IV. CEREMONIAL

1. Introduction of Returning Department Staff Member – Lizzeth Ordonez, Management Analyst:

Ms. Ordonez stated she is the new Community Services, Parks & Recreation, Management Analyst for Parks and Facilities Division. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Cal Poly Pomona and a Master of Public Administration from California Baptist University. She has worked for the City of Chino for almost 15 years, and recently, in the Administration Department, where she supported the City Manager with a wide range of administrative and analytical functions, including budget oversight, fiscal forecasting, contracts, and special projects. Prior to that, she held leadership roles with the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Department, where she managed multi-million dollar budgets and grants,

helped with the implementation of five Family Resource Centers in partnership with the Chino Valley Unified School District, and fostered strong collaborations with community organizations and agencies.

Ms. Ordonez stated in addition to her professional career in Chino, she was recently appointed to the Community, Parks, and Human Services Commission for the City of Fontana. In her new position with the City of Chino, she will be responsible for the division's budget, processing contractual agreements, preparing budget and status reports for federal, state, and county grants, and preparing annual budget recommendations. She will monitor expenditures and revenues across multiple funds, including Building Maintenance, Parks and Internal Service Funds, Custodial Services, and Capital Improvement Projects.

2. Introduction of Newly Promoted Department Staff Member – Crystal Rios, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator:

Ms. Rios stated she is honored to serve as the new Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator. She oversees the Preserve Community Center and Volunteer Corps. She has been with the City of Chino for three years, and most recently, as a Specialist at the Preserve Community Center. During her time with the City, she has had the privilege of supporting a variety of programs, including Special Events, After School, Senior Center, and Youth Sports.

Ms. Rios stated she has is a first-generation college graduate, earning her bachelor of science degree in nutrition and food science from California State University, San Bernardino. She is the proud daughter of two immigrant parents who instilled in her the value of hard work and community.

Ms. Rios stated she is excited to continue serving the community in this new role and looks forward to the opportunities ahead.

VI. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

Chairperson Martinez opened the Public Communications.

Stubby Barr stated he was not able to attend the last meeting, but noticed on the minutes that Commissioner Takeuchi had made some comments regarding decomposed granite (DG) and the difficulty with the walking surface. It is not an approved walking surface and does not meet the

requirements of the building code or ADA. Mr. Barr provided two photos he took of the DGG path at the new park in the Preserve. He wheeled out about 10 feet in his road chair, which has coasters that are 1½ inches wide that are specifically designed and are soft for traveling over less that perfect surfaces which left an impression in the DG. The DG had just been re-tamped the day before with a vibratory tap that is not supposed to be used on DG. This is the same issue that is seen in several places, such as the barn at the Old Schoolhouse Museum. DG is not an approved material unless it is installed in such a manner that it meets the requirements of the ADA and building code in that it must be firm, stable, and slip resistant. The rule of thumb in the field is if you can take your finger and draw a line in the dirt, it does not meet the requirements of the code. He attached contact information to the Federal Highway Administration Department of Justice Access Board DOT approved memo, which is the guideline for surfaces. If they want to see a stabilized DG that actually meets the requirements of ADA, the only local place would be the Kaiser facility on Roswell Avenue. They have a phenolic stabilized DG. It is not your typical DG. They graduate the pebbles so that they are really similar in size and then bound with a phenolic resin, or it can be bound with epoxy. It is not as water soluble as standard decomposed granite, but it is stable.

Mr. Barr recommended the Commission go and look at it. It is a long and lengthy process, but it is something that the City needs to stop doing because we are going to have to replace all of these walking surfaces to make them compliant.

As there were no further requests to speak, Chairperson Martinez closed the Public Communications.

Flor Hernandez, TAC Chairperson, gave the report. Ms. Hernandez reported the Teen Advisory Committee (TAC) is hosting their first service project of the year, which is a Halloween costume drive that will benefit the CARE Closet. Donation boxes will be located at the Carolyn Owens Community Center, Preserve Community Center, Neighborhood Activity Center, and Teen Center. The costume drive will conclude on Wednesday, October 8.

Ms. Hernandez reported TAC members had the opportunity to sign up to volunteer at many community events, including the Halloween Spooktacular, Veterans Day Ceremony, and the Inclusion Community Celebration. At the Inclusion Community Celebration, TAC members will lead an interactive bubble station for participants.

Ms. Hernandez reported at their September meeting, TAC members voted for Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary. During the roundtable, members discussed being back at school, getting ready for homecoming, and preparing for Club Rush.

The next Teen Advisory Committee meeting will be held on Thursday, October 2, at 6:00 p.m., in the Council Chambers.

Chairperson Martinez stated congratulations and he looks forward to working with them.

Commissioner Arlt stated congratulations, but also thanked them for giving of their time and serving the community. Commissioner Arlt stated she sees herself in them because she started out volunteering in the community when she was in high school, and maybe someday one of them will be a Commissioner too.

Commissioner Cooper stated congratulations and he appreciates all they do.

VIII. INFORMATION

1. Fireworks Update 2025:

Lisa Conlon, Revenue Manager, provided an update on the 2025 Ms. Conlon reported 24 retail sales permits were fireworks season. approved by the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Commission on April 28, 2025. The permits for the sale of safe and sane fireworks were issued to the non-profit organizations by the Finance Department. Sales took place from July 1-4. This year, there were no violations of the Chino Municipal Code reported. The total surcharge collected from each booth averaged 4.17% per organization. The surcharge is calculated based on the City's additional costs incurred by Public Works, Police, and All organizations paid on time except Chino marketing services. Neighborhood House. They submitted their financial statement after the first due date on September 12. They were assessed a \$300 late fee, which they paid. Total gross sales totaled \$1,424,678.93; net profit was \$380,945.61; and the average profit generated was \$15,872.73.

Ms. Conlon reported this year was the first year the non-profit organizations returned their unsold stock to a centralized location in Chino. As far as staff heard, that went well. The Fireworks Retail Stand Operators' Forum is scheduled for October 2, to hear directly from the non-profit organizations and gather their feedback.

Chairperson Martinez noted for the record he received an email relating to illegal fireworks that was sent to the City Council as well. He asked if the fines collected went to the City or just to the Police Department.

Ms. Conlon stated she did not know, but could look into it and follow-up.

Council Member Karen Comstock stated the money from the fines does not go to the Police Department, but to the City's General Fund when we collect it. We are not always able to collect on the fines, but make every effort to do so.

Chairperson Martinez asked if the 59 Police Officers deployed were focused on fireworks alone or were they handling regular patrol calls as well.

Council Member Comstock stated the City is spit into sections at Riverside Drive, north and south sections, because of the volume of calls. The majority of those cars would be two-person and some of them are strictly designed as fireworks cars and some are designated first responders. It is the total deployment for the operational period of fireworks.

2. Facilities and Contract Classes:

Melanie Hughes, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Hughes reported from July 2024 through June 2025, a total of 188 facility rentals were booked across our sites, including the Chino Community Building, Neighborhood Activity Center, Carolyn Owens Community Center, and Senior Center. Rental revenue reach \$197,382, exceeding the total from the previous year. A notable update included installation of new drapes in the Community Building auditorium. which offered a clean and versatile backdrop that allows renters to personalize the space to suit their event décor. Our facilities continue to undergo year-round maintenance to ensure we meet the needs and expectation of the renters. This fiscal year, park pavilion shelters received strong interest with approximately 287 resident and 132 non-resident reservations, which brought in \$49,380 in revenue. Some of the most popular reservable parks included Ayala, Cypress Trails, Mountain View, Shady Grove, and Discovery. Staff was also excited to announce that Stueve Family Park is the newest addition to the list of reservable shelters. which will be available to both residents and non-residents starting January 2026.

Ms. Hughes reported there are currently 22 independent contract instructors offering 355 classes with 1,773 registrations in the 2024-25 fiscal year. New offerings this past year include yoga with Angela Saucedo and a summer session of Chess Wizards with Serge Cisneros. Staff is in the process of onboarding instructors for Folklorico dance and Pickleball, which are expected to begin next season. Contract Classes continue to offer a wide range of popular recreation programs, including karate, computer instruction, horseback riding, drawing, gymnastics, ice skating, body sculpting, piano, and ballet.

3. SOAR/RAAP After School Programs and Tiny Tots:

Crystal Gutierrez, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Gutierrez reported the Tiny Tots program serves children ages 3-5½ within two levels, Junior and Plus. Tiny Tots activities help develop fine motor skills, positive interactions, movement, and introduction to alphabets and numbers in a creative play environment. Participants learn these skills through art, literacy, singing, and daily

activities. The Creative Explorers program allows participants to explore their creativity through artwork and imaginative play with themed activities. The themes this year included Halloween Harvest, Spring Chicks, and Puppy Love.

Ms. Gutierrez reported in collaboration with the Chino Valley Unified School District, the SOAR (Students On A Rise) program is held at five elementary school sites that include Anna Borba, Alicia Cortez, Doris Dickson, E.J. Marshall, and Walnut Elementary Schools. Each SOAR site is a no-cost program for transitional kindergarten through 8th grade participants. Each school site follows a 20:1 participant to staff ratio. Each site is projected to have 100 participants enrolled by December. The SOAR curriculum follows the six points of service quality standards for expanded learning programs set by the State of California Department of Education, which include active and engaged learning; safe and supportive environment; skill building; leadership; healthy choices and behaviors; and diversity, access, and equity. With these quality standards in mind, staff has developed themed curriculum for the school year.

Ms. Gutierrez reported the RAAP (Ramona After School Achievement Program) is held at Ramona Jr. High School. Currently, there are 49 participants who complete their homework and participate in enrichment activities. RAAP activities include art, team building, skill building, and a monthly career day.

Ms. Gutierrez reported the SOAR program will celebrate Lights on Afterschool on October 23. Lights on Afterschool is a nationwide event that advocates the importance of after school programs to keep kids safe, engaged, and supported during after school hours.

Commissioner Arlt asked for clarification on the monthly career day.

Ms. Gutierrez stated they try to have a monthly career day at the RAAP program to teach participants about various careers they can explore to help them get ready for college. They might want to take certain classes when they get to high school.

Commissioner Arlt stated it was the frequency and the fact they have career day every month was impressive.

Commissioner Cooper asked if the RAAP program was custodial care or drop in.

Ms. Gutierrez stated staff signs the participants in. They enroll with the school district. There is a roster and staff serves those students.

Commissioner Cooper asked if the participants could check themselves out.

Ms. Gutierrez stated participants can check out at 4:00 p.m., and they are able to walk home with parent permission.

4. High Five and PALS:

Hayley Page, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Page reported the City offers the High Five After School program located at the Preserve Community Center and is offered to the students at Cal Aero Preserve Academy. High Five is available to Chino Valley Unified School District students in PM kindergarten through 8th grade. The High Five program is available on school days from school dismissal until 6:00 p.m. The program began in July and currently has 130 participants across all Cal Aero Tracks. During High Five, participants receive daily homework assistance and enriching programming provided by City staff. Enrichment activities include STEM, arts and crafts, food activities, and team building games. Each program has daily rotations that include science experiments, outdoor games, crafts, sports, and outdoor play. High Five continues to partner with Healthy Chino, striving to increase healthy lifestyle options; KAMS, Kids Affirmation Through Mentorship and Sports; San Bernardino County Library; and Chino Creek Wetlands to provide engaging lessons and activities for participants. The Healthy Chino fall curriculum began mid-September and KAMS will be visiting in early 2026.

Ms. Page reported PALS stands for Positive Actions for Life Success and is designed to help students do better in school by helping participants develop positive social skills with others and healthy self-esteem. PALS Specialists provide 30-minute lessons for nine weeks to small groups of 2-4 participants in kindergarten through third grade. The PALS program takes place at 11 elementary schools in Chino. Currently, PALS is in their fall session and all sites will be starting lessons in October. PALS is a Tier 2 service. Students are selected to be in PALS by one of the following criteria: Staff concern (teacher, administration, MTSS-B Counselor) through an At-Risk Screener Form; parent request (in writing to administrator through parent); and other data/concerns (discipline and attendance data). PALS participants learn with books, games, puppets, and crafts. PALS Specialists facilitate the group lessons and topics focus on building self-confidence; increasing self-esteem; making good choices and accepting personal responsibility; developing and maintaining healthy friendships; being assertive and communicating in a positive way; and solving problems, settling conflicts, and respecting the rights of others.

Ms. Page reported new to the 2025-2026 school year is pre- and postassessments for PALS participants. Teachers will be provided with a digital survey for each participant twice during the program. Once prior to participants starting and one at the conclusion of the program. The pre and post assessment will be essential in measuring participant growth, creating program improvements, and demonstrating the overall impact of the PALS program.

Chairperson Martinez stated he appreciates that the City's programming continues to evolve and keeps getting better.

Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included Boxing Foundation meeting, first Teen Advisory Committee meeting of the year, Saturday Night Fights, and watched a live stream of one of the Council meetings.

Commissioner Takeuchi reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included both Council meetings and Fireworks Review Sub-Committee meeting. She stated she is looking forward to the meeting with the fireworks booth operators on October 2, for their feedback. Vice Chairperson Jerry reported on meetings and events attended, and parks visited since the last meeting, which included the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee meeting, Chino Cares Emergency Preparedness Fair, Council meetings, announced the 46th Annual Milkcan game, and Stueve Family Park Grand Opening. Vice Chairperson Jerry reported parks look good. There are gophers at Cypress Trails Park as well. He thanked staff for a job well done.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- SOAR and High Five After School programs offered activities promoting health and cultural awareness. Participants celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month through fun and meaningful cultural projects.
- ➤ RAAP participants at Ramona Junior High built new connections and teamwork skills through a giant parachute activity focused on shared interests.
- ➤ The San Bernardino County Library visited Doris Dickson, E.J. Marshall, and Alicia Cortez SOAR After School programs to facilitate a story and craft session for participants.
- ➤ SOAR and High Five introduced the Healthy Chino Kids initiative featuring wellness-themed activities, such as word searches and salad-making crafts.





CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

Letter Learners Program

- ➤ Thirty-four children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a "get your wiggles out" activity and guided them in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, story time, and exploring the letters B-E. The program is suitable for toddlers and preschoolers.

Around the World with Crafts Program

- Twenty-six children and family members participated in the new program offered weekly on Wednesdays.
- > The program ties in crafts from around the world to cultures in the Chino community.
- Families are guided through a different culture each month. September crafts included Chinese paper lanterns, paper chain dragons, paper plate hand fans, and paper plate Pandas.
- ➤ The program is suitable for preschoolers through elementary school.

First Friday CYM Lab

➤ Seventy-eight participants attended First Friday CYM Lab on September 5, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM "burping bag" chemistry experiment and the participants explored the interactive exhibits.

Birthday Parties

- ➤ Two private birthday parties were booked. Twenty-six guests attended one and thirty-eight attended the other. Both parties explored the Museum's exhibits and play activities.
- > Staff led a birthday party scavenger hunt and awarded prizes at both parties.
- ➤ Both families received \$150 worth of free child admission day passes for future use, which was part of their party packages.

Tours

- One private tour was booked by Little Angels Preschool. Four adults and eighteen children toured the Museum.
- ➤ Staff led an educational and historical tour through the Museum, guided children in making butter, and encouraged all guests to play and explore the eight hands-on exhibits that resemble a small town.

Memberships

Five family membership packages were sold.

Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors

➤ The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors held their Executive Meeting and Board Meeting on September 23. They confirmed hosting a trunk-or-treat station at the Halloween Spooktacular and talked about Santa's Village.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS

Family Counseling

- ➤ Human Services provided services to 48 participants for a total of 180 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- ➤ The CDBG program provided counseling services to 13 participants for a total of 61 units of services.

Volunteers

Human Services had 18 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 791.25 hours.

Bachelor Intern Volunteers

➤ Two case management interns pursuing their bachelor's degree in social work were selected to shadow Case Managers at the Hope Family Resource Center, Chino Senior Center, Chino Human Services, and Neighborhood Activity Center.

Proclamation

Mayor Ulloa proclaimed September as Suicide Prevention Awareness Month during the City Council meeting. Human Services accepted the proclamation alongside Wendy Johansen and Stephanie Hedrick-Harwell from San Bernardino County's Behavioral Health Department. The public was encouraged to ask for help and support if struggling with depression or hopelessness by contacting the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, Human Services for ongoing counseling services, or calling 911 for emergencies.

Trainee Recruitment

➤ Chino Human Services attended the Cal State Fullerton Practicum Fair to help recruit new volunteer Counselors for spring 2026. The program Coordinator accepted resumes from potential students and interviews are scheduled for October.

Outreach

Chino Human Services attended the Healthy Chino Mental Health Mobile Stop on September 12, spreading the word on counseling services for the community. Additionally, Chino Human Services attended the City of Chino Employee Benefits Fair on September 18, reminding employees of free counseling services for all City staff and immediate family members.



HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- ➤ The Homeless Outreach Team is comprised of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator/Assistant Coordinator and Chino Police Department Quality-of-Life Team. The team focuses on providing street outreach to individuals who are displaced. Staff provides direct resources to services, such as rehab centers, transitional housing, permanent housing, or family reunification. The goal of the team is to provide individuals with wraparound services and create a case plan with goals to obtain permanent housing.
- ➤ Homeless Outreach provided services to 10 duplicated clients and 20 new clients for a total of 45 units of service. One client exited the streets.
- ➤ The Quality-of-Life and Chino Homeless Outreach Teams joined forces in a coordinated, multi-agency effort to address homelessness-related crimes, while ensuring that individuals in need were connected to vital services. Working in partnership with the Ontario Police Department's Community Engagement Team and Upland Police Department's IMPACT Team, the operation targeted border areas and shared corridors between the three cities, strengthening collective impact across jurisdictions. Homeless Outreach Coordinators from both Chino and Ontario played a central role by offering shelter, and substance abuse and mental health resources to those open to support. Together, the teams made contact with 55 individuals, resulting in 15 arrests and four citations, while also providing resource opportunities to 28 people, 10 of whom accepted assistance. In addition, 10 encampments were identified and cleared, none of which were within Chino, but rather in county pockets or in the neighboring cities participating in the collaboration.

- ➤ In partnership with Love Like Joe Foundation and All-American Express Carwash, the drive-thru Thanksgiving Giveaway is scheduled for November 22, at the Chino Senior Center, from 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. (Clients will select a one-hour session time to arrive).
- > All participants must register for the giveaway. The event is open to Chino Valley Unified School District enrolled families or Chino residents with no income requirements.
- ➤ In-person registration will be held at the Neighborhood Activity Center on Saturday, October 11, from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m., and Tuesday, October 14, from 11:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m.; on-line registration begins on Saturday, October 11, from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Flyers with the QR code to register have been sent out to all City facilities and a social media post has been advertised.

Holiday Giveaway

- ➤ The City of Chino Holiday Toy Drive and Food Basket Giveaway partners with Chino Neighborhood House to support low-income Chino families with gifts for the kids and food baskets.
- ➤ Children (ages 0-12) are enrolled to attend the Chino Neighborhood House Christmas event scheduled for December 19, at the Community Building.
- ➤ Through monetary sponsors and the Adopt-a-Family program, children (ages 13-17) are provided with gifts and food baskets while supplies last.
- Monetary sponsors are needed and organizations that would like to Adopt-a-Family can complete the sponsorship application.
- ➤ In-person registration at the Neighborhood Activity Center will be held on Saturday, October 11, from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.; and Tuesday, October 14, from 11:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. After in-person registration, participants can reach out to the HOPE Family Resource Center.

HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- ➤ HOPE enrolled 103 new families to receive various resources resulting in 868 units of service
- ➤ The Emergency Assistance Program successfully assisted 3 families with rental assistance in the amount of \$5,896, preventing them from becoming homeless. The program also assisted 2 clients with utility assistance in the amount of \$4,921, and 1 family with an eight-night stay at a local motel.
 - One of the families that received assistance with her SoCal Gas had already had her gas turned off and was struggling to pay her past due balance due to having a medical condition preventing her from working. Her application was approved and her full bill was covered, allowing her to provide more adequate living conditions for her son.
- Using donation funds, HOPE was able to assist a family with a refrigerator to meet their basic needs. The family was using a mini fridge and was unable to store quality groceries and caused them to spend more funds purchasing food from fast food restaurants. The family was very appreciative of the assistance.

- ➤ Outreach efforts were made at Legacy Academy Back-to-School night, Chino Cares Preparedness Fair, Stueve Park Grand Opening, Ana Borba Elementary, and Inclusion Community Celebration.
- McKinney-Vento students requesting tutoring assistance have been connected to a tutor and have begun their one-on-one tutoring sessions. They are granted 20 hours of support.

E.X.C.E.L. Program

- ➤ The first EXCEL meeting of the school year took place on September 17. High school students were invited to enroll and will have ongoing participation in future workshops.
- Case Managers enrolled eight students during the initial workshop. Students received a "High School Survival Kit," a planner, enjoyed pizza, and discussed their goals and values for the school year.
- > EXCEL is a mentorship program that presents opportunities for students to explore college and career options and will greatly focus on building life skills.



CARE Closet

- ➤ The CARE Closet provided services to 124 individuals. This included the distribution of emergency hygiene supplies to 31 families and clothing to 46 children.
- > The Closet received donations of blankets from the Alternative Education Center. Community members continue to deliver lightly used clothes to add to the Care Closet.

TYKES

- > TYKES enrolled 22 new families to receive case management support and continued to provide services to 57 families.
- > Two new participants enrolled in the Parents as Teachers program making a total of six participants enrolled overall. Case managers anticipate two clients completing the program next month.
- Case managers continue to add clients to the interest list to be scheduled for sessions as availability opens up.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- ➤ The PALS Specialists began receiving caseloads from MTSS-B Counselors and sent permission slips to parents. Once permission slips were collected, Specialists coordinated with teachers to formulate a PALS session schedule.
- > PALS sessions began at Briggs Elementary School.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

➤ Hike the Valley took place on September 6, at Bell View Trail Loop in Trabuco Canyon. Participants enjoyed a four-mile hike. Once the hike concluded, hikers enjoyed healthy snacks.



Garden Workshop

➤ Healthy Chino hosted a Community Garden Workshop on September 20. The workshop's topic was "Preparing Your Fall Garden," and was led by a San Bernardino County Master Gardener. Participants learned how to get their home gardens ready for the fall season.



Children's Discovery Workshop

➤ The Children's Discovery Workshop took place on September 20. The workshop's topic was "The Magic of Fall Gardens." At the workshop, participants prepared for fall by making pumpkins.



Outreach

➤ Healthy Chino hosted an Outreach booth at the Employee Benefits Fair on September 18, Stueve Family Park Grand Opening on September 20, and Inclusion Community Celebration on September 27. Participants who visited the booth were able to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs, workshops, and events.

Health Workshops

In collaboration with Inland Empire Health Plan (IEHP), Healthy Chino hosted a Health Workshop on September 5. The workshop was held at the Senior Center. The topic was "Weight Management: Healthy Living." Participants learned how to incorporate healthy eating habits into their everyday lives.



Mobile Stops

Healthy Chino partnered with City of Chino Human Services to host an Outreach booth at the Preserve Community Center on September 12. Participants learned about mental health and received information about City of Chino Human Services resources. Healthy Chino concluded their Mobile Stops with a Community Walk at the Chino Creek Wetlands on September 13.



Preserve Healthy Grilling

➤ Healthy Chino staff led a Healthy Grilling Workshop at the Preserve Parkhouse on September 13. Preserve residents learned smart grilling techniques and healthy eating tips, while creating salmon cucumber salad.

Stueve Family Park Grand Opening

- ➤ Stueve Family Park, located at 16050 East Preserve Loop, features pickleball and basketball courts, barbecues, shaded picnic area, and acres of green space for the community to enjoy.
- ➤ The grand opening was held on September 20, from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.
- Mayor Eunice Ulloa and the Chino City Council helped cut the ribbon to officially open the park.
- Over 150 guests attended the celebration, including Stueve family members from across the country.
- > Staff served coffee, milk, fruit, and pastries throughout the event.
- Tri Pointe Homes served fresh lemonade and gave out pickle balls.
- > Staff handed out tote bags and water bottles.
- > Staff held pickleball demonstrations and basketball free throw contests.



Inclusion Community Celebration

- ➤ In partnership with Adrian's World, Autism Society Inland Empire, Behavior Highway, and Chino Youth Museum, the City of Chino hosted its second annual Inclusion Community Celebration.
- ➤ The event was held at the Neighborhood Activity Center, D Street, and 7th Street on September 27, from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.
- ➤ The block party-style event provided an inclusive and welcoming space for the special needs community to enjoy a resource fair featuring over 30 vendors, engaging sensory rooms, fun zone with inflatable games, bubble-making station, DJ, and petting zoo.
- ➤ Chino Police Department provided food to all participants and free ice cream was generously donated by the Chino Valley Lions Club.
- > The event introduced Skate Connection which featured skate ramps designed to be both ADA-compliant and accessible for individuals with special needs.

Halloween Spooktacular

- ➤ Halloween Spooktacular will be held on October 31, at Ayala Park, from 4:00-9:00 p.m.
- > Staff is recruiting sponsors, game booths, craft booths, and trunk-or-treat vendors. There are currently 25 trunk-or-treat and candy booths secured.

Assistance was offered in areas such as completing new Medi-Cal applications, renewing FAFSA forms, submitting job applications, and navigating innetwork medical providers for client needs. The Case Manager provided resources for affordable housing, employment agencies, legal aid, rental and utility assistance, food distribution sites, and mental health couseling services.

➤ Case Manager provided support to a client who had recently lost their second job. This added financial strain and caused them to fall behind on their rent. As a result of falling behind on rent, the client was facing eviction and growing legal fees. The City of Chino approved the client for rental assistance, which will prevent eviction and provide financial support. The client was able to pay legal fees and late fees on their own as well as securing a second job in the process.

PROJECTS UPDATE

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- ➤ Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to coordinate the plan and bid packages, and schedule the timing of construction.
- > Staff anticipates a bid solicitation in winter 2025.
- The scope of work will expand to include the renovation of the basketball court and remaining hardscape areas adjacent to the basketball court for an overall cohesive improvement project.

Scope of Work:

- ➤ In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with the California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will consist of design services to develop a conceptual plan and construction documents for the removal of the old playground equipment and existing rubber/sand surfacing and replacing it with new all-inclusive playground equipment, rubber play surface throughout, new shade sails, park benches, and LED lighting for the playground area.
- ➤ The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project will consist of accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building.

MONTE VISTA PARK-TEEN CENTER ROOF REPLACEMENT AND PAINT PROJECT

Project Status:

- > This project has to be competitively bid per the California Public Contract Code.
- ➤ A mandatory pre-bid meeting was conducted on September 18, 2025. Bids were due October 9, 2025.
- > Staff is reviewing the bids with an anticipated award date of November 18, 2025.





Scope of Work:

The scope of work for the Monte Vista Park—Teen Center Roof Replacement and Paint project will consist of a full replacement down to the substrate level and replacement of all roofing layers. This will include having the roof re-sloped for proper drainage, replacement of adjacent fascia boards as needed, new metal flashing, and new roof shingles. The roof replacement will bring the Teen Center roof into compliance with Title 24 Energy Efficiency Standards. Additionally, this project will include new paint to enhance the aesthetics of the facility.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER DEMONSTRATION GARDEN PROJECTProject Status:

The Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project is currently in the design phase, including the recently added ADA compliance improvements.

Scope of Work:

➤ The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Demonstration Garden project will consist of designing and constructing a drought tolerant garden on the east side of the Carolyn Owens Community Center. The Demonstration Garden will feature climate appropriate, drought-tolerant plantings and irrigation systems, along with identification signage, decomposed granite walkways, drinking fountain, walkway lighting, and park benches.

CAROLYN OWENS COMMUNITY CENTER PLAYGROUND & ADA IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

➤ The Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA project is currently in the design phase.

Scope of Work:

The scope of work for the Carolyn Owens Community Center Playground and ADA project will consist of designing and installing a new tot lot playground adjacent to the future demonstration garden. The intended design for the future tot lot playground will be a nature-themed playground that will tie into the demonstration garden. Additional scope of work will include accessibility improvements to walkways on the east side of the facility. The tot lot and accessibility improvements project will coincide with the demonstration garden project to minimize disruption and avoid construction impacts on the property.

LIBERTY PARK-PICNIC PAVILION REPAIR PROJECT

Project Status:

➤ The Liberty Park-Picnic Pavilion Repair project is currently in the agreement phase. The project is scheduled for November 2025.

Scope of Work:

➤ The scope of work for the Liberty Park-Picnic Pavilion Repair Project will include replacing the existing shingle roofing system and underlying oriented strand board (OSB) roof substrate, as well as repainting the entire structure. Additional improvements will include reinforcing the base of the pavilion frame with metal sleeves to strengthen the structure and protect it from damage caused by weather and other environmental factors.

CITY HALL - COUNCIL CHAMBERS LED LIGHTS CONVERSION PROJECT

Project Status:

➤ The City Hall- Council Chambers LED Lights Conversion project has recently finished the agreement phase. The project is scheduled for November 2025.

Scope of Work:

The scope of work for the City Hall-Council Chambers LED Lights Conversion Project will include replacing all existing light fixtures in the main Council Chambers, Closed Session Room, adjacent kitchen, and storage rooms with new LED light fixtures. Additional improvements will include installing a permanent ceiling-mounted light fixture to illuminate the mission statement, designed to match the new lighting being installed throughout the area. All new LED fixtures will conform to Title 24 Building Energy Efficiency Standards to ensure compliance with current state requirements.

APOC BATTING CAGES REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Project Status:

- ➤ The City Council awarded a contract to DLJ Development on June 3, 2025.
- ➤ Construction began October 13, 2025, and will be completed before the end of the calendar year.
- ➤ A social media notification has been provided of the upcoming closure.

Scope of Work:

➤ The scope of work for the APOC Batting Cages Replacement Project includes the removal and replacement of pitching machines, token boxes, and ball conveyor system. New wiring will also be installed as part of this project.

CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM INTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Proiect Status:

> Staff is in the process of finalizing proposals to make ADA improvements to the facility. The exhibit component will be bid separately as an RFP to specialized firms.

Scope of Work:

Improve interior accessibility by completing high priority items identified in the ADA Transition Plan and other related improvements.

SHADY GROVE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

Staff is reviewing and evaluating design proposals.

Scope of Work:

Accessibility improvements and playground replacement. Construction is scheduled for FY 2026-27.

HERITAGE PARK IMPROVEMENTS DESIGN

Project Status:

Staff is working to refine the design proposal and finalize the scope before awarding a contract for design.

Scope of Work:

Work will include accessibility improvements, playground equipment, and pavilion replacements. Construction is scheduled for FY 2026-27.
