SUMMER CAMP

- Summer Camp began on June 1, and will run through July 31, at CrossPoint Church and Monte Vista Park.
- On June 3, Campers enjoyed a show by Thor's Reptile Family at Monte Vista Park. Participants from both Camp sites learned about various reptiles and had the opportunity for up-close interactions with these fascinating creatures.
- On June 10, participants went on a field trip to Lucky Art Crayonology, where they learned how to make their own crayons and markers. Everyone received a keychain to take home along with the items they created during the visit.
- On June 17, Nitro STEM Lab visited Monte Vista Park for an exciting STEM science show and a slime workshop. Participants from both Camps enjoyed watching dry ice experiments and made their own slime to take home.



CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

First Friday CYM Lab

- Eighty-five participants attended First Friday CYM Lab Water Edition on June 5, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM color separation magic experiment and participants explored the interactive exhibits.
- First Friday is sponsored by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Around the World with Crafts Program

- Twenty-eight children and family members participated in the weekly program on Wednesdays at 11:00 a.m.
- The program ties in crafts from around the world to cultures in the Chino community.
- Families are guided through a different culture each month. June featured crafts from Cuba. Children made Cuban pom-pom flags, palm trees, Caribbean fish, and dance ribbons.
- Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.



Letter Learners Program

- Eighteen children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling program offered on Thursdays at 10:30 a.m.
- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided them in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, storytelling, and exploring the lowercase letters “L-O.”
- Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.

Summer Program Beat the Heat

- Twenty-four children and family members enjoyed summer games and cool activities every Thursday from 1:00-1:45 p.m. The program featured activities, such as sand clay, melting ice, and splash potato. A minimal fee applies from \$4 to \$6.

Summer Program Dr. Moo’s Silly Science

- Fifty-six children and family members experimented with exciting science-themed activities every Friday from 1:00-1:45 p.m. The program featured activities, such as exploding soda, s’mores, and elephant toothpaste. A minimal fee applies from \$4 to \$6.

New De Colores Program Partnership

- Forty-eight children and family members participated in the new inclusive interactive program designed for children ages 0-5 on Saturdays at 1:00 p.m.
- Chino families enjoy a lively mix of story time, music, movement, and arts and crafts designed to spark creativity and strengthen the bond between parents and little ones.
- The program features special guests: Lola, a lovable, neurodivergent puppet mascot, and her friend the Toucan.
- De Colores is a collaboration between the Chino Youth Museum and the dA Center for the Arts in Pomona. Admission is free with general admission or paid membership.

Memberships

- Four family membership packages were sold.

Parties

- One private birthday party was booked with 23 guests.
- All party guests explored the Museum's exhibits and played activities.
- Staff led a birthday party scavenger hunt and awarded prizes.
- The party host received \$150 worth of free child admission day passes for future use as part of the party package.

Tours

- Two private tours were booked by the CSPR Tiny Tots program. Twenty adults and sixty-one children attended.
- Staff led each group on an educational historical tour through the Museum, and encouraged guests to play and explore the eight hands-on exhibits that resemble a small town.

Bunco

- The Chino Youth Museum hosted a Bunco fundraiser on June 9. Sixty-two participants played Bunco, enjoyed raffles and finger foods, and won prizes.
- The event raised \$1,500 after expenses.

New Aqua Mirror Live

- New this summer is the Aqua Mirror Live, an interactive exhibit that magically transforms reflections into a fluid tableau, revealing in a dramatic and fun manner that the human body is 60% water. With assistance from staff in Public Works, Water and Environmental Division, funding for the Aqua Mirror was provided through the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) for water use efficiency programs.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS**Family Counseling**

- Human Services provided counseling services to 75 participants for a total of 292 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 30 participants for a total of 121 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 15 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 590.5 hours.

End of Year

- As the school year ended, interviews were conducted with each Counselor to review the past school year and discuss challenges that came up during the year.
- Exit interviews were conducted with outgoing Counselors as many graduated and moved on to begin their full-time careers as Counselors.
- Lead Counselors and Volunteer Trainees are being assigned to their school sites for the 2026-27 school year.
- Nine new trainees have been selected to begin their training at the end of July to begin providing services in August.

HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team, made up of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator, alongside the Chino Police Department's Quality-of-Life Team, continues to provide vital support to individuals experiencing homelessness. The team connects people with services, such as rehabilitation programs, transitional or permanent housing, and family reunification, while creating personalized case plans to help them achieve stable housing.
- The Chino Homeless Outreach Team met with the Upland and Montclair Outreach Teams to coordinate planning for an upcoming Resource Day. Additionally, the Homeless Outreach program welcomed a summer intern seeking his bachelor's degree in social work. He assists the team on Thursdays by updating homeless resource files, while learning about the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness.
- The team served 17 returning clients and 25 new clients to provide a total of 79 service units.



Success Stories

- A 47-year-old female was connected to the Homeless Outreach Team outside the Chino Police Department. She shared that she wanted to enter detox and inpatient treatment due to alcohol addiction. The Homeless Outreach Team coordinated a 14-day detox admission at Martin Luther King (MLK) Hospital with plans for a 60-day inpatient program and provided transportation to the hospital. The team remained with her until her intake assessment was completed.

GIVEAWAY EVENTS**Back-to-School Giveaway Event**

- The Back-to-School Giveaway event completed in-person registration with 229 students registered. The event accepts 500 students. Families can continue to register through HOPE Case Managers and Neighborhood Activity Center Case Manager. Vendor recruitment has completed with a variety of organizations along with local barbers providing haircuts for students. Supplies continue to be collected, sorted, and placed in backpacks.
- School supply donation drives were scheduled with faith-based partners and local organizations. Chino Cares Challenge conducted a supplies drive from June 1-13.

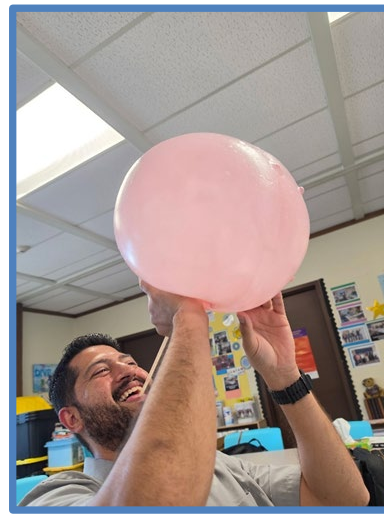

HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)**Case Management**

- HOPE staff enrolled ten new families and continued services with 39 families resulting in a total of 163 units of services in the form of application assistance, food assistance, clothing, emergency hygiene supplies, connection to childcare, and referrals to the Back-to-School Giveaway.
- Every June, the team closes out the fiscal year by informing families of summer activities, resources, and invites them to re-enroll in July.
- Case Managers assisted with the Back-to-School Giveaway registration and will continue to register students for the event during the reenrollment period in the upcoming months.
- This year, Case Managers focused efforts on 29 most vulnerable families living in motels or vehicles and helping 15 secure housing. The HOPE team gained access to the County Housing System (HMIS), participated in Coordinated Entry case conferencing to advocate for rapid rehousing opportunities, and partnered with Foothill Family Shelter to expand housing access.
- The HOPE program was invited to St. Paul the Apostle Walking with Moms in Need to celebrate their one-year anniversary. This organization supports families from pregnancy through the first few years by providing all items needed for mom and baby to thrive, including parenting classes.

- The HOPE Team, Neighborhood Activity Center Case Manager, Homeless Outreach Team, and Senior Center Aging Services Coordinator participated in a staff retreat. The retreat focused on program information, team building activities, and appreciation for the amazing impact they all had on Chino Valley families this year. An activity at the retreat helped show how collaborations between all local programs from a variety of agencies expand the positive impact for families even further. Staff was given a program title and while an actual client's journey was read aloud, a section of the yarn was handed off showing the connection between the programs and building a safety net to catch the family from falling.



EXCEL (Experience in Career, Education, and Leadership)

- The EXCEL Program for the 2026-27 school year will begin promoting in July during intake when families enroll in the program.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet served 32 individuals. Services included distribution of 6 emergency hygiene bags and 11 children receiving clothing.
- US Bank continued to support the Closet with 25 volunteer hours, and Chino Neighborhood House donated school supplies.
- The Closet is preparing for Back-to-School Giveaway backpacks and supply donations.

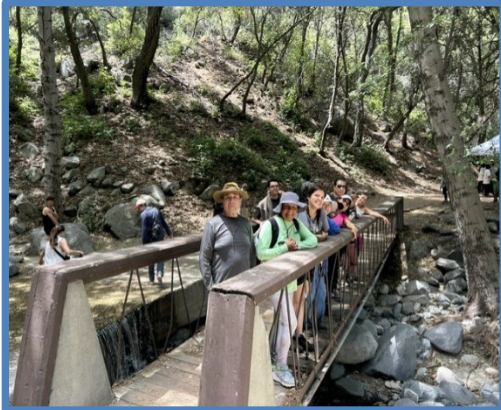
TYKES

- The TYKES program provided a total of 143 services to 52 families with a child 0 to 5 years old.
- Five clients completed the Parents as Teachers program. Year-to-date, the program enrolled 20 families with 16 completing the program.
- The Outreach Specialist hosted a table at 4 events for 329 service contacts promoting Case Management support services and early childhood related resources.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS has concluded for the school year and will resume in August with the traditional Chino Valley Unified School District schedule.

Hike the Valley

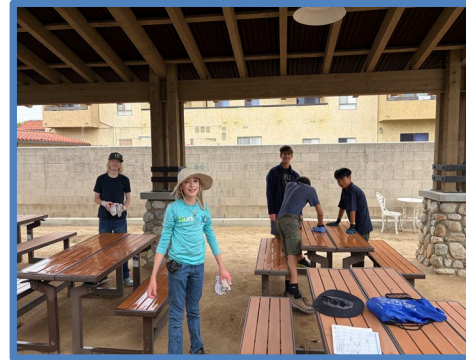
Healthy Grilling

- The summer season started on June 23, at Ayala Park.

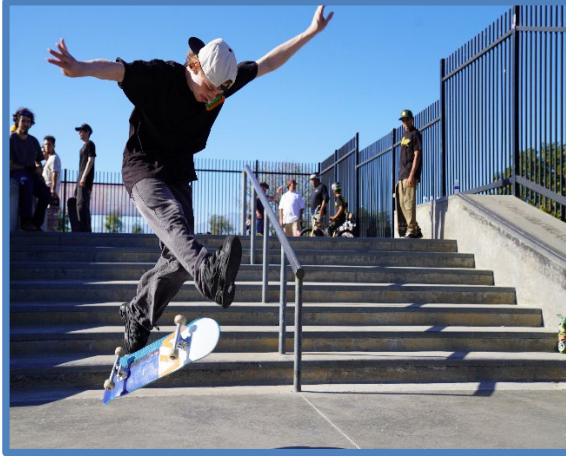
Men's Basketball

Case Management

- The Case Manager actively participated in the Back-to-School Giveaway registration held at the Neighborhood Activity Center on June 18-19. In addition to the scheduled registration dates, the Case Manager continued to provide registration assistance during regular office hours for families who were unable to attend. Registration will continue until all available spaces have been filled.
- The Case Manager successfully secured approval through the Emergency Rental Assistance program for two households experiencing significant financial hardship.

One household qualified for assistance after falling behind on rent payments due to unexpected funeral expenses following the loss of a loved one.

- The Case Manager continued to provide ongoing Case Management services to households approved for emergency assistance programs, as well as comprehensive support and resource coordination for additional clients assigned to the caseload.

NAC Enrichment Classes

- Enrichment classes at the Neighborhood Activity Center were cancelled in June.

CHINO EXPERIENCE TEEN CENTER

Teen Programs Activities

- The program was not offered during June.
- Summer Camp was hosted at the Teen Center.

Teen Opportunity Program (TOP)

- The TOP meeting was conducted on June 4, in the City Council Chambers. Six members in attendance had the opportunity to sign up for Chino Summer Nights, Fireworks Spectacular, and Family Campout.

Teen Advisory Committee (TAC)

- The Teen Advisory Committee did not meet in June.
- TAC Orientation will take place on August 4, at the Neighborhood Activity Center.
- The incoming committee will resume monthly meetings on September 3, in the City Council Chambers.

MONTE VISTA PARK

Splash Pad

- The Splash Pad is open to the public daily from May 23 through September 7, 11:00 a.m.-7:00 p.m. Days of operation will change to only Saturday and Sunday starting September 8 through October 25.

SUMMER LUNCH

- The Free Summer Lunch program started on May 26, and will run through August 7. There were 2,667 meals served at Monte Vista Park during this reporting period.
- There were 1,496 meals served at Liberty Park during this reporting period.

OLD SCHOOLHOUSE MUSEUM

- The Museum had 65 visitors this month.
- On June 3, the Old School House Museum hosted a Dairy Pop-up from 2:00-4:00 p.m., with 36 visitors. Visitors had the chance to visit displays specialized in highlighting Chino's dairy land. Participants enjoyed dairy-themed activities and had the opportunity to make their own butter.
- A new exhibit donation was received, a 1932 trophy that belonged to pioneer and Hall of Fame member, W.T. Butterfield. The trophy was one of the many awards he won for his agricultural displays at the LA County Fair.



PRESERVE COMMUNITY CENTER

Programs and Classes

- The Creative Kids class was cancelled due to low enrollment.
- The Youth Sports program began its summer basketball season with practices beginning on June 29.
- Volleyball participation increased steadily, with enrollment growing from 73 participants in May to 116 participants in June.

Teen Scene

- Staff hosted an Outreach booth during the Summer Movie Night at Stueve Family Park on June 19, where they distributed program flyers and provided community members with information about the program.
- On June 24, staff partnered with the Chino Police Department to visit the Discovery Village Apartment Complex. During this event, they engaged with local teens through games and activities, while offering food in a positive and welcoming environment.
- The Teen Scene program transitioned to summer hours, operating on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:00-5:00 p.m., at Homecoming in the Preserve. The program saw an average daily attendance of 25 teen participants.

SENIOR CENTER

Transportation Services

- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program provided 550 transportation trips to 62 participants for a variety of needs, including transportation to Senior Center activities, doctor appointments, grocery shopping, and trips to the bank and post office. There were 7 newly registered participants.
- The Breakfast Club was held on June 10, with 12 participants. Free transportation is provided to a local restaurant once a month. This month, they enjoyed Andy's Burgers.
- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on June 19, with 19 participants.

Class Highlights

- Door Décor and More took place on June 29, with 11 participants. Participants painted a sunflower with red, white, and blue paint. Next month's theme is "Home Sweet Home," and will take place on July 27.

Excursions, Trips and Tours

- The Los Angeles Farmer's Market Food Tour trip took place on June 13, with 18 participants.
- The Harrah's Casino trip took place on June 20, with 18 participants.
- The Natural History Museum trip took place on June 27, with 18 participants.

Senior Prom

- The first Senior Prom welcomed 56 seniors for a lively and memorable afternoon. Guests enjoyed a variety of activities, including dancing, professional prom photos, a light lunch, karaoke, fresh corsages and boutonnieres, fresh popcorn, and assorted desserts. A Prom King and Queen were crowned as part of the celebration.



Father's Day Barbecue

- Thirty-eight seniors attended the Father's Day BBQ event. Participants enjoyed an afternoon of carne asada tacos with all the fixings, a cornhole competition, and prizes. This event was made possible due to the generous sponsorships from Hottinger Family Meats, Aqua Ridge Senior Living, and Magnolia Foods.



Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 37 participants for a total of 81 units of service. She worked with various participants on applications for utility and rental assistance. Direct services included low-income housing lists, Medi-Cal renewal applications, and Cal-Fresh renewal applications. The Aging Services Coordinator also worked on closing client files for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. In addition, 32 resources and referrals were provided to participants throughout the month.

Success Story

- The Aging Services Coordinator assisted a participant in creating and setting up a Social Security account, as the participant had trouble navigating the Social Security website and completing the account registration process. As the participant was approaching age 65, they also sought out information regarding Medicare eligibility and enrollment options. The Aging Services Coordinator successfully scheduled a Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) appointment, during which the participant

met with a representative who provided guidance on Medicare and assisted them in understanding and navigating the enrollment process.

Social Services

- On June 4 and 18, HICAP provided free information on Medicare. There were 5 participants.
- On June 10, the Department of Aging and Adult Services distributed 82 bus passes to participants over the age of 60.
- On June 25, Feeding America distributed 225 boxes of food to participants.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On June 24, Valeria Camey from US Bank conducted a Lunch and Learn to talk about financial education. There were 21 participants.
- The Aging Services Coordinator was able to help one participant for the P.A.T.C.H. program to obtain their prescription.
- On June 25, the Aging Services Coordinator attended the annual Senior Symposium for the County of Riverside. The Aging Services Coordinator was able to gain valuable knowledge on reporting elder abuse, met new peers, and discovered a variety of helpful resources to better support participants.
