client applied for state disability insurance, however, the lengthy processing delays prevented them from meeting critical financial obligations, such as rent and utilities. To help the client maintain stable housing and uninterrupted utility services while focusing on their recovery, both utility and rental assistance were approved. This support enabled the client to stay housed and continue their treatment without the added stress of financial instability. The client is expected to return to work at the end of April, and the Case Manager will continue to assist throughout this transition.
- The second client, who had recently faced significant hardship, requested assistance with rent after being laid off and losing her mother, who had also provided additional financial support. After several months of job searching, the client secured a new position that will help restore her financial stability. In light of her circumstances, rental assistance was approved to support her in regaining stability and covering housing expenses as she transitions into her new employment.

NAC Enrichment Classes

- Young Chefs participants learned how to create unique cuisine based on a "lunch" theme.
- The first week involved making elevated grilled cheese sandwiches by using garlic bread and pepperoni. Participants took turns customizing their sandwich and grilling them on the flat griddle.
- The additional two weeks involved making chicken parmesan sliders and naan flat bread pizzas.
- Our final recipe was a turkey, spinach, and pesto panini. Participants learned what ingredients make pesto and had the chance to use a panini press to cook their custom sandwiches.



CHINO EXPERIENCE TEEN CENTER

Chino Experience Teen Center/Teen Programs Activities

- The Before and After School shuttling services continued for students attending Chino High School, Don Lugo High School, Magnolia Jr. High School, Ramona Jr. High School, and 7th and 8th graders enrolled at Briggs Fundamental.
- Teen Center staff are preparing for Glow-in-the-Dark Easter Egg Hunt on April 11, at Ayala Park Stadium.

Teen Opportunity Program (TOP)

Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 53 participants for a total of 175 units of service. The Aging Services Coordinator worked with various participants on applications for rental and utility assistance. Direct services included legal aid, food resources, low-income housing lists, and Medi-Cal & Cal-Fresh renewal forms. In addition, 77 resources and referrals were provided to participants throughout the month.

Success Story

PROJECTS UPDATE

CHINO RANCHO PARK SITE DEVELOPMENT–2018 PARKS BOND ACT

Project Status:

- Grand Opening held March 29, 2025.
- Preparing Notice of Completion and finalizing administrative items.

Scope of Work:

- The Statewide Park Development and Community Revitalization Program (SPP)–2018 Parks Bond Act appropriated \$254,942,000 to be awarded through a competitive grant process. The SPP is administered by the State of California Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services (OGALS). The purpose of the program is to create new parks and new recreation opportunities in underserved communities across California.
- In October 2019, staff submitted a grant application for the development of a new 1.3-acre park on the south/east corner of Central Avenue and Phillips Boulevard. The new park site will include two pickle ball courts, an inclusive playground, outdoor fitness stations, walking trails, picnic shelter, restroom, open space, City of Chino entry monument sign, and parking lot.



AYALA PARK ACCESSIBILITY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT–PHASE I

Project Status:

- The grand re-opening for Softball Field 1-4 took place on February 22, 2025.
- Preparing Notice of Completion and finalizing administrative items.
- Additional items, such as wooden backstops, replacement of the existing American flag, minor adjustments to Building D, and additional signage, to be added.

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- Staff continues to work with the Design Consultant and Public Works CIP Team to coordinate the plan and bid packages and schedule the timing of construction.
- Staff anticipates a bid solicitation by end of fiscal year 2025.

Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with the California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will consist of design services to develop a conceptual plan and construction documents for the removal of the old playground equipment and existing rubber/sand surfacing and replacing it with new all-inclusive playground equipment, rubber play surface throughout, new shade sails, park benches, and LED lighting for the playground area.
- The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project will consist of accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building.

LIBRARY EXTERIOR PAINT PROJECT

Project Status:

- Staff is soliciting additional bids to ensure this work is completed at a competitive cost.
- Work is anticipated to begin in spring 2025 to avoid the rainy season.



Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Library Exterior Paint project consists of painting the entire exterior of the facility. This will include prepping and painting of all exterior wall surfaces, doors, handrails, roof flashing, rain gutters, and monument signs.

MONTE VISTA PARK-TEEN CENTER ROOF REPLACEMENT AND PAINT PROJECT

Project Status:

- With the purchase order for procuring roofing material approved, staff is now working on the required documents for the bid process.
- Work is anticipated to start after the conclusion of summer programs in 2025.



Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Monte Vista Park-Teen Center Roof Replacement project will consist of a full replacement down to the substrate level and replacement of all roofing layers. This will include having the roof re-sloped for proper drainage, replacement of adjacent fascia boards as needed, new metal flashing, and new roof shingles. The entire replacement project will bring the Teen Center roof into compliance with Title 24 Energy Efficiency Standards.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER DEMONSTRATION GARDEN PROJECT

Project Status:

- The Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project is currently in the design phase, including the recently added ADA compliance improvements.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project will consist of designing and constructing a drought tolerant garden on the east side of the Carolyn Owens Community Center. The Demonstration Garden will feature climate appropriate, drought-tolerant plantings and irrigation systems, along with identification signage, decomposed granite walkways, drinking fountain, walkway lighting, and park benches.

APOC BATTING CAGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Project Status:

- Currently, posted for formal bids and set to close on April 10, 2025.

Scope of Work:

- The scope of work for the APOC Batting Cage Replacement Project includes the removal and replacement of pitching machines, token boxes, and ball conveyor system. New wiring will be installed as part of this project.

PARK AND BUILDING MANAGEMENT**Grounds Division**

- Poured concrete slabs for trash receptacles at Villa, Liberty, Heritage, and Mountain View Parks.
- Replaced the slide at 9th Street Park.
- Repaired broken main line on Field #1 at Ayala Park.

Building Management**Work Requests:**

- Facilities Maintenance completed a total 84 work orders during the month.

Notable Activities/Special Projects:

- Brought power to the Public Works sewer shed to ensure they have light, as well as to be able to charge their cordless equipment.
- Installed a new gate operator for City Hall South vehicle entrance.
- Staff worked with Public Works Grounds staff to repair a water main at Ayala Park Building C.
- Replaced the water fill station on 2nd floor of City Hall North.
- Roof repairs identified during the recent rainstorms were completed at City Hall North.
- Assisted with the final touches at Chino Rancho Park to ensure everything was ready for the grand opening.
