Chairperson Martinez congratulated the seniors, and stated the Commission is proud of them.

VI. PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

Chairperson Martinez opened the Public Communications. As there were no requests to speak, Chairperson Martinez closed the Public Communications.

VII. TEEN ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

Ximena Tapia-Lugo, TAC Chairperson, gave the report. Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported this month, TAC finished their hygiene drive and collected over 100 items from local residents and schools. The proceeds went to Chino Neighborhood House.

Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported TAC members helped at CHINO Days with set up, directing vendors, and checking in entertainment groups. TAC members volunteered at the Easter Bunny Extravaganza and Teen Glow-in-the-Dark Easter Egg Hunt.

Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported at their last meeting, TAC members decided to do a bonding trip to the beach with the Teen Center. This was their final get together before the school term ends, and their goodbye since working together at the start of the school year. They have built strong relationships through volunteering and want TAC to remain a community of teenagers who work together to support one another and help the community.

TAC members had the opportunity to attend the Volunteer Recognition Dinner at the Chaffey College Chino Community Center. TAC members were excited to win raffles prizes and watch a magician perform. Ximena reported that she was recognized as the Youth Volunteer of the Year, which she is very thankful.

Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported TAC members have been helping with filming the social media content for fireworks safety for 4th of July with the CSPR team. The majority of TAC members have been studying for their AP tests coming up next week and have been working hard overall to finish the school year strong.

Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported at the California Park & Recreation Society (CPRS) District II Awards and Installation, she had the honor of receiving the Youth Community Champion Award, and expressed her gratitude to the Commission for the award.

Ms. Tapia-Lugo reported TAC seniors are heading off to college: Adrian to Yale, Jazzy to U.C. Santa Barbara, Kale to the New Mexico Military Institute, Bridget to U.C. San Diego, and Ximena to U.C. Berkeley.

The next and final TAC meeting of the school year will be held on Thursday, May 1, in the Council Chambers at 6:00 pm.

Chairperson Martinez stated the awards Ximena received are well deserved.

VIII. ACTION ITEM

1. Fireworks Retail Permit Approvals 2025:

Silvia Avalos, Director of Community Services, Parks & Recreation, gave the report. Ms. Avalos reported the City received 26 Fireworks Retail Permit Applications. Twenty-four applications were from returning non-profit organizations approved to operate booths in 2024. Staff received additional applications from Abba Love Church and Our Lady of Guadalupe, which were not processed as all returning organizations submitted complete applications and have first priority. The Sub-Committee determined that maintaining the current 24 booths will allow the community to support the established returning groups.

Ms. Avalos reported on April 4, 2025, the Commission's Fireworks Review Sub-Committee met with staff to review the applications. Staff provided an overview of the applications received and reported all groups met the reporting requirements. Two of the applicants requested to relocate their booths. One was Chino Cowboy Huddle, which requested to move from the Superior Shopping Center on Central Avenue to the Smart & Final Shopping Center on Central Avenue. CHAPPS requested to move from their 7-Eleven location on the northwest corner of Central and Frances Avenues to the Superior Shopping Center on Central Avenue.

Ms. Avalos reported the recommendation is that the Commission approves the 2025 Fireworks Retail Permits to the 24 returning non-profit organizations and approve Chino Cowboy Huddle and CHAPPS booth relocations.

Chairperson Martinez asked when an organization wants to move from one location to another, do they seek pre-approval pending the move.

Vice Chairperson Jerry stated the process begins when the organization requests the move with the application process. Then the request comes to the Sub-Committee for approval of the new location or if there is a conflict. The changes that were brought to the Sub-Committee's attention, were found to have no conflicts and would provide the groups to be in a better location to earn more money.

Vice Chairperson Jerry stated the Sub-Committee decided to keep the number of non-profit groups at 24 so the returning non-profits could make as much money as possible. The Sub-Committee felt that the hardworking groups already in place deserve to have a chance for a bigger paycheck for their organizations, and it is in the best interest of the community and kids in Chino.

Moved by Commissioner Aviles, seconded by Vice Chairperson Jerry, and carried on a 5-0-2-0 vote to approve the Fireworks Review Sub-Committee's recommendation to issue Fireworks Retail Permits to the 24 returning non-profit groups and approval of Chino Cowboy Huddle and CHAPPS to move their booths to new locations.

IX. INFORMATION

1. High Five After School, Seasonal Camps, PALS, and TUPE:

Hayley Page, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Ms. Page reported the City offers Camps for participants in 1st through 8th grades four times a year around the Chino Valley Unified School District's (CVUSD) academic schedule. Families can register for Camp during fall, winter, spring, and summer breaks. Camp is offered Monday through Friday, from 7:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. Camp is closed on holidays. Fall, winter, and spring Camps average 35 participants. In the fall, winter, and spring, participants have the option of attending daily. Summer Camp averages approximately 125 participants with weekly options only for registration. Each seasonal Camp is created with a specific theme with coinciding activities to match the theme. Enrichment activities include STEM arts and crafts, food, outdoor games, sports, and team building activities. The 2025 Summer Camp theme is "Passport Around the World." Each week highlights a different biome and country. Participants will have a chance to explore the deserts of Egypt, the Amazon and Brazil, the Redwood Forests of California, and several countries through enriching and exciting activities. Summer Camp will be held from May 27 through July 25, this year at Monte Vista Park and CrossPoint Church for nine weeks.

During Camp, participants have the chance to attend local field trips with City staff. Upcoming trips for 2025 Summer Camp include a visit to the Discovery Cube, a chance to see Lilo and Stitch at the El Capitan Theatre, and a daytime game at Angel Stadium. Other highlights include an opportunity to create crayons at Lucky Art Crayonology, visit the Santa Ana Zoo, plus soak up the sun and go swimming at Bonelli Park and Fontana Aquatic Center. Ms. Page thanked the Kiwanis Club of Chino for their continued sponsorship of Summer Camp.

Ms. Page reported the City offers the High Five After School program at Cal Aero Preserve Academy. High Five is offered to Chino Valley Unified School District students in PM kindergarten through 8th grade. The High Five program is offered on school days from school dismissal until 6:00 p.m. Online registration for the 2025-2026 school year began on April 11. Applications are accepted via email and will be collected until all tracks are full. Applications and instructions on how to apply can be found on the City of Chino website under High Five.

Ms. Page reported during High Five, participants receive daily homework assistance and enriching programming provided by staff. Enrichment activities include STEM arts and crafts, food activities, and team building games. Each program has daily rotations that include science experiments, outdoor games, DIY crafts, sports, and outdoor play. High Five continues to partner with Healthy Chino, striving to increase healthy lifestyle options; KAMS, Kids Affirmation Through

Mentorship and Sports, to provide engaging lessons and activities for participants; and San Bernardino County Library, and Chino Creek Wetlands. High Five participants attended the Earth Day event at Chino Creek Wetlands in partnership with the Inland Empire Utilities Agency and enjoyed exploring the park and learning about the environment. Participants had a chance to conduct hands-on experiments and view educational presentations. Healthy Chino Kids just concluded in early April, and KAMS will be visiting kindergarten through 3rd graders and Track C and D in May.

Ms. Page reported the Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) program is offered in partnership with the CVUSD and the City of Chino. Chino Specialists, also known as Facilitators, connect with educators at each school site to schedule the assigned TUPE program and visit weekly to teach curriculum designed to educate and prevent smoking in youth. The TUPE program has two programs: You and Me, Vape Free and Project Alert. These programs are taught to all 6th and 7th graders in the CVUSD. Since July 2024 through March 2025, the TUPE program through the City of Chino has served over 2,992 students with 15,793 service contacts. The TUPE program will conclude on May 22, with the end of the CVUSD school year. TUPE Specialists are finalizing lessons for this month.

Ms. Page reported PALS stands for Positive Actions for Life Success and is designed to help students do better in school by helping participants develop positive social skills and self-esteem. PALS Specialists provide 30-minute lessons for nine weeks to small groups of two to four participants for Kindergarten through 3rd grade. The PALS program takes place at 11 elementary schools in Chino. Currently, PALS is in their spring session and all schools will be completing their final lesson in May. From July 2024 through March 2025, the PALS program served over 423 students with 2,481 service contacts.

Vice Chairperson Jerry thanked staff for the programs that support the kids and benefit the community.

Chairperson Martinez asked how do we gauge the success of the TUPE program.

Ms. Page stated it is a grant-based program. They do a pre and post assessment.

2. Preserve Community Center and Volunteers:

Martin Guzman, Community Services, Parks & Recreation Coordinator, gave the report. Mr. Guzman reported the Preserve Community Center (PCC) is a joint youth facility used by CVUSD and Cal Aero Preserve Academy. PCC hours can fluctuate depending on the activities Cal Aero Preserve Academy is running. The normal hours for the Community Center are 3:30-8:00 p.m., Monday through Wednesday, and Friday. On Thursdays, Cal Aero Preserve Academy has a minimum day and students are released early. The facility opens at 1:00 p.m. and closes at 8:00 p.m.; on Saturday, 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.; and closed on Sunday.

Mr. Guzman reported PCC offers open-gym basketball and volleyball to members six days a week. Open-gym volleyball is offered on Tuesday nights from 5:30-7:30 p.m. PCC has two volleyball courts: an adult-sized court and a youth-sized court, and averages approximately 40 participants for volleyball.

Mr. Guzman reported PCC enrichment classes are offered every month. Science Spies, Young Builders, Creative Kids, and Wilderness Survival Camp continue to sell out and have very few absences during the four-week program. Enrichment Classes at PCC have made 240 service contacts this fiscal year.

Mr. Guzman reported Ball N' Brunch is one of the two events hosted at PCC. They offer a day of free open-gym basketball with a light brunch. There are outreach booths, three-point and knockout contests, and prizes for youth participants. This year, Ball N'Brunch had over 90 people visit with this drop-in event.

Mr. Guzman reported the City of Chino Volunteer Corps. is continually recruiting volunteers for the City's many special events and services. Throughout the 2024-25 fiscal year, Community Services, Parks & Recreation has provided 6,293 volunteer hours. Human Services has provided 7,674 volunteer hours totalling 13,966 volunteer hours covered in a eight-month span. On April 16, the City honored our volunteers at the annual Volunteer Recognition Dinner. It was a great night full of laughs, fun, and gratitude. Several volunteers received awards for donating their services within the community.

The Memorial Day event will be held at the Community Building at 10:00 a.m., and will be hosted by the American Legion and City of Chino.

XII. COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Commissioner Arlt – Absent.

Commissioner Aviles reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included the Chino Valley Youth Track and Field Meet, Chino American Opening Day, Ball N' Brunch, Fireworks Review Sub-Committee meeting, Teen Glow-in-the-Dark Easter Egg Hunt, Volunteer Recognition Dinnner, and was a Chalk Art Judge at CHINO Days. Commissioner Aviles reported all parks are looking good. Forest Park has a rocking horse that needs to be replaced and the playground surface has two broken spots. The baseball field at Founders Park still has divots. There are dogs that run around in the baseball diamond, which is still an issue.

Commissioner Mendoza – Absent.

Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included the CPRS District 11 Awards and Installation Banquet, Chino Rancho Park Grand Opening, Chino Youth Museum Arbor Day Celebration, and was a Chalk Art Judge at CHINO Days. Commissioner Montenegro-Olivas reported parks are looking good.

Commissioner Takeuchi reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included the CPRS District 11 Awards and Installation Banquet, both City Council meetings, Volunteer Recognition Dinner, and was a Chalk Art Judge at

CHINO Days. Commissioner Takeuchi reported Walnut Park had a couple of old trees cut down and they need to be recycled. Chino Rancho Park is very well used, and it will be nice if we get the parking situation expanded. She is looking forward to Walnut Park's renovation. Villa Park also needs maintenance on its playground surface.

Vice Chairperson Jerry reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included the CPRS District 11 Awards and Installation Banquet, CHINO Days, Fireworks Review Sub-Committee meeting, and City Council meetings. Vice Chairperson Jerry reported the gazebo at Carolyn Owens Centennial Square needs cleaning. Cypress Trails has a small crack in the playground surface, and there are cracks in the tennis court surfaces that cause puddles when it rains. Chino Community Garden looks fantastic.

Chairperson Martinez reported on meetings and events attended since the last meeting, which included City Council meetings and he worked the beer garden at CHINO Days. Chairperson Martinez reported Monte Vista and Heritage Parks look good.

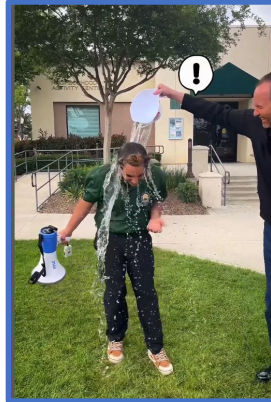

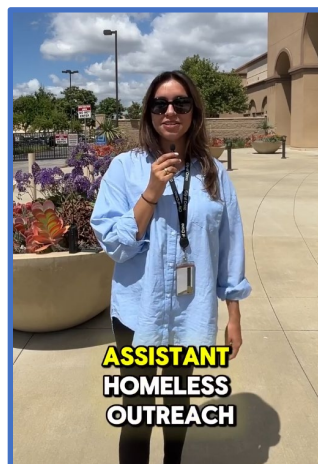
- May was Mental Health Awareness Month. Four posts were made to promote this month. Descriptions and screenshots are below:

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- Anna Borba Elementary SOAR participants celebrated Autism Awareness Month through inclusive discussions, art projects, and activities that promoted understanding, empathy, and celebration of neurodiversity.
- In partnership with the Inland Empire Utilities Agency, the participants from the High Five program at Cal Aero Preserve Academy took a trip to the Chino Creek Wetlands to celebrate Earth Day. The trip took place on April 17, and participants were engaged in educational presentations, learned about the water cycle and took home many fun goodies from the event.
- KAMS (Kids Affirmation Through Mentorship and Sports), a non-profit organization, visited High Five participants in kindergarten through third grade. 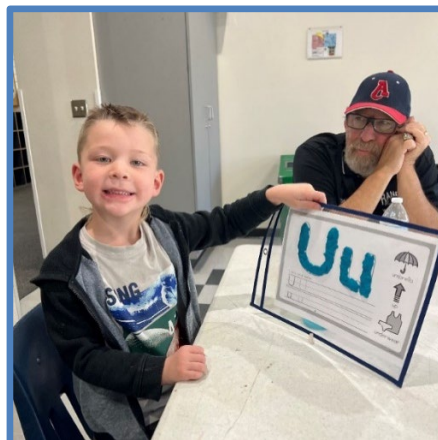

CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

Letter Learners and Tunes & Tales Programs

- Thirty-two children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling programs offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided children in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, and story time. The program explored the letters E-I. The program is suitable for toddlers and preschoolers.
- The Tunes & Tales program featured themed stories and live dancing with videos. Participants were given prizes for creative dance moves. The program is for all ages.



Proclamation

- The City Council proclaimed April 1, as Arbor Day. The proclamation was accepted by Chino Youth Museum President, Steve Lewis. The community was invited to attend the First Friday Arbor Day event on April 4. Residents were reminded of the importance of trees to the environment.

- The City Council also recognized April 1, as Autism Awareness Month. The Museum was recognized for its contributions.

First Friday Arbor Day

- On April 4, the Chino Youth Museum hosted First Friday Arbor Day in partnership with Green Chino and Healthy Chino. This free event was held from 3:00-5:00 p.m., and featured seed planting, tree crafts, exhibit playtime, and a live environmental musical show with Eco Hero.
- Fifty-seven guests participated and learned how to protect the environment at home.

Chino Days

- On April 5-6, the Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors hosted an outreach booth at CHINO Days.
- Two hundred and forty-three people visited the booth to play games, learn about Museum programs and activities, and to purchase vintage City street signs at the Neighborhood Activity Center. All street sign sale proceeds went to the Chino Youth Museum. Street sign revenue was \$4,935.
- Also, nine new families signed up to receive the Museum's monthly newsletter.

Easter Bunny Extravaganza

- On April 12, the Chino Youth Museum hosted the Easter Bunny Extravaganza. One hundred and eleven guests celebrated with the Easter Bunny by reading stories, making holiday crafts, played games, hunted for hidden Easter pictures for prize awards, and took pictures with the Easter Bunny. Admission was \$20 per child and adults were free with a paid child's admission.

New Partnership: Starbucks Reads Dr. Seuss

- On April 19, the Chino Youth Museum partnered with 13 regional Starbucks stores to host the community event, "Starbucks Reads Dr. Seuss." Fifty-seven guests attended the new event. The event featured story time led by Starbucks staff, a "barista bear" coloring contest with a prize basket for one lucky child, and a Starbucks cup craft. Event activities were free with paid admission or membership.

Memberships

- Three family membership packages were sold.

Tours

- Five private tours were booked:
 - On April 1, the West Randall Elementary School tour participants consisted of 16 adults and 84 children.
 - On April 14, the El Camino Elementary School tour participants consisted of 16 adults and 59 children.
 - On April 21, the El Camino Elementary School tour participants consisted of 18 adults and 55 children.
 - On April 28, the Lexington Elementary School tour participants consisted of 5 adults and 8 children.
 - On April 29, the St. Margaret Mary School tour participants consisted of 21 adults and 35 children.

- Staff led participants through a narrative historical tour of the Museum, explored community helper careers with the students, made career hats, and guided exploration play of the exhibits.



5-Star Google Business Review

- On April 3, customer Dawn Diggle posted a five-star review with pictures on Google Business. She said the Museum “is an excellent affordable play space geared towards imagination play...my children played for about 3 hours...we will definitely return!”

Museum Board Meeting

- The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors held its monthly meeting on April 22, from 6:00-7:30 p.m., at the Museum. Board Members talked about future fundraising events.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS

Family Counseling

- Human Services provided counseling services to 64 participants for a total of 255 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 6 participants for a total of 17 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 33 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 1,431.25 hours.



Recruitment of New Marriage and Family Therapist (MFT) Trainees

- Human Services has completed interviews to fill three Counselor II positions and secured 15 new volunteer trainees, who will be coming on at the end of July to complete their practicum.

Internships

- Human Services is accepting resumes for bachelor interns to start summer internships in Case Management.
- BA interns are college students typically pursuing their bachelor's degree in social work or an equivalent field. They are required to complete a certain number of hours. They assist in a variety of ways, such as file destruction, updating the resource directory, shadowing Case Managers, or assisting with the Choices class.

Volunteer Dinner

- At the annual Volunteer Recognition Dinner, Christina Bayless was honored as the Social Services Volunteer of the Year for her outstanding contributions. The event celebrated community members who have dedicated their time and efforts to improving the health and wellness of Chino residents and beyond.

**HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM**

- The Homeless Outreach Team is comprised of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator/Assistant Coordinator and Chino Police Department Quality-of-Life Team. The team focuses on providing street outreach to individuals who are displaced. Staff provides direct resources to services, such as rehab centers, transitional housing, permanent housing, or family reunification. The goal of the team is to provide individuals with wraparound services and create a case plan with goals to obtain permanent housing.
- Homeless Outreach provided services for 14 duplicated clients and 17 new clients for a total of 48 units of service. Six clients exited the streets.

Success Stories

- After declining multiple program opportunities in the past, a 54-year-old individual and long-time Chino resident, who experienced intermittent homelessness and long resisted treatment for substance use agreed to an intake at the Salvation Army in San Bernardino.

Homeless Outreach Coordinators provided transportation, and he is now enrolled and working toward recovery and stable housing.

- The Homeless Outreach Team assisted an 18-year-old, a former foster care youth facing substance use challenge, who was brought to Isaiah's Rock to seek help. Staff contacted the individual's foster care advocate, who secured a group home placement for that night. Homeless Outreach Coordinators then transported the individual to the Open Arms youth drop-in center in Highland.

Homeless Information Management System (HMIS)

- The Homeless Outreach Team hosted the San Bernardino County Coordinated Entry System Case Conferencing meeting at the Community Building. The meeting brought together homeless service providers and local outreach teams to review individual client cases and identify any outstanding documentation needed to advance clients into housing programs.

Coordinated Entry System Case Conferencing

- The City of Chino hosted the San Bernardino County Coordinated Entry System Case Conferencing meeting that bringing together homeless service providers and local outreach teams to review individual client cases and identify any outstanding documentation needed to advance clients into housing programs.

- Planning for the Back-to-School event scheduled for Saturday, July 26, continues to receive sponsors and supply donations. Vendors are being secured, including Vibe Barber, a fan favorite from last year providing the coolest haircuts around. A social media post is scheduled in May to advertise the event registration dates: Tuesday, June 17, from 8:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.; and Wednesday, June 18, from 11:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. With so many generous sponsors, the most vulnerable families will receive a \$50 gift card for groceries.

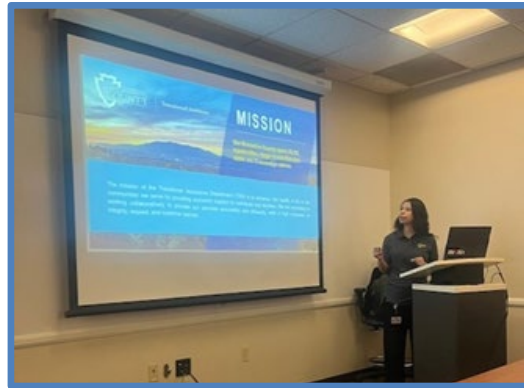
HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- The program enrolled 52 new families to receive assistance with a variety of resources, including government aid applications, CARE Closet services, food assistance, and emergency assistance with rental and utility bills.
- Case Managers attended two valuable trainings this month to increase their awareness of housing resources and government aid programs, such as CalFresh, CalWORKs, and Medi-Cal.
 - One training was presented by the Program Manager of the Coordinated Entry System. She informed the team about the detailed process and requirements to get a client to be eligible for Permanent Supportive Housing or Rapid Rehousing programs. This training has better equipped the Coordinator and Case Managers to be able to guide clients through the Coordinated Entry System process.
 - The second training focused on the Transitional Assistance Department and the application and eligibility requirements for families and individuals to be able to qualify for this type of assistance. The team was informed of the various programs that fall under the CalWORKs program and how to advise clients to seek out those supports.
- Verve City Church volunteers generously provided Easter baskets to 10 families. These families were selected based off need. The families received essential items, such as hygiene supplies, cleaning supplies, as well as toys for the kids and gift cards. These

volunteers continue to go above and beyond for HOPE families, supporting them while they are experiencing homelessness and financial hardship.

- The Emergency Housing Program successfully prevented two HOPE families from being evicted from their homes utilizing \$5,008 in rental assistance.
- The HOPE Center received a \$1,000 donation from two former CVUSD teachers.



CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet provided services to 92 individuals by providing 55 children with clothing and 22 families with emergency hygiene supplies.
- CARE Closet staff have been assembling Kids Packs weekend food bags for 150 children weekly. The CVUSD warehouse staff and HOPE staff assist with the distribution of these items.
- The team is gearing up for the Back-to-School Giveaway. Backpacks and school supplies will be prepared in the CARE Closet and distributed during the event in July.

TYKES

- The TYKES program currently has 182 families actively receiving case management services.
- Throughout the year, the Outreach Specialist and TYKES Case Managers offer parents an Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ-3) to assess their child's development and provide referrals for any concerning areas. So far, 30 assessments have been completed. The Outreach Specialist will provide more opportunities for parents to receive this assessment during future outreach events.
- Outreach was conducted at the CHINO Days event, Chino Youth Museum, Woodcrest Jr. High, and Annual Corn Feed Run.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists will be ending all sessions with the end of the school year on May 22. Monthly evaluations continue to be sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B counselors to share student progress.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

- Hike the Valley did not take place this month due to CHINO Days. The spring/summer session will begin in May.

Community Garden Workshop

- The Community Garden Workshop took place on April 19. This month's topic was "Tomato Mania." The workshop was hosted by the San Bernardino County Master Gardeners. Participants learned about growing and harvesting tomatoes.

Children's Discovery Workshop

- The Children's Discovery Workshop took place on April 19. The topic was "Tomato Buds and Green Thumbs." Participants learned facts about how tomatoes grow and made a craft. Staff led participants on a garden tour, where they had the chance to learn about the various plants growing in the plots.



Healthy Chino Kids

- The Healthy Chino Kids Challenge concluded this month at SOAR, RAAP, and High Five After School sites. Participants engaged in lessons about healthy physical activities, mental health, and wellness exercises. The challenge lasted six weeks with the After School Sites competing weekly in healthy activities, which helped them earn points towards a Healthy Chino party.

Outreach

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an outreach booth at CHINO Days on April 5-6, Earth Day Celebration at the Chino Creek Wetlands on April 17, Preserve Spring Celebration on April 26, and at Heritage Farmers Market on April 30. Participants visited the booth to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events and spun the prize wheel to win Healthy Chino swag.



Healthy Chino Mobile Stops

- Healthy Chino partnered with Green Chino to host an informational mobile stop at the Chino Community Garden on April 12. Participants who visited the booth learned about composting and upcoming Healthy Chino programs.



Employee Wellness / Healthier You Challenge

- Healthy Chino held a ceremony for the Healthier You Challenge: Department Showdown winner. The Public Works Department won first place with 1,837 miles and were rewarded with smoothies from Juice It Up. - Chino SWAG display boxes are placed at five locations throughout the City: Carolyn Owens Community (COCC), Ayala Park Operations Center (APOC), Senior Center (SC), Preserve Community Center (PCC), and Neighborhood Activity Center (NAC).
- “Chino Swag” merchandise encourages Chino pride.
- Swag items include key chains (\$5), men’s and women’s gray t-shirts (\$14-\$16), black t-shirts (\$16-\$19), and stickers (\$4).
- Swag can be purchased at the Carolyn Owens Community Center (COCC), Neighborhood Activity Center (NAC), Ayala Park Operations Center (APOC), Senior Center, and Preserve Community Center (PCC).
- The team is currently holding a community merchandise logo competition, which will be a social media competition where the community can submit their own SWAG design.
- Logos have been submitted and are under review.
- SWAG is available for purchase at all City of Chino events.

YOUTH SPORTS

- Youth Volleyball Clinic began on April 5, at the Preserve Community Center. Participants are learning how to serve, pass, and set. Each class ends with a scrimmage game to put their new skills into real game scenarios.
- Youth Sports staff is currently recruiting coaches and planning for the summer Youth Basketball season. The season will kick-off with games on July 11, at the Neighborhood Activity Center and Preserve Community Center.

PEE WEE SPORTS

- Youth Sports staff is currently planning for Pee Wee Baseball beginning on May 10, at Founders Park.

CHINO BOXING CLUB

- The Chino Youth Boxing Club is planning its 50th Anniversary Celebration on May 30.
- The Chino Youth Boxing Foundation members continue to plan for the Saturday Night Fights sparring showcase in August.
- Ethaniel Robinson was selected as the April Boxer of the Month.



BATTING CAGES

- Batting Cages served 2,225 participants.
- Batting Cages generated over \$15,900.00 in revenue.

ADULT SPORTS

Women's Soccer

- The spring season started on April 8, at Ayala Park. There were 14 games and one forfeit.

NEIGHBORHOOD ACTIVITY CENTER (NAC)

Case Management

- The Case Manager continued to provide dedicated support to both ongoing clients and newly referred individuals. One current client was approved for emergency utility assistance to prevent service interruption following unexpected financial challenges.
- A newly referred individual was also assisted after experiencing a utility disconnection. The household included an older adult who required a CPAP machine, making the restoration of electricity especially urgent. After an evaluation, the individual was approved for emergency utility support, which enabled the electricity to be reconnected.
- The Case Manager restocked essential hygiene supplies for the Kiwanis Closet, an emergency resource funded by the Kiwanis Club of Chino. This emergency hygiene closet is a vital resource used to support individuals and families on the caseload who have run out of basic hygiene items at home.

- Enrichment classes were cancelled due to low enrollment.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- SOAR and RAAP After School sites concluded the school year on May 22, with fun team-building activities, which gave participants a chance to celebrate and connect before summer break.
- RAAP participants were invited to visit the Chino Teen Experience Teen Center at Monte Vista Park on May 22. They enjoyed an end-of-school-year barbecue and participated in fun activities with Teen Center participants.
- On May 13, After School Specialists met to wrap up the school year. Staff discussed the highlights of the school year and brainstormed activities to improve the program for the upcoming 2025-2026 year.
- SOAR and High Five participants and staff visited the Pomona Fairplex in their free time to view all the 2025 Agriculture Fair projects on display. CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

Letter Learners and Tunes & Tales Programs

- Thirty children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling programs offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided children in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, story time, and exploring the letters J-M. The program is suitable for toddlers and preschoolers.
- The Tunes & Tales program featured themed stories and live dancing with videos. Participants were given prizes for creative dance moves. The program is for all ages.

First Friday CYM Lab

- Fifty-nine children and adults attended the First Friday CYM Lab on May 2, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM experiment raising the question, “Have you ever wondered how water can walk?” Participant families painted paper towels with the color of rainbows. Then dipped each end in cups of water to observe the experiment results.

25th Anniversary Bingo Bash

- On May 19, the Chino Youth Museum hosted its 25th Anniversary Bingo fundraiser at Brinderson Hall. The event sold 215 tickets. Participants played 10 Bingo games, enjoyed barbecue cheeseburgers, and won various opportunity drawings and raffle prizes. The Museum raised \$16,043 in revenue before expenses.

- Two private tours were booked:
 - On May 6, the Jackson Elementary School tour participants consisted of 12 adults and 43 children.
 - On May 13, the Litel Elementary School tour participants consisted of 15 adults and 24 children.
 - Staff led participants through a narrative historical tour of the Museum, made butter and learned about farming in Chino, and guided exploration play of the exhibits.

Museum Board Meeting

- The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors held its monthly meeting on May 27, from 6:00-7:30 p.m., at the Museum. Board Members talked about future fundraising events.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS**Family Counseling**

- Human Services provided counseling services to 83 participants for a total of 294 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 7 participants for a total of 23 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 26 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 990.5 hours.

Proclamation

- On May 6, the City Council proclaimed May as National Mental Health Awareness Month. The proclamation was accepted by National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). The community was reminded of the importance of taking care of their mental health by asking for help as needed.

School-Based Counseling

- Counselors concluded counseling services at the school sites on May 22; however, school-based counseling services were offered through June 6, via telehealth or in-person at Chino Human Services.
- Counselors informed all parents of current clients or recently submitted counseling referrals of the opportunity to access counseling services during the summer at the Carolyn Owens Community Center for a low- to no-cost fee-based on eligibility.

End-of-the-Year

- The Human Services Coordinator conducted end-of-the-year evaluations with Counseling staff members. This was a great opportunity for the Counselors to discuss their experiences at different school sites. They also were able to reflect on the year's accomplished goals and experiences they received from serving the community.
- Human Services also hosted an end-of-the-year luau to celebrate all the Human Services graduates in counseling and case management. The team played games, enjoyed Papachino's, an ice cream sundae bar, and took photos for lasting memories.



HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team is comprised of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator/Assistant Coordinator and Chino Police Department Quality-of-Life Team. The team focuses on providing street outreach to individuals who are displaced. Staff provides direct resources to services, such as rehab centers, transitional housing, permanent housing, or family reunification. The goal of the team is to provide individuals with wraparound services and create a case plan with goals to obtain permanent housing.
- Homeless Outreach provided services to 16 duplicated clients and 8 new clients for a total of 40 units of service. One client exited the streets.
- The Homeless Outreach team and Case Management team attended a training on *Narrative Interviewing* presented by the San Bernardino County Coordinated Entry System Manager. This specific style of client communication allows for more accuracy when completing the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) VISPDAT survey, which determines a score to better match clients to appropriate housing programs.

Success Stories

- A man was found sleeping on the balcony of a vacant apartment and refused to leave, prompting a call to Chino PD. Officers identified that the individual was experiencing homelessness and contacted the Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator for support. The Coordinators discovered that he was originally from Rancho Cucamonga, had benefits from L.A. County, and possessed no identification or belongings beyond the clothes he was wearing. They secured a spot for him at Set Free, a low-barrier shelter in San Bernardino County, and transported him there after police clearance. During the ride, the individual expressed appreciation for having a safe place to sleep.

- Planning for the Back-to-School event, scheduled for Saturday, July 26, continues to receive sponsors and supply donations. Vendors are being secured, including Vibe Barber, a fan favorite from last year providing the coolest haircuts around. A social media post was scheduled for May to advertise the event registration dates, Tuesday, June 17, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.; and Wednesday, June 18, from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. School supply donation drives are being scheduled with faith-based partners and local organizations. Chino Cares Challenge will conduct a supply drive from June 2 to July 14.

TUPE

- The Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) Program consists of two intervention/prevention programs: You, Me, Together Vape Free (YMTVF) and Project ALERT. HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- The program enrolled 30 new families to receive assistance with various resources. Many of the new families were seeking help with food, Medi-Cal applications, and housing support.
- The HOPE team attended the CA Homeless Education Conference in San Diego. The team shared that it was a positive learning experience. Breakout sessions presented new strategies to try out in the new school year, such as building better relationships with unaccompanied youth, connecting with resource centers at the post-secondary level, and meeting families where they are at as they face unimaginable challenges. During the conference, the team heard from a parent panel who received support from McKinney-Vento liaisons. These parents shared how impactful and life-changing the support was they received while facing homelessness; a challenge that many of our Chino Valley families are currently facing.
- With the school year ending, Case Managers were focused on informing families about the upcoming Back-to-School Giveaway registration dates, as well as the HOPE reenrollment period beginning on July 7.
- Through McKinney-Vento funding, 25 students had the opportunity to attend the full nine weeks of Chino Summer Camp. Case Managers have collected feedback after the first week. Students have been enjoying Camp and are looking forward to the field trips. Aside from essential childcare, Camp also provides an opportunity to address food insecurity by allowing Camp participants to partake in the free Summer Lunch program.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet supported 50 individuals, 19 children received clothing, and 16 hygiene packs were distributed to families.
- The Chino Valley Democratic Club provided a donation of new and used clothing, emergency hygiene supplies, and school supplies.
- The CARE Closet is preparing for the collection of school supply donations to be used for the Back-to-School Giveaway event.



TYKES

- The TYKES Case Managers are continuing Parents as Teachers services for five parents and have concluded sessions with two parents.
- The Outreach Specialist was present on multiple Open House nights at the school sites. The Specialist also partnered with the Tiny Tots Coordinator to conduct Outreach and on-site Ages and Stages Questionnaires.
- There were 555 contacts made to promote the services available through the TYKES program.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists finalized all sessions with the end of the school year on May 22. Monthly evaluations were sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B counselors to share student progress.
- Cal Aero PALS will conclude on June 30, with the conclusion of the year-round school schedule.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

- Participants were shuttled to Mount Rubidoux on May 3. This was a three-mile hike and was classified as moderate intensity. After the hike, participants enjoyed a healthy snack at a nearby park.



Garden Workshop

- The Community Garden Workshop took place on May 17. This month's topic was "Planning Your Summer Garden." The workshop was hosted by the San Bernardino County Master Gardeners. Participants learned about preparing their garden for the summer season.



Children's Discovery Workshop

- The Children's Discovery Workshop took place on May 17. The topic was "Descriptive Gardens." Participants created construction paper flowers and wrote descriptions on the petals describing their favorite parts of gardening.



Outreach

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an outreach booth at Chino Bike Day on May 10, and at Heritage Farmers Market on May 28. Participants visited the booth to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events and spun the prize wheel to win Healthy Chino swag.



Chino Bike Day

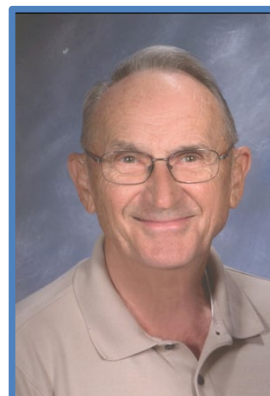
- The Free Summer Lunch Program started on May 27, and will run through August 1. There were 139 meals served at Liberty Park during this reporting period.

- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program Breakfast Club took place on May 7, with 10 participants who enjoyed Ranch Burger. Free transportation is provided to a local restaurant once a month.
- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on May 29, with a total of 18 participants.



Excursions, Trips and Tours

- Twenty participants took a trip to the L.A. County Fair in Pomona. Participants enjoyed trying all the different foods, shopping, and visiting the farm animals.
- Thirty-Three participants took a trip to Soboba Casino in San Jacinto. Participants played their favorite games and enjoyed lunch on their own.



Class Highlights

- Door Décor and More took place on May 19, with eight participants. Participants made crepe paper flowers and designed their flower arrangements to take home. Next month's theme is Red, White, and Blue, and will take place on June 30.

Special Events

- The Senior Citizen's Club helped host a Mother's Day Tea. Refreshments were served and corsages were given to all the mothers. Aqua Ridge Senior Living provided musical entertainment. A total of 56 participants enjoyed the celebration.
- The Senior Citizen's Club hosted a musical performance by the Senior Chino Choir on Friday, May 16. Forty-eight participants enjoyed the performance.



Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 37 participants for 127 units of service. Success Story

- The Aging Services Coordinator was able to assist a participant who was struggling to get her bills in order. The participant suffered the loss of her spouse, as well as half of her income. After full evaluation of her situation, staff suggested City of Chino utility assistance program for her electric bill. The Aging Services Coordinator walked the participant through the process. Her application was approved. The participant was able to start a clean slate with her Edison bill.

Social Services

- On May 1, HICAP provided free non-biased information for Medicare. There were three participants.
- On May 5, Elidia Diaz from West End Counseling provided a craft for Mother's Day. There were 12 participants.
- On May 14, the Department of Aging and Adult Services distributed bus passes to 90 participants over the age of 60.
- On May 19, Inland Counties Legal Services provided free legal aid to three participants.
- On May 22, Feeding America distributed 185 boxes of fresh produce and dry goods.
- The P.A.T.C.H. program assisted two participants with affording their prescriptions.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On May 19, Jen Sancen from Aging Next provided a resource table. There were 21 participants who visited her table.
- On May 28, the Aging Services Coordinator conducted outreach at Oldtimers Senior apartments. The Aging Services Coordinator was able to speak with 17 participants.

- Johnny Allen Tennis successfully completed the May session. There was an increase in participation in the High School Tennis program, and the Adult Cardio Tennis class met its minimum enrollment requirement with at least four participants.

- Over half of the ongoing contracts were submitted for renewal this month in preparation for the upcoming fiscal year beginning on July 1.
- Karate has continued to gain popularity with almost full enrollment.

PROJECTS UPDATE

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to coordinate the plan and bid packages and schedule the timing of construction.
- Staff anticipates a bid solicitation in summer 2025.

Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with the California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will consist of design services to develop a conceptual plan and construction documents for the removal of the old playground equipment and existing rubber/sand surfacing and replacing it with new all-inclusive playground equipment, rubber play surface throughout, new shade sails, park benches, and LED lighting for the playground area.
- The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project will consist of accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building.

PROJECTS UPDATE

AYALA PARK ACCESSIBILITY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT–PHASE I

Project Status:

- The grand re-opening for Softball Fields 1-4 took place on February 22, 2025.
- Additional items, such as wooden backstops, restroom building partitions, and additional signage will be added.
- The Notice of Completion is scheduled for the June 17, 2025, City Council meeting.

WALNUT PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Project Status:

- Staff continues to work with the design consultant and Public Works CIP team to coordinate the plan and bid packages and schedule the timing of construction.
- Staff anticipates a bid solicitation in fall 2025.
- After recent discussions with the City Manager, it was determined that the scope of work will expand to include the basketball court and remaining hardscape areas adjacent to the basketball court for an overall cohesive improvement project.

Scope of Work:

- In December 2021, the City entered into a contract with the California State Department of Parks and Recreation Office of Grants and Local Services for the State of California Parks and Water Bond Act of 2018 (Proposition 68) Parks Bond Act Per Capita Grant for the Walnut Park Improvements project. The project scope of work will consist of design services to develop a conceptual plan and construction documents for the removal of the old playground equipment and existing rubber/sand surfacing and replacing it with new all-inclusive playground equipment, rubber play surface throughout, new shade sails, park benches, and LED lighting for the playground area.
- The Walnut Park Restroom Interior Improvements project will consist of accessibility improvements to the existing restroom building.
