AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SOAR and High Five After School Programs

- SOAR and RAAP After School sites concluded the school year on May 22, with fun team-building activities, which gave participants a chance to celebrate and connect before summer break.
- RAAP participants were invited to visit the Chino Teen Experience Teen Center at Monte Vista Park on May 22. They enjoyed an end-of-school-year barbecue and participated in fun activities with Teen Center participants.
- On May 13, After School Specialists met to wrap up the school year. Staff discussed the highlights of the school year and brainstormed activities to improve the program for the upcoming 2025-2026 year.
- SOAR and High Five participants and staff visited the Pomona Fairplex in their free time to view all the 2025 Agriculture Fair projects on display. - On May 15, Summer Camp staff met at the Carolyn Owens Community Center to review Camp procedures, field trip safety rules, and upcoming partnerships and activities. Summer Camp began May 27, at CrossPoint Church and Monte Vista Park.
- To kick-off the summer, all Camp participants enjoyed Thor's Reptile Family Show at Monte Vista Park on May 28. Participants from both sites had a great time discovering various reptiles and interacting closely with the animals.



CHINO YOUTH MUSEUM

Letter Learners and Tunes & Tales Programs

- Thirty children and family members participated in the interactive storytelling programs offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

- During Letter Learners, staff led children through a “get your wiggles out” activity and guided children in making alphabet Play-Doh letters, letter crafts, story time, and exploring the letters J-M. The program is suitable for toddlers and preschoolers.
- The Tunes & Tales program featured themed stories and live dancing with videos. Participants were given prizes for creative dance moves. The program is for all ages.

First Friday CYM Lab

- Fifty-nine children and adults attended the First Friday CYM Lab on May 2, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. The free lab program featured a STEAM experiment raising the question, “Have you ever wondered how water can walk?” Participant families painted paper towels with the color of rainbows. Then dipped each end in cups of water to observe the experiment results.

25th Anniversary Bingo Bash

- On May 19, the Chino Youth Museum hosted its 25th Anniversary Bingo fundraiser at Brinderson Hall. The event sold 215 tickets. Participants played 10 Bingo games, enjoyed barbecue cheeseburgers, and won various opportunity drawings and raffle prizes. The Museum raised \$16,043 in revenue before expenses.
- The Chino Police Officers Association members donated the dinner supplies and volunteered their time to grill cheeseburgers served at the event.

- Five family membership packages were sold.

Tours

- Two private tours were booked:
 - On May 6, the Jackson Elementary School tour participants consisted of 12 adults and 43 children.
 - On May 13, the Lital Elementary School tour participants consisted of 15 adults and 24 children.
 - Staff led participants through a narrative historical tour of the Museum, made butter and learned about farming in Chino, and guided exploration play of the exhibits.

Museum Board Meeting

- The Chino Youth Museum Board of Directors held its monthly meeting on May 27, from 6:00-7:30 p.m., at the Museum. Board Members talked about future fundraising events.

COUNSELING PROGRAMS**Family Counseling**

- Human Services provided counseling services to 83 participants for a total of 294 units of service. Counseling services are provided in-person, as well as through telehealth.
- The CDBG program provided counseling services to 7 participants for a total of 23 units of service.

Volunteers

- Human Services had 26 volunteer interns, who logged a total of 990.5 hours.

Proclamation

- On May 6, the City Council proclaimed May as National Mental Health Awareness Month. The proclamation was accepted by National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). The community was reminded of the importance of taking care of their mental health by asking for help as needed.

School-Based Counseling

- Counselors concluded counseling services at the school sites on May 22; however, school-based counseling services were offered through June 6, via telehealth or in-person at Chino Human Services.
- Counselors informed all parents of current clients or recently submitted counseling referrals of the opportunity to access counseling services during the summer at the Carolyn Owens Community Center for a low- to no-cost fee-based on eligibility.

End-of-the-Year

- The Human Services Coordinator conducted end-of-the-year evaluations with Counseling staff members. This was a great opportunity for the Counselors to discuss their experiences at different school sites. They also were able to reflect on the year's accomplished goals and experiences they received from serving the community.
- Human Services also hosted an end-of-the-year luau to celebrate all the Human Services graduates in counseling and case management. The team played games, enjoyed Papachino's, an ice cream sundae bar, and took photos for lasting memories.



HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

- The Homeless Outreach Team is comprised of the Community Services, Parks & Recreation Homeless Outreach Coordinator/Assistant Coordinator and Chino Police Department Quality-of-Life Team. The team focuses on providing street outreach to individuals who are displaced. Staff provides direct resources to services, such as rehab centers, transitional housing, permanent housing, or family reunification. The goal of the team is to provide individuals with wraparound services and create a case plan with goals to obtain permanent housing.
- Homeless Outreach provided services to 16 duplicated clients and 8 new clients for a total of 40 units of service. One client exited the streets.
- The Homeless Outreach team and Case Management team attended a training on *Narrative Interviewing* presented by the San Bernardino County Coordinated Entry System Manager. This specific style of client communication allows for more accuracy when completing the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) VISPDAT survey, which determines a score to better match clients to appropriate housing programs.

Success Stories

- A man was found sleeping on the balcony of a vacant apartment and refused to leave, prompting a call to Chino PD. Officers identified that the individual was experiencing homelessness and contacted the Homeless Outreach Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator for support. The Coordinators discovered that he was originally from Rancho Cucamonga, had benefits from L.A. County, and possessed no identification or belongings beyond the clothes he was wearing. They secured a spot for him at Set Free, a low-barrier shelter in San Bernardino County, and transported him there after police clearance. During the ride, the individual expressed appreciation for having a safe place to sleep.

GIVEAWAY EVENTS

Back-to-School Event

- Planning for the Back-to-School event, scheduled for Saturday, July 26, continues to receive sponsors and supply donations. Vendors are being secured, including Vibe Barber, a fan favorite from last year providing the coolest haircuts around. A social media post was scheduled for May to advertise the event registration dates, Tuesday, June 17, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.; and Wednesday, June 18, from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., at the Neighborhood Activity Center. School supply donation drives are being scheduled with faith-based partners and local organizations. Chino Cares Challenge will conduct a supply drive from June 2 to July 14.

TUPE

- The Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) Program consists of two intervention/prevention programs: You, Me, Together Vape Free (YMTVF) and Project ALERT. HOPE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (HOPE)

Case Management

- The program enrolled 30 new families to receive assistance with various resources. Many of the new families were seeking help with food, Medi-Cal applications, and housing support.
- The HOPE team attended the CA Homeless Education Conference in San Diego. The team shared that it was a positive learning experience. Breakout sessions presented new strategies to try out in the new school year, such as building better relationships with unaccompanied youth, connecting with resource centers at the post-secondary level, and meeting families where they are at as they face unimaginable challenges. During the conference, the team heard from a parent panel who received support from McKinney-Vento liaisons. These parents shared how impactful and life-changing the support was they received while facing homelessness; a challenge that many of our Chino Valley families are currently facing.
- With the school year ending, Case Managers were focused on informing families about the upcoming Back-to-School Giveaway registration dates, as well as the HOPE reenrollment period beginning on July 7.
- Through McKinney-Vento funding, 25 students had the opportunity to attend the full nine weeks of Chino Summer Camp. Case Managers have collected feedback after the first week. Students have been enjoying Camp and are looking forward to the field trips. Aside from essential childcare, Camp also provides an opportunity to address food insecurity by allowing Camp participants to partake in the free Summer Lunch program.

CARE Closet

- The CARE Closet supported 50 individuals, 19 children received clothing, and 16 hygiene packs were distributed to families.
- The Chino Valley Democratic Club provided a donation of new and used clothing, emergency hygiene supplies, and school supplies.
- The CARE Closet is preparing for the collection of school supply donations to be used for the Back-to-School Giveaway event.



TYKES

- The TYKES Case Managers are continuing Parents as Teachers services for five parents and have concluded sessions with two parents.
- The Outreach Specialist was present on multiple Open House nights at the school sites. The Specialist also partnered with the Tiny Tots Coordinator to conduct Outreach and on-site Ages and Stages Questionnaires.
- There were 555 contacts made to promote the services available through the TYKES program.

POSITIVE ACTION FOR LIFE SUCCESS (PALS)

- PALS Specialists finalized all sessions with the end of the school year on May 22. Monthly evaluations were sent to school administrators, teachers, and MTSS-B counselors to share student progress.
- Cal Aero PALS will conclude on June 30, with the conclusion of the year-round school schedule.

HEALTHY CHINO

Hike the Valley

- Participants were shuttled to Mount Rubidoux on May 3. This was a three-mile hike and was classified as moderate intensity. After the hike, participants enjoyed a healthy snack at a nearby park.



Garden Workshop

- The Community Garden Workshop took place on May 17. This month's topic was "Planning Your Summer Garden." The workshop was hosted by the San Bernardino County Master Gardeners. Participants learned about preparing their garden for the summer season.



Children's Discovery Workshop

- The Children's Discovery Workshop took place on May 17. The topic was "Descriptive Gardens." Participants created construction paper flowers and wrote descriptions on the petals describing their favorite parts of gardening.



Outreach

- Healthy Chino staff hosted an outreach booth at Chino Bike Day on May 10, and at Heritage Farmers Market on May 28. Participants visited the booth to learn about upcoming Healthy Chino programs and events and spun the prize wheel to win Healthy Chino swag.



Chino Bike Day

- Chino Bike Day took place on May 10 at Ruben S. Ayala Park. The event hosted a bicycle obstacle course provided by the Chino Police Department and a bike repair station provided by BikeFix. Participants enjoyed a 13-mile community bike ride and a 5-mile family bike ride.

- The event saw a large turnout with significant interest in Summer Movie Nights, football, and basketball.

Chino Experience Teen Center/Teen Programs Activities

Liberty Park

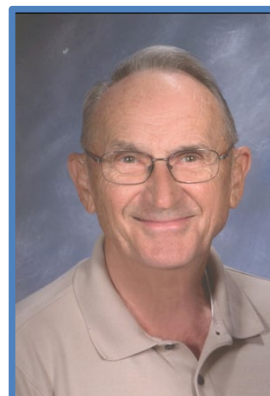
- The Free Summer Lunch Program started on May 27, and will run through August 1. There were 139 meals served at Liberty Park during this reporting period.

Transportation Services

- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program provided 527 transportation trips to 7 participants for different services, including to Senior Center for activities, doctor appointments, grocery stores, banks, and post office.
- The Get S.M.A.R.T. program Breakfast Club took place on May 7, with 10 participants who enjoyed Ranch Burger. Free transportation is provided to a local restaurant once a month.
- The monthly special trip to Walmart took place on May 29, with a total of 18 participants.



Excursions, Trips and Tours

- Twenty participants took a trip to the L.A. County Fair in Pomona. Participants enjoyed trying all the different foods, shopping, and visiting the farm animals.
- Thirty-Three participants took a trip to Soboba Casino in San Jacinto. Participants played their favorite games and enjoyed lunch on their own.



Class Highlights

- Door Décor and More took place on May 19, with eight participants. Participants made crepe paper flowers and designed their flower arrangements to take home. Next month's theme is Red, White, and Blue, and will take place on June 30.

Special Events

- The Senior Citizen's Club helped host a Mother's Day Tea. Refreshments were served and corsages were given to all the mothers. Aqua Ridge Senior Living provided musical entertainment. A total of 56 participants enjoyed the celebration.
- The Senior Citizen's Club hosted a musical performance by the Senior Chino Choir on Friday, May 16. Forty-eight participants enjoyed the performance.



Case Management

- The Aging Services Coordinator provided services to 37 participants for 127 units of service. The Aging Services Coordinator worked with various participants for applications for rental and utility assistance. Direct services include food resources, low-income housing lists, and Medi-Cal and Cal-Fresh applications. In addition, 32 resources and referrals were provided to participants.

Success Story

- The Aging Services Coordinator was able to assist a participant who was struggling to get her bills in order. The participant suffered the loss of her spouse, as well as half of her income. After full evaluation of her situation, staff suggested City of Chino utility assistance program for her electric bill. The Aging Services Coordinator walked the participant through the process. Her application was approved. The participant was able to start a clean slate with her Edison bill.

Social Services

- On May 1, HICAP provided free non-biased information for Medicare. There were three participants.
- On May 5, Elidia Diaz from West End Counseling provided a craft for Mother's Day. There were 12 participants.
- On May 14, the Department of Aging and Adult Services distributed bus passes to 90 participants over the age of 60.
- On May 19, Inland Counties Legal Services provided free legal aid to three participants.
- On May 22, Feeding America distributed 185 boxes of fresh produce and dry goods.
- The P.A.T.C.H. program assisted two participants with affording their prescriptions.

Workshops and Support Groups

- On May 19, Jen Sancen from Aging Next provided a resource table. There were 21 participants who visited her table.
- On May 28, the Aging Services Coordinator conducted outreach at Oldtimers Senior apartments. The Aging Services Coordinator was able to speak with 17 participants.

- Johnny Allen Tennis successfully completed the May session. There was an increase in participation in the High School Tennis program, and the Adult Cardio Tennis class met its minimum enrollment requirement with at least four participants.

- Over half of the ongoing contracts were submitted for renewal this month in preparation for the upcoming fiscal year beginning on July 1.
- Karate has continued to gain popularity with almost full enrollment.
